A Resolution to Cease the Production of Disposable Plastic to Protect the Earth's Oceans

1	WHEREAS,	The global environment, which is crucial to the future of the human race,
2		is being threatened by plastics; and
3	WHEREAS,	Approximately 6300 metric tons of plastic waste has been generated as
4		of 2015, 79% of which was disposed of in landfills and the natural
5		environment, according to the National Center for Ecological Analysis and
6		Synthesis (NCEAS); and
7	WHEREAS,	Biodiversity and marine life populations are negatively impacted by the
8		presence of plastics that end up in the Earth's oceans, where the
9		formation of "garbage patches" has become a global concern; and
10	WHEREAS,	Other countries in the international community are combatting this
11		problem by banning plastic production and use; and
12	WHEREAS,	United States fisheries are dependent upon the dwindling seafood
13		populations; now, therefore, be it
14	RESOLVED,	That the UIL Congress here assembled make the following
15		recommendation for solution to ban the production of plastics in the
16		United States.

A Resolution to Implement a Public Option to Increase Healthcare Access in America

1	WHEREAS,	Health insurance costs have reached burdening highs for millions of
2		American citizens; and
3	WHEREAS,	12.4% of adults between the ages 18 and 64 and 5.1% of children under
4		the age of 18 remain uninsured in large part due to said burdening costs
5		of private health insurance; and
6	WHEREAS,	Exploitative insurance providers have caused patients to hold off on
7		receiving care in light of extremely high deductibles and out-of-pocket
8		maximums; and
9	WHEREAS,	Public insurance has been successfully implemented in several other
10		developed nations abroad; and
11	WHEREAS,	The United States Federal Government should bear a vested interest in
12		the health and well-being of all American citizens; now, therefore, be it
13	RESOLVED,	That the UIL Congress here assembled implement a public option for
14		health insurance known as Americare; and, be it
15	FURTHER RES	OLVED, That Americare be allowed to compete with existing private
16		health insurance firms to allow Americans more choice in their health
17		insurance provider.

A Resolution to Restrict Full-Contact Football before High School

1	WHEREAS,	Participation in full contact ("tackle" football) prior to high school
2		potentially puts a child at greater risk of eventually developing and being
3		diagnosed with Chronic Traumatic Encephalopathy (CTE); and
4	WHEREAS,	99% of deceased NFL football players that have donated their brains to
5		be studied have been diagnosed with CTE due to the head collisions they
6		experienced throughout their careers; and
7	WHEREAS,	This condition causes mood swings, increases depression, memory loss,
8		headaches, impulsive control problems, aggression and paranoia in the
9		affected individuals; and
10	WHEREAS,	This diagnosis cannot be given until the football player is deceased and
11		their brain can be studied; now, therefore, be it
12	RESOLVED,	That the UIL Congress here assembled make the following
13		recommendation that full contact football will not be allowed to occur
14		until a participant reaches the high school level of government funded
15		public education.

A Bill to Require Dash Cams to be Mounted in all Vehicles Used by Uber

1	BE IT ENACTE	D BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	Before an Uber driver is allowed to transport a passenger in the vehicle
3		for Uber purposes, a dash cam with a double lens must be installed.
4	SECTION 2.	Dash Cam is defined as a video camera attached to the windshield or
5		dashboard of a vehicle with a double lens, both outside and inside the
6		vehicle.
7	SECTION 3.	The US Department of Transportation will oversee the implementation of
8		this bill.
9		A. The recordings will begin once the Uber service is ordered.
10		B. The recordings will be transferred through an SD card to the Uber
11		database daily via the driver.
12	SECTION 4.	This bill shall be enacted February 1, 2018.
13	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Resolution to Move the Schools' Second Language Classes to Elementary Classes instead of High School

1	WHEREAS,	The current curriculum in the school system has not properly
2		implemented foreign language instruction; and
3	WHEREAS,	Only half of the 20% of bilingual Americans are advanced in a second
4		language creating a gap in fluency from childhood to adulthood; and
5	WHEREAS,	People who are not bilingual are disadvantaged later in their life because
6		of the increased difficulty to learn another language due to numerous
7		obstacles; and
8	WHEREAS,	The best way to solve this problem is to have students learn a second
9		language in elementary school instead of secondary school to increase a
10		student's chance of success in embedding the language; now, therefore,
11		be it
12	RESOLVED,	That the UIL Congress here assembled make the following
13		recommendation to the Department of Education to change the time
14		that all schools receiving federal monetary aid change mandatory second
15		language requirements to elementary school instead of secondary
16		school.

