

A Bill to Apply Laws Justly

- 1 BE IT ENACTED BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
- 2 **SECTION 1**. Any law that reduces the penalty for a crime or legalizes a previously
- illegal activity shall be applied retroactively.
- 4 **SECTION 2**. This bill shall apply to all federal, state, and local laws.
- 5 **SECTION 3.** The Department of Justice shall oversee the enforcement of this law.
- A. Anyone incarcerated for a crime that is no longer a crime or is no
 longer punishable by incarceration shall have their release expedited
 to occur within 30 days after the new law goes into effect. This law
 applies only to serving the sentence. The offender's record will reflect
 the crime as it was at the time of conviction.
 - B. Anyone who has completed a sentence based on the maximum penalties specified in the new law shall have their release expedited to occur within 60 days after the new law goes into effect.
- **SECTION 4.** This bill shall go into effect within 30 days of passage.

- 4 **SECTION 3.** The Federal Food and Drug Administration (FDA) shall be responsible for
- 5 the enforcement of this provision.
- 6 **SECTION 4.** This law shall begin enforcement on January 2016.
- SECTION 5. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A BILL TO PROHIBIT MILITARY SURPLUS

- 1 BE IT ENACTED BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
- 2 **SECTION 1**. Local police forces and schools will be prohibited from acquiring surplus
- materials from the United States military.
- 4 **SECTION 2**. Surplus materials include weapons, vehicles, and protective gear no
- 5 longer required by the military.
- 6 **SECTION 3.** The US Department of Defense will oversee the enforcement of this bill
- by prohibiting the shipment of military surplus to local communities and
- schools.
- 9 **SECTION 4.** The law will be enacted on January 31, 2015.
- SECTION 5. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

14		should demilitarize its domestic police forces and cease all grants of
15		military-grade equipment to local authorities.

A Bill to Ban the Export of Coal Resources

- 1 BE IT ENACTED BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
- 2 **SECTION 1**. Exports of coal resources internationally will be banned.
- 3 **SECTION 2**. Coal exports are defined as coal resources that are sold from domestic
- 4 companies to foreign nations to be used to power industrial plants.
- 5 **SECTION 3.** The Department of Energy will oversee the implementation of this Bill on
- 6 the national level.

A Bill to improve United States currency regulation

- 1 BE IT ENACTED BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
- 2 **SECTION 1**. The United States Government shall replace the dollar bill with the dollar
- 3 coin.
- 4 **SECTION 2**. The Bureau of Engraving and Printing will enforce this bill and be
- 5 overseen by the Department of Treasury.
- 6 **SECTION 3.** This law will go into effect starting January 1st 2015 in every United States
- 7 State and territory.
- 8 **SECTION 4.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to restrict consecutive working hours of health care providers.

1	BE IT ENACTE	ED BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	This bill places restrictions on the working hours of health care providers,
3		limiting consecutive work hours to 16 hours with a minimum break of 8
4		hours between consecutive work days.
5	SECTION 2.	Health care providers are defined as any hospital or health care
6		employees with direct or indirect patient contact. These include all
7		nurses (GN, LVN, RN, NP), all licensed physicians (MD, DO), physicians
8		assistants (PA), and technicians (Radiology, Respiratory Therapy,
9		Laboratory, Surgical, Cardiac Cath Lab) employed by licensed hospitals
10		and clinics.
11		Work hours are defined as any officially recorded and compensated work
12		done by a health care provider in the workplace.
13	SECTION 3.	The enforcement of this bill will be overseen by Joint Commission
14		through audit of employee work history.
15		A. Failure to comply will result in suspension of the individual health
16		care provider's pay for double the time worked outside of the set
17		limit. A second offense will result in a day's suspension from work.
18		The third offense will result in a week's suspension from work. The
19		fourth will result in two weeks of suspension from work. The fifth
20		offense will be grounds for dismissal.

