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A Bill to Ban Open Carry on College Campuses

1	BE IT ENACT	ED BY THIS UIL CONGRESS ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	Eliminate the right to carry a firearm on college campuses.
3	SECTION 2.	The A.C.T. Concealed Weapons Detection System will ensure all students/guests
4		are weapon free
5	SECTION 3.	The Bureau of ATF will oversee the guidelines and implementation of all students
6		to carry a firearm on college campuses.
7		A. Campuses security will receive 2 hours of monthly training and a monthly
8		training test.
9		B. A four-year phase in fulfillment to 100% adherence is mandatory by 2020. The
10		details and timeline of implementation are at the discretion of the individual
11		agencies.
12	SECTION 4.	This plan shall be executed by August 2020
13	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby and declared null and void.

A Bill to Regulate Artificially Altered GMO's to Decrease Potential Health Problems.

1	BE IT ENACTE	D BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	Each state of the United States should study, regulate and stop the process of
3		genetically modified foods.
4	SECTION 2.	Genetically modified foods will be replaced with organic foods, foods that have
5		not been manipulated, or affected genetically.
6	SECTION 3.	The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), along-side with the Food and Drug
7		Administration (FDA), and the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) will
8		oversee all guidelines and implementations on GMOs.
9		A. EPA will regulate GMOs and verify that they're non-toxic to the environment.
10		They will also conduct food analysis to verify findings.
11		B. FDA will be held accountable for regulating safety of humans and animals
12		that have eaten, and/or will eat GMOs.
13		C. USDA has the power to allow access to produce such genetically engineered
14		foods, it is also their job to minimize the issue.
15	No	ote: All agencies have the right to implement new changes at their discretion
16	SECTION 4.	Implementation of this plan will begin January 2017
17	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

- 2 **SECTION 1**. A Bill to mandate all states to increase minimum wage to \$10.10 for all minimum
- 3 wage workers.
- 4 SECTION 2. All employees under the Fair Labor Standards Act must be paid a minimum of
- \$10.10 an hour.
- 6 **SECTION 3.** The U.S Department of Labor will enforce the Fair Labor Standards act with
- 7 renewed wage and ensure all states comply
- A. In cases where an employee is a subject to both the state and federal
- 9 minimum wage laws, the employee is entitled to the higher of the two
- 10 B. Exemptions only apply if addressed in the Fair Labor Standards Act
- 11 **SECTION 4.** Implemented June 2018
- **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Make America Healthy

1	BE IT ENACTED	BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	The United States Federal Government shall enact the following reforms:
3		A. Medicare shall be expanded to include all Americans in order to create a
4		universal single-payer healthcare system.
5		B. Twelve weeks of paid medical leave shall be provided to every working
6		American by all businesses, regardless of total employment.
7		C. This expanded Medicare shall gain the responsibility to set specific,
8		nonnegotiable, caps on prices for services of medical providers.
9		D. All existing bans on the importation of medicine shall be repealed.
10	SECTION 2.	Universal single-payer healthcare shall be defined as a system that encompasses
11		comprehensive healthcare coverage that includes the entire spectrum of
12		healthcare. Paid medical leave shall be defined as leave paid at the same rate as
13		normal employment for that specific employee. This leave may be used for the
14		employee's own medical care, anyone living in the household of the employee,
15		or any persons already encompassed by existing regulations in the Family
16		Medical and Leave Act. Working American shall be defined as any American that
17		works a minimum of 15 hours per week.
18	SECTION 3.	A. The Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) shall execute the
19		expansion of Medicare as well as determine reasonable price caps on health
20		provider services by January 1 of each year.
21		B. The Internal Revenue Service shall increase the Medicare Tax by 9.2% for
22		corporations, 4.9% for households, remove the cap on taxable income on Social
23		Security and Medicare, ending of the tax break on capital gains and dividends on
24		household income above \$250,000, and a financial transaction tax of 0.25% in
25		order to fund this legislation.
26	SECTION 4.	This bill shall be enacted starting January 1, 2018.
27	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Pass the Nuclear Deterrent Protection and Monitoring Act

1	BE IT ENACTE	D BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	The United States nuclear weapon arsenal shall have new oversight, regulations
3		and increased funding.
4		A. The creation of a new Federal Agency, The Nuclear Weapons Oversight
5		Commission (NWOC), shall be implemented to monitor the upkeep and
6		safety of the United States Nuclear Weapons Arsenal, as well as all
7		supporting equipment.
8		1. Every year the commission shall inspect all classified and unclassified
9		military grade nuclear weapons, facilities, and supporting equipment
10		to determine if new safety protocol or maintenance is required.
11		2. All reports made by this agency are to be public with the exception of
12		top secret security level information.
13		3. The Department of Defense (DOD) is required to address any issue
14		found by this agency, and fix them in a timely manner.
15		B. 50 billion dollars will be given to the DOD for U.S. Nuclear Weapons
16		programs over the course of 5 years.
17	SECTION 2.	Nuclear weapons shall be defined as any weapons system specifically designed
18		to deliver a nuclear device in a nuclear strike.
19	SECTION 3.	The NWOC is tasked with enforcement of all regulations and mandated
20		inspections. The commission is to be responsible for all future enforcement
21		regulation of nuclear weapons placed in the DOD.
22		A. The NWOC will work in conjunction with the DOD.
23	SECTION 4.	This law will take effect beginning in fiscal year 2018.
24	SECTION 5. Introduced for	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void. UIL Congressional Debate by Plano West Senior High School.