A Bill to Federally Mandate Sexual Education

1	BE IT ENACTED BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:	
2	SECTION 1.	The United States Federal Government shall enforce a basic standard for
3		sexual education nationwide.
4	SECTION 2.	A basic sexual education includes knowledge of human sexual anatomy,
5		sexual reproduction, sexual activity, reproductive health, safe sex, age of
6		consent, reproductive rights, birth control, and sexual abstinence.
7	SECTION 3.	Enforcing sexual education shall adhere to the following:
8		A. This basic curriculum will be required at all schools, public or private.
9		B. Sexual education will be integrated into a required health curriculum.
10		C. Sexual education must be taught by certified individuals.
11		D. No fewer than two (2) weeks may be spent per school year teaching
12		sexual education.
13	SECTION 4.	Effective immediately.
14	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Legalize Euthanasia in United States Hospitals

1	BE IT ENACTE	D BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	Euthanasia as used by physicians will be authorized for use in United
3		States hospitals.
4	SECTION 2.	A physician is one lawfully engaged in the practice of medicine.
5		Euthanasia is the act or practice of painlessly putting to death persons
6		suffering from incurable and distressing diseases as an act of mercy.
7	SECTION 3.	The United States Department of Health will oversee the implementation
8		and enforcement of this bill.
9		A. Limitation- Euthanasia may only permitted for those who have been
10		given six months or less to live, or those only being kept alive by
11		medical intervention.
12		B. Limitation – If the patient is fully conscious and over 18, only the
13		patient must give consent to be euthanized. If unconscious and over
14		18, the patient's family must give consent for the patient to be
15		euthanized. If a minor, the patient and the patient's guardians must
16		give consent for the patient to be euthanized.
17	SECTION 4.	This bill will take effect immediately after its enactment.
18	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Limit the Maximum Speed of a Car via a Governor

1	BE IT ENACTED BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:	
2	SECTION 1.	In the past year, approximately 12,400 people have died due to speeding,
3		which is the cause of about $\frac{1}{3}$ of deadly automobile accidents. 2016
4		proved to be the deadliest year on public roads since 2007. This proposed
5		law will limit the maximum speed of any privately owned vehicle to 85
6		miles per hour through the use of a required governor.
7	SECTION 2.	A governor is an air flow and fuel restrictor that reacts once the limit is
8		reached.
9		The NHTSA stands for National Highway Traffic Safety Administration.
10	SECTION 3.	The agency that will be charged with enforcing this legislation is the
11		NHTSA. The proposed bill shall be enforced by requiring all 2021 new
12		vehicles to come equipped with the governor, and proper use and
13		maintenance of the device can be examined during existing annual
14		required state inspections.
15	SECTION 4.	New 2021 year-model cars will be required to have the governor by
16		January 1, 2021.
17	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to End the Practice of Gentrification by Imposing Urban Development Laws

1	BE IT ENACTE	D BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	Urban developers will now have to provide alternative housing solutions
3		or financial compensation of 200% percent the value of their property to
4		individuals displaced by development. Additionally, homeowners in the
5		proximity of development cannot raise rent higher than 125% of fair
6		market value.
7	SECTION 2.	A displaced individual is a person who is forced to leave their home
8		because of an external force, and not displaced by choice.
9	SECTION 3.	The United States Department of Housing and Urban Development shall
10		oversee the enforcement of this law along with local municipalities and
11		governments.
12	SECTION 4.	The implementation of this bill shall take place by the January 10, 2018.
13	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Create The FedCoin Act of 2020

1	BE IT ENACTE	D BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	The United States government will introduce a new form of
3		cryptocurrency called Fedcoin into the international Bitcoin market by
4		converting \$100 million U.S. Dollars in circulation into cryptocurrency.
5	SECTION 2.	Fedcoin will act under the following provisions:
6		A. Fedcoin will be pegged to the physical United States Dollars (USD) and
7		will be valued as 1USD.
8		B. Fedcoin will be introduced onto international platforms and will allow
9		for foreign and domestic transactions.
10		C. Banks will convert 5% of their Reserve Requirement into Fedcoin
11		through the Federal Reserve.
12	SECTION 3.	The United States Department of Treasury and Federal Reserve will be
13		responsible for regulation and proper implementation:
14		A. The Federal Reserve must establish a two-way convertibility platform
15		that can convert Fedcoin into physical money at a 1:1 ratio.
16		B. The US Department of Treasury will establish a new platform for
17		international and domestic Fedcoin trade.
18	SECTION 4.	Distribution of Fedcoin will begin Fiscal Year 2020 and, by discretion of
19		the Department of Treasury, will be completely distributed by FY2025.
20	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Legalize Industrial Hemp on Federal Level