- 21 **SECTION 4.** This legislation will be in effect on January 1, 2015.
- **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Protect Unaccompanied Child Immigrants

1	BE IT ENACTED BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:	
2	SECTION 1.	The US federal government will establish a procedure for processing
3		unaccompanied child immigrants including providing temporary secure
4		shelters.
5	SECTION 2.	UAC is an undocumented person under the age of 16 crossing the border
6		with no parental or other family supervision.
7	SECTION 3.	Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA) will collaborate with Child
8		Welfare to determine a child's placement.
9		A. Anyone 16 years of age or older will be treated as an adult for
10		immigration purposes.
11		B. Child Welfare will attempt to identify the child's parents through
12		cooperation with the government of the child's country of origin and
13		make the necessary arrangements to return the child to his or her home
14		country.
15		C. If the parents cannot be identified, the child's records will indicate that
16		he or she is officially permanently without parents for purposes of
17		immigration.
18	SECTION 4.	This law shall take effect immediately on passage. Any child currently in
19		custody will be processed under this legislation.
20	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Resolution to Increase International Space Cooperation

5		to progress as an economic power; and
6	WHEREAS,	These sanctions harm the citizens of Iran by perpetuating a failing
7		economy and fostering Anti-American sentiment within the middle-east;
8		now, therefore, be it
9	RESOLVED,	That the UIL Congress here assembled make the following
10		recommendation for solution: The US should lift all sanctions on the
11		Iranian economy; and, be it that unless there is a present and clearly
12		proven danger to the United States of America, there should be no future
13		sanctions upon Iran.

A Bill to Revise Dodd-Frank to Lessen Russian Influence on American Companies

1	BE IT ENACTE	D BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	Section 1504 of the Dodd-Frank Act will be expanded to include any
3		payments to and/or from the Russian Government, Russian State-owned
4		companies or Russian subsidiary companies to any company owned or
5		operated United States.
6	SECTION 2.	A. Section 1504 of Dodd-Frank requires that all oil and gas
7		companies disclose all payments to government entities regardless of the
8		potential for illegality.
9		B. Russian state-owned companies or Russian subsidiaries are any
10		company or government that is funded either in part or in whole by the
11		Russian Government, and/or is run by someone who has worked for the
12		Russian government at any time in the past, and/or has any member or
13		former member of the Duma or the Russian government bureaucracy on
14		their board of directors.
15		C. American owned or operated means any company that has it
16		headquarters in the United States or has more than 50% of its workforce
17		in the United States.
10	SECTION 3	The SEC and Department of State will enforce this hill

- A. Any company not in compliance with this bill would be fined \$1
 million for every month when it is not in compliance, with the fine
 doubling every month.
- 22 **SECTION 4.** This bill will come into effect no later than June 12th, 2016.
- SECTION 5. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Fund the Mars Direct Plan to Begin the Exploration of Mars

BE IT ENACTED BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

- **SECTION 1**. 50 billion dollars over 12 years will be appropriated to fund the Mars Direct plan.
- SECTION 2. The Mars Direct Plan is defined as a Mars exploration plan using 2 direct launches from earth to send first, a earth return vehicle powered by propellant produced from Carbon Dioxide in the Martian atmosphere and later, a crew habitat and crew. The plan is considered to be the plan of the same name described in the book The Case for Mars by Robert Zurbin, and on the website and attached report of the Mars Society.
- **SECTION 3.** This funding will be added to the National Aeronautics and Space Administration's budget, and will be used it to ramp up their existing efforts.
 - A. This funding is guaranteed for the 12 year period, and must not be cut off unless in case of grievous and intentional misuse.
 - B. The first mission is loosely targeted for 2024, not including first a single test lunar mission and Martian sample return mission using the same technology, after which in phase 2 \$3.5 billion dollars a year would be used to continue the program.
 - C. The mission will be launched with NASA's 2nd generation Space launch system, and funding from the bill many be appropriated towards the system and used to fast track its development. Funding may also go towards the space science division for the sample return mission.
 - D. Technologies necessary to the program may not receive funding from this bill, and all funding will be cut from that technology if the Government accounting office finds that funds have been sent elsewhere.
- **SECTION 4.** The funding will start immediately and will decrease to phase 2 levels after the first successful mission has been flown.
- **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Create a State Native Seed Programs to Preserve Native Species

