

A Bill to Expand Access to Mental Health Care for the Low Socio-Economic American Citizens

1	BE IT ENACTE	D BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	The United States federal government will hereby mandate that all states
3		follow the federal default for state essential health benefits in order to
4		eliminate state bias for the mentally ill.
5	SECTION 2.	Mentally ill - a term that describes the disorder of the mind that could be
6		of emotional or physical origin.
7	SECTION 3.	The government agency responsible for the enforcement of this bill is the
8		United States Department of Health and Human Services. It will oversee
9		the project and will monitor that the states are following the federal
0		default.
1	SECTION 4.	The following bill will be implemented and criterions will be met by
2		August 1, 2015.
3	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Resolution to Disallow the Use of fMRI to Be Used as Evidence in Criminal Trials.

1	WHEREAS,	The fMRI is being used in criminal cases in several states in the present
2		system and;
3	WHEREAS,	the fMRI used as a lie detector has an accuracy rate of only 75% to 98%
4		and;
5	WHEREAS,	this accuracy rate is too low for use in court cases where the death
6		penalty and life without parole is in play. Therefore, be it
7	RESOLVED,	that the UIL Congress here assembled make the following
8		recommendation for solution to disallow the use of fMRI as criminal
9		evidence.

A Bill to Restrict the Use of Automatic Firearms to Reduce Accidental Deaths

1	BE IT ENACTE	D BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	The use of automatic firearms by children under the age of 17 on private
3		lands as well as at shooting ranges is prohibited.
4	SECTION 2.	Automatic firearms are defined as a firearm that reloads itself and
5		keeps firing until the trigger is released.
6		
7	SECTION 3.	The Department of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms will oversee the
8		implementation of this bill.
9		A. This bill will require that anyone owning or firing an automatic
10		firearm to have completed 16 hours of training
11		B. This bill will make it illegal for anyone under the age of 17 to fire an
12		automatic firearm.
13	SECTION 4.	This bill will go into effect on January 1, 2015.
14	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Impose a Tax to Lessen Residential Water Usage

- 1 BE IT ENACTED BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
- 2 **SECTION 1**. Congress will impose a "water consumption tax" upon residential water
- users that use more than 72,000 gallons during a three month period.
- 4 **SECTION 2**. Residential water users refers to water usage in single family homes.
- 5 **SECTION 3.** The Bureau of Reclamation will oversee the enforcement of this bill along
- 6 with the EPA.
- A. City and county officials will be responsible for reporting usage to the
- 8 Bureau of Reclamation.
- B. City and county officials will also be responsible for collecting the
- water consumption tax.
- 11 **SECTION 4.** This bill will go into effect January 1, 2015.
- **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to establish entrance points to combat the recent Ebola outbreak

- 1 BE IT ENACTED BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
- 2 **SECTION 1**. All US ports of entry will be equipped with the medical technology to test
- persons coming into the US for the Ebola Virus.
- 4 **SECTION 2**. Ports of entry: The access point for all citizens, immigrants, and tourists in
- 5 the US.
- 6 **SECTION 3.** A. The US department of health will provide the ports of entry with the
- medical equipment to test for the Ebola virus, and provide individuals
- 8 responsible for testing for the virus.
- B. The US border patrol will be responsible for securing individuals found
- positive of the Ebola virus, and sending them to proper medical facility.
- 11 **SECTION 4.** This bill will go into effect on Dec. 1, 2015.
- SECTION 5. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Place Safety Belts to prevent accidents in school buses

- BE IT ENACTED BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
- 2 **SECTION 1**. All school buses must be equipped with safety belts.
- 3 **SECTION 2**. School Buses- Any form of public school transportation that carries over
- 4 20 passengers.
- Safety Belts- the three point apparatus in motor vehicles that restrains
- 6 passengers.
- 7 **SECTION 3.** The US department of Education will oversee the implementation and
- 8 enforcement of this bill.
- 9 **SECTION 4.** Indicate the implementation date/timeframe.
- SECTION 5. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

- 3 **SECTION 2**. An increase on research will issue a roadmap to coordinate a response to
- 4 the outbreak on the Ebola Virus.
- 5 **SECTION 3.** The Center for Disease Control and Prevention will be in charge of all
- 6 research and prevention tactics.
- 7 **SECTION 4.** This bill will go into effect on January 3, 2015
- 8 **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to subject all airline passengers traveling from the Middle East to higher levels of security

1	BE II ENACIE	D BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	All airline passengers coming directly or indirectly from the Middle East
3		into the United States of America will be subject to higher levels of
4		security checks, due to increasing threats from the Islamic State of Iraq
5		and Syria (ISIS).
6	SECTION 2.	Indirectly is defined as passengers traveling through one or more
7		countries before reaching their final destination in the United States of
8		America.
9	SECTION 3.	The Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) will oversee the enforcement
10		of the bill along with the Transportation Security Administration (TSA).
11		A. To ensure the effectiveness of this bill, all TSA offices at airports will
12		aid in the enforcement by performing background checks using
13		federal government databases and more thorough baggage searches.
14		B. All airports under the jurisdiction of the FAA will be subject to this bill
15		C. No new jobs will be required for this bill to be enacted.
16	SECTION 4.	This bill will go into effect on January 1, 2015.
17	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to exchange all United States paper currency to coin-based currency