1	BE IT ENACTED BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:		
2	SECTION 1.	The hemp plant will be re-scheduled and re-defined and the growing and	
3		cultivation of industrial hemp will be legalized on the Federal level.	
4	SECTION 2.	Industrial hemp is a plant of the genus Cannabis and any part of the	
5		plant, whether growing or not, contains a delta-9 tetrahydrocannabinol	
6		(THC) concentration of no more than three tenths of one percent (0.3%)	
7		on a dry weight basis. Industrial hemp can be used to make over 25,000	
8		products.	
9	SECTION 3.	The Department of Agriculture and the U.S Food and Drug Administration	
10		will oversee the growing and cultivation of industrial hemp.	
11	SECTION 4.	This will go into effect 60 days after the passage of this bill.	
12	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Require Preparticipation Cardiovascular Screening for all Secondary School Athletes

1	BE IT ENACTED BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:	
2	SECTION 1.	Each student athlete will be required to take a preparticipation
3		cardiovascular screening before the pre-season practices begin as
4		outlined by the American Heart Association guidelines.
5	SECTION 2.	A. Preparticipation cardiovascular screening: the systematic practice of
6		medically evaluating large, general populations of athletes before
7		participation in sports for the purpose of identifying (or raising suspicion
8		of) abnormalities that could provoke disease progression or sudden
9		death.
10		B. Pre-season: taking place before the regular season
11	SECTION 3.	The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services will oversee the
12		implementation of this bill.
13	SECTION 4.	This bill shall be enacted February 1, 2018.
14	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Modify DACA

1	BE IT ENACTED BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:	
2	SECTION 1.	This bill would codify and expand President Obama's 2012 executive
3		order that illegal immigrants who meet certain criteria would be
4		protected from deportation.
5	SECTION 2.	DACA is the Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals program proposed by
6		the Obama administration in 2012. Individuals who qualified under these
7		provisions are referred to as "Dreamers".
8	SECTION 3.	The US Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS) will oversee the
9		enforcement of this bill through the codification of President Obama's
10		executive order.
11		A.) To be eligible, he/she had to have arrived in the United States under
12		the age of 16 and have been residing in the country since June 15, 2007.
13		They couldn't have been above the age of 30 when the Department of
14		Homeland Security enforces the order.
15		B.) Once the Dreamer has reached the age of 18, he/she must start the
16		process of U.S. citizenship. At the age of 21, the Dreamer will no longer
17		be eligible to renew their status, and if the citizenship process has not
18		been started, the Dreamer will be eligible for deportation.
19	SECTION 4.	This bill will go into effect January 10, 2018.
20	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Ban Bitcoin to Prevent Darkweb Crime

1	BE IT ENACTE	D BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	Bitcoin will hereby be banned to prevent its use for illegal actions.
3	SECTION 2.	Ban – to prohibit, especially by legal means.
4		Illegal – not according to or authorized by the law.
5	SECTION 3.	The United States Federal Government's judicial branches shall oversee
6		the enactment of this bill.
7		A. If caught using Bitcoin, an initial fine of \$20,000 will be given.
8		B. After the first fine, a minimum sentencing of a year in prison to a
9		maximum of 10 years will be given after each new instance of illegal
10		Bitcoin use.
11	SECTION 4.	This legislation shall be fully implemented no later than January 1, 2018.
12	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Remove Pennies from Federal Circulation to Save the Federal Government Time and Money

1	BE IT ENACTED BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:	
2	SECTION 1.	Pennies would be removed from federal circulation.
3	SECTION 2.	Penny refers to the coin worth 1/100th of a dollar.
4	SECTION 3.	The United States Treasury Department will oversee the implementation
5		of this bill.
6		A. The United States Treasury Department will cease production of
7		pennies.
8		B. Pennies will retain their value after this bill goes into effect.
9		C. The United States Treasury will collect all pennies and issue coin and
10		dollar bills for the amount of pennies traded in to be retired.
11	SECTION 4.	This goes into effect January 1, 2019.
12	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Resolution to Legalize Marijuana on a Federal Level

1	WHEREAS,	Marijuana's illegal status is harmful to the wellbeing of United States
2		Citizens and to its economy; and
3	WHEREAS,	Marijuana prohibition laws cost the Government \$20 billion a year,
4		criminalizing marijuana users with 27.6% of overcrowded federal prisons
5		being marijuana-related crimes; and
6	WHEREAS,	Marijuana arrests exceed those for all violent crimes and cripples
7		prospects for jobs, loans, housing, and benefits, which directly affects the
8		US economy; and
9	WHEREAS,	African Americans and Latinos are disproportionately arrested for
10		marijuana; and
11	WHEREAS,	Prohibition fosters an illegal marijuana market that benefits organized
12		crime, drug cartels and gangs; now, therefore, be it
13	RESOLVED,	That the UIL Congress here assembled make the following
14		recommendation to legalize marijuana on a federal level.