1	BE IT ENACTE	ED BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	The Department of Agriculture will design and put into action a grant
3		program for schools and colleges to support the maturing of seeds that
4		are native to each region or ecosystem and help restore habitats.
5	SECTION 2.	"Native Seed" refers to seeds derived from a plant in a particular region
6		or ecosystem.
7	SECTION 3.	The department will be responsible for developing the specific goals of
8		the preservation program, establishing criteria across the state to
9		evaluate the program's effectiveness, and ensuring it is met.
10		A. The goals of the preservation program must include the intended
11		results of the program.
12		B. The department will ensure the criteria are complied with gathering,
13		maintain and analyzing the data of the programs.
14		C. The department will establish a Native Seed Center to catalog, store,
15		and distribute native seeds to the programs. The programs will be
16		responsible for the planting and maintenance of the seeds. All data
17		will be sent to the Native Seed Center to be analyzed and recorded.
18	SECTION 4.	This bill is to be implemented on September 1, 2015.
19	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to allow nonpartisan organizations to set boundaries for congressional voting districts to prevent gerrymandering

1	BE IT ENACTE	D BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	The federal government will appoint non-partisan organizations to draw
3		congressional voting districts.
4	SECTION 2.	Non-partisan organizations will be well-qualified officials who do not take
5		into account demographics and have no political leanings.
6	SECTION 3.	The Federal Census bureau will ensure that states are only drawing
7		district lines in uniform population constituencies.
8	SECTION 4.	The federal government will oversee officials for states to redraw fair
9		districts in time for 2020 United States Census. This process would follow
10		the model of the California Citizens Redistricting Commission which
11		divides California's congressional voting districts.

A Bill to Admit Puerto Rico as a State in the Union

1	BE IT ENACTE	D BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	The qualified electors of the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico are hereby
3		authorized to vote for delegates to form a constitutional convention for
4		the purpose of framing a constitution for the proposed state of Puerto
5		Rico.
6	SECTION 2.	A qualified elector is any citizen of the United States that has resided in
7		Puerto Rico for 12 months immediately preceding the election.
8	SECTION 3.	The State of Puerto Rico will be afforded every right and privilege of
9		being a state within the United States.
10		A. The proposed state will receive equal representation as afforded by
11		two senators in the senate, and the appropriate number of
12		representatives in the House of Representatives that the current
13		population of 3.7 million necessitates.
14	SECTION 4.	The proposed State of Puerto Rico will hold its constitutional convention
15		after the 1 st of January 2015, and be admitted as a state on July 4, 2015.
16	SECTION 5.	All laws preventing the creation of the State of Puerto Rico will be
17		declared void.

Rare Earth Metal Reserve Act (REMRA)

- 1 BE IT ENACTED BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
- 2 **SECTION 1**. A National Rare Earth Metal Reserve will be created to hold 60 million
- 3 cubic meters of each of the seventeen rare earth metals.
- 4 **SECTION 2**. A rare earth metal is one of a set of seventeen chemical elements in the
- 5 periodic table as defined by IUPAC.
- 6 **SECTION 3.** The U.S. Bureau of Mines will enforce this bill.
- A. The Bureau of Mines will conduct a study to determine the best
- 8 location for the reserve.
- 9 **SECTION 4.** This bill will come into effect the day after it is passed, and the Reserve
- should be open within 5 years of passage.
- SECTION 5. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Reform America's Jail and Prisons