1	BE IT ENACTE	D BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	All United States of America paper currency shall be exchanged with the
3		United States Mint to coin-based currency, with identical value.
4	SECTION 2.	Coins of identical value are to be made to restore the gold standard.
5	SECTION 3.	The United States Department of the Treasury will oversee the
6		enforcement of the bill along with United States Mint performing the
7		exchanges.
8		A. To ensure that all money is exchanged, the Department of the
9		Treasury shall oversee a program to convert all currency exchange
10		stations in other countries to be compliant with this bill.
11		B. All denominations of paper currency will be exchanged.
12	SECTION 4.	This bill will go into effect on January 1, 2016. All currency is to be
13		exchanged by January 1, 2017; after this date, no paper currency will be
14		accepted in the United States.
15	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void

A Bill to Establish U. S. Energy Independence

1	BE IT ENACTE	D BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	The United States of America will develop its energy producing natural
3		resources to the level that the United States of America is non-dependent
4		on foreign sources for its energy needs.
5	SECTION 2.	Energy needs shall be defined as 98% of all U.S. energy needs. Special
6		exception will be provided for NAFTA members Canada and Mexico. This
7		law will not supersede state laws relating to the development and
8		exploration of energy.
9	SECTION 3.	The Department of Energy will oversee the enforcement of the bill.
10		A. All regulations currently restricting the development and exploration
11		of energy and its development will be suspended until energy
12		independence is achieved. Any development created during this
13		period cannot be terminated for a period of ten years to allow for
14		recuperation of investment.
15		B. The United States Federal Government will provide small grants to
16		companies embarking on the development of U.S. "green" energy
17		during this period of open development and exploration.
18	SECTION 4.	Due to the importance of National Security, this suspension of restricting
19		regulations will begin immediately upon the bill being signed into law.
20	SECTION 5.	All Federal laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null
21		and void.

A Resolution to enforce the immigration laws of the United States, and significantly reduce illegal immigration

1	WHEREAS,	The United States, a nation of immigrants, cannot sustain the current
2		rate of illegal immigration and continue to provide its current standard of
3		living and safety for its citizenry; and
4	WHEREAS,	schools, social services, medical services, economic development, and the
5		established way of life, are at risk under the current system; and
6	WHEREAS,	while these immigrants come to the United States in hopes of finding,
7		"The American Dream." It is precisely that dream of, "life, liberty, and
8		the pursuit of happiness," that is in jeopardy for all U. S. citizens; and
9	WHEREAS,	while assimilation of the hungry and huddled masses is innate to the
10		democratic experiment known as the United States, "a house divided,
11		cannot stand." The rate of current immigration exceeds the ability of the
12		U. S. to assimilate this large mass of humanity; now, therefore, be it
13	RESOLVED,	that the UIL Congress here assembled make the following
14		recommendation for solution, enact legislation to regain control of this
15		situation for the good of our citizenry and the immigrants; and, be it
16	FURTHER RES	OLVED, that it be considered a most urgent need on the legislative
17		calendar.

9		on public university tuitions; and, be it

10		so as to include the homeless in the definitions section of hate crimes.

A Bill to Declare Illegal Synthetic Cannabinoids and Compound Drugs

1	BE IT ENACTED BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:		
2	SECTION 1.	It is unlawful for any person to knowingly manufacture, distribute, sell, or	
3		cultivate any form of synthetic cannabinoid, compound drug, or sister	
4		compound.	
5	SECTION 2.	A synthetic cannabinoid shall be defined as any chemical compound that	
6		is chemically synthesized and has been demonstrated to have binding	
7		activity on one or more cannabinoid receptors. A compound shall be	
8		defined as anything that is composed of two or more separate elements;	
9		a sister compound shall be defined as any compound derivative of or	
.0		similar in composition to known any psychoactive drug.	
1	SECTION 3.	The government agency overseeing the enforcement of this bill will be	
.2		the DEA.	
13		A. Any violation of an ordinance declared by the DEA on this matter shall	
4		be punishable by a fine of between \$500 and \$5,000.	
15		B. A second offense will be punishable by a fine between of up to	
16		\$100,000 and three years imprisonment.	
17	SECTION 4.	This bill will take effect immediately upon passage.	
18	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

9	RESOLVED,	That the UIL Congress here assembled support the introduction of genetically
10		modified mosquitoes into the wild mosquito population.

- period between the ban being lifted will be handled by that specific
- 8 organization.
- 9 **SECTION 4.** The ban and all of its effects will be lifted by October 2017.