A Resolution to Limit the Power of Eminent Domain

1	WHEREAS,	The United States Federal Government reserves the right to seize
2		and distribute private properties to 3 rd party businesses for the
3		sake of economic development; and
4	WHEREAS,	Average but loyal citizens nationwide are spontaneously forced on
5		the defensive for the sake of business rather than public service
6		and additionally have less influence and power in the courts than
7		corporations when it comes to keeping their properties; and
8	WHEREAS,	Loyal citizens are unethically evicted from homes by the Federal
9		Government in the hopes of economic stimulation from private
10		industries unaffiliated with the Federal Government; and
11	WHEREAS,	The preference of the wealthy over the average individual is
12		harmful to the majority of the population; now, therefore, be it
13	RESOLVED,	That the UIL Congress here assembled recommend amending the
14		fifth amendment of the US Constitution to limit domain solely to
15		public works; and, be it
16	FURTHER RESOLVED,	That corporations who wish to claim private properties settle
17		their wishes outside the powers of eminent domain.

A Bill to End Gerrymandering to Prevent Single Party Favoritism

1	BE IT ENACTED BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:	
2	SECTION 1.	A nonpartisan organization will oversee the process of redistricting.
3		A. In 2014, Democrats won 1.4 million votes more than Republicans, but
4		won 46 seats.
5		B. In certain states, the system favors certain parties.
6		C. Members of this organization will be elected and agreed upon by all
7		parties of this legislature.
8	SECTION 2.	Gerrymandering shall be defined as redistricting in order to benefit one
9		political party over another.
10	SECTION 3.	The United States Congress shall work with federal courts to develop a
11		non-partisan organization.
12	SECTION 4.	To be enacted by the next U.S. Federal Election.
13	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Resolution to Amend the Constitution to Abolish Use, Production and Ownership of Nuclear Weapons

1	BE IT ENACTE	D BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	RESOLVED,	By two-thirds of the UIL Congress here assembled, that the following
3		article is proposed as an amendment to the Constitution of the United
4		States, which shall be valid to all intents and purposes as part of the
5		Constitution when ratified by the legislatures of three-fourths of the
6		several states within seven years from the date of its submission by the
7		Congress:
8		ARTICLE 1
9	SECTION 1:	Upon ratification, further and current production of nuclear weapons in
10		the United States shall be indefinitely halted and the dismantlement and
11		disposition processes of currently owned and stockpiled weapons,
12		abroad or otherwise, will begin. In accordance with the Hague
13		Convention of 1907, the Universal Declaration of Human Rights of 1948,
14		The Nuclear Non-Proliferation Treaty (NPT) of 1968, and the Geneva
15		Convention and the Protocols Additional to the Geneva Conventions of
16		1949 and 1977, respectively, the use of nuclear weapons will be, likewise,
17		federally prohibited.
18	SECTION 2:	Due to the cumbersome lengths of time necessary to complete said
19		nuclear dismantlement and disposition processes necessary to disarm
20		and deconstruct nuclear weapons, time must be allotted for "ownership"
21		to fully cease.
22	SECTION 3:	The UIL Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate
23		legislation.

A Bill to Create The ROBOT (Robotic Obfuscation Bandage For Organic Terrestrials) Tax

1	BE IT ENACTED BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:	
2	SECTION 1.	A ROBOT Tax will be placed on automation which displaces American
3		jobs.
4	SECTION 2.	The ROBOT Tax will be the equivalent to that of the income tax which
5		would be paid for a job which could be displaced by the automation's
6		presence. Automation is the process of changing human-labor activity to
7		that of a mechanical or technological system.
8	SECTION 3.	The Internal Revenue Service will oversee the implementation of this bill.
9		A. The labor replaced by automation will be taxed equivalent to that
10		which would have been taxed under Title 20 of the U.S. code, and the
11		entities taxed will be the corporations using said automation.
12		B. The Department of Labor will determine which systems will be
13		deemed as automation.
14		C. All tax revenue collected from the ROBOT Tax will be distributed
15		evenly towards small business subsidies and welfare programs.
16	SECTION 4.	Implementation will occur at the beginning of the first fiscal year
17		following the date of passage.
18	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.