- 1 BE IT ENACTED BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
- 2 **SECTION 1**. Prisons and Jails will switch their focus to rehabilitation, remove
- mandatory minimums and increasing funding for prisoner re-entry
- 4 programs by \$5 Billion.
- 5 **SECTION 2**. Rehabilitation is defined as "restoring to useful life, as through therapy
- 6 and education."
- 7 **SECTION 3.** The Department of Justice will be responsible for implementing this bill.
- 8 **SECTION 4.** This bill will be implemented starting at the beginning of fiscal year 2016.
- 9 **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Increase Representation of the Several States in the House of Representatives

- BE IT ENACTED BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
- 2 **SECTION 1**. The House of Representatives shall be constituted of not less than 700
- members from the several States.
- 4 **SECTION 2**. The size of the House will automatically increase after each decennial
- 5 census so that no member represents more than 500,000 citizens.
- 6 **SECTION 3.** The United States Census Bureau shall submit to the House of
- 7 Representatives a recommendation for reapportionment based on
- 8 population after each decennial census.
- 9 **SECTION 4.** The reapportionment of seats will occur Jan 5, 2021 and be used for the
- 10 2022 election year.
- **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

2		phone communication) is as worse as physical bullying, and

5	WHEREAS,	With ending cyber-bullying students will perform better academically,
6		gain a boost of confidence and dramatically end teen suicide; now,
7		therefore, be it
8	RESOLVED,	That the UIL Congress here assembled make the following
9		recommendation for solution: that parents, students, teachers, and
10		schools should submit any cyber-bullying issues and report it to their
11		local law enforcement; and, be it
12	FURTHER RES	COLVED, That law enforcement should take down the social media page of
13		the bully and prosecute/fine them in a court of law.

A Bill to Incentivize Investment in Science and Technology in Singapore

- 1 BE IT ENACTED BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
- 2 **SECTION 1**. The United States Federal Government will substantially incentivize
- foreign direct investment in the country of Singapore.
- 4 **SECTION 2**. Foreign direct investment is defined as a direct investment into
- 5 production or business in a country by an individual company or another
- 6 country.
- 7 **SECTION 3.** The Department of State, in conjunction with the Department of
- 8 Commerce will oversee the enforcement of a 25% corporate tax cut for
- 9 companies that invest science and technology in Singapore.
- 10 **SECTION 4.** This bill will go into effect in the next fiscal quarter.
- SECTION 5. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Compensate Surface Owners for Damages From Mineral Exploration and Production

BE IT ENACTED BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT: SECTION 1. Surface owners shall be compensated when damages to the surface of 2 the land are done in the name of mineral exploration and production. 3 (1) "Mineral developer" refers to a person who acquires a mineral estate **SECTION 2.** or a mineral lease for the purpose of extracting or using minerals from a 5 tract of land for the purposes other than agricultural use. 6 (2) "Surface owner" refers to a person who holds record title to the 7 surface of a tract of land. 8 9 SECTION 3. Surface owners shall be compensated when damage is done to the surface of the land in the name of mineral exploration and production by 10 a mineral developer. Compensation shall be distributed based on: (1) loss 11 of income derived from agricultural use of the land, (2) reduction in the 12 value of the land, (3) loss of access to the surface estate, and (4) loss of 13 the use of the surface of the land. Compensation to the surface owner 14 may be paid for the amount of the damages in annual installments or in a 15 lump-sum payment. 16 This bill is to be implemented on September 1, 2015. SECTION 4. 17 SECTION 5. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void. 18

A Bill to Limit Executive Power by Amending the War Powers Act

1	BE IT ENACTED BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

- SECTION 1. The President of the United States will be required to seek Congressional authorization prior to any use of military force.
- SECTION 2. Use of military force is defined as any aggressive or coercive action taken
 by United States Armed Forces, including, but not limited to: air strikes,
 use of drones and/or deployment of ground forces.
- SECTION 3. If Congress fails to give authorization, no military action will be taken.
 Violation of the act may result in Articles of Impeachment being filed.
- A. The President of the United States will no longer be allowed to pursue up to 60 days of unauthorized military action under an amendment to the War Powers Act of 1973.
- **SECTION 4.** This bill will go into effect on January 5, 2015.
- SECTION 5. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.