A Resolution to Revoke the UN Security Council Unanimous Consent Clause to Promote

1	WHEREAS,	The United Nations Security Council veto provision hinders the
2		global goal of democracy and multilateralism; and
3	WHEREAS,	the United States' geopolitical rivals in the five permanent members of
4		the UN Security Council, Russia and China, have used this veto in the past
5		to dismiss important reparations towards their countries for national
6		interest; and
7	WHEREAS,	this has allowed China and Russia to avoid consequences for their actions
8		and involvement in foreign countries which disrupts the global balance;
9		now, therefore, be it
10	RESOLVED,	That the UIL Congress here assembled make the following
11		recommendation to present to the United Nations Security Council an
12		amendment to Article 107 of the United Nations Charter to remove the
13		ability to veto.

5	WHEREAS,	Recognition would allow Rojava to be more active in the international
6		community regarding the issues of ISIS and the Syrian civil war; and
7	WHEREAS,	Rojava has an effective government with no recognition; now, therefore,
8		be it
9	RESOLVED,	The United States government will recognize the Autonomous Cantons of
10		Rojava and urge the international community to follow suit.

A Bill to Clarify Federal Standards to Improve Water Quality

1	BE IT ENACTE	D BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	The Clean Water Act of 1972 is to be amended to include strengthened
3		regulation for non-point sources and all water sources that affect the
4		United States.
5		a) The language "navigable waters" in the Clean Water Act is
6		removed to clarify that the law covers all levels of the
7		hydrological cycle
8		b) The definition of non-point sources in section 502(14) of the Clean
9		Water Act as "any source of water pollution that is not a "point
10		source"" is changed to reflect the following definition below:
11		c) The Total Maximum Daily Load (TMDL) program is reformed to
12		ensure nonpoint source discharges are no longer in a voluntary
13		compliance scenario by including non-point discharge into state
14		and national permit requirements under the National Pollutant
15		Discharge Elimination Systems (NPDES).
16	SECTION 2.	Non-point source pollution is water pollution that results from land
17		runoff, precipitation, atmospheric deposition, drainage, seepage or
18		hydrologic modification. Nonpoint source (NPS) pollution, unlike
19		pollution from industrial and sewage treatment plants, comes from many
20		diffuse sources.
21	SECTION 3.	The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) will oversee the
22		implementation of this legislation
23		A. The EPA will cooperate with state governments to ensure that all
24		entities follow region specific water regulations
25	SECTION 4.	This bill will go into implementation in January of 2017.
26	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

The Puerto Rico Relief and Recovery Act

1	BE IT ENACTE	D BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	The United States Congress will implement the following reforms for the
3		Commonwealth of Puerto Rico in order to address the current debt crisis
4		A. Reform Chapter 9 of the United States Bankruptcy Code to allow the
5		territorial municipalities of Puerto Rico to declare bankruptcy.
6		B. Section 936 of the International Revenue Service Code will be
7		reenacted in Puerto Rico.
8		C. Amend US Code Chapter 48 Section 745 to gradually allow Puerto
9		Rican bonds to be taxed by federal government.
10		D. Amend the Jones Act to allow non-American ships to engage in trade
11		with Puerto Rico.
12	SECTION 2.	A. A territorial municipality is the smallest electoral division in Puerto
13		Rico.
14		B. The Jones Act prevents foreign flagged ships from between the
15		mainland and Puerto Rico from carrying cargo.
16	SECTION 3.	The US Departments of Treasury and Commerce and the IRS will be
17		responsible for the implementation of this bill.
18	SECTION 4.	This bill will go into effect January of 2017, and Section 1.C. will be
19		implemented at the discretion of the Department of the Treasury.
20	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Redefine the Permissible Usage of Restrooms and Locker Rooms in Public and Private Institutions of Education

BE IT ENACTED BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

2	SECTION 1.	If a student of an Institution of a primary, secondary, tertiary, or graduate
3		level education makes the assertion that the student's gender differs
4		from that of their biological sex, and if the student's legal guardian
5		consents to said assertion in writing to a public school administrator
6		unless the student is an adult or emancipated minor, the student shall
7		not be denied reasonable accommodation under any circumstances
8		regarding the usage of restrooms and locker rooms while under school
9		supervision.
10	SECTION 2.	Gender will be defined personally and subjectively, while sex will be
11		defined biologically and objectively; an assertion will be in the form of a
12		written and signed statement requesting specified accommodation;
13		reasonable accommodation will be defined as: a unisex restroom, a
14		controlled or supervised restroom, a single-occupancy restroom, a faculty
15		restroom, or a vacant restroom of the opposite sex, etc.;
16	SECTION 3.	The respective school districts will be responsible for the implementation
17		of this legislation.
18	SECTION 4.	This legislation will go into effect immediately upon approval by
19		Congress.
20	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void
21		or shall be slated for revision by this assembled congress.

A Bill to Refurbish and Improve Hydroelectric Dams in Order to Provide Substantial Electricity and Prevent Environmental Catastrophes

BE IT ENACTED BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT: 1 SECTION 1. All hydroelectric dams and their respective institutions of oversight will 2 individually be granted \$25 Million for the refurbishing of dams to meet 3 safety standards, provide terraced water bridges for the migration of 4 aquatic wildlife, prevent damages to the natural floodplains of rivers, and 5 to install more efficient turbines contemporary with 2015 technological 6 standards. 7 SECTION 2. All projects will be implemented to improve the quality of the dams and 8 their respective environments and served populations equally, without 9 any derivation from intended purposes of producing hydroelectric power 10 and water reserves that do not widely infringe upon local environments. 11 SECTION 3. The Department of Public Works and Urban Development will be 12 responsible for the implementation of this legislation. 13 A. All funds and their application will be subject to an audit by the IRS in 14 ten years' time after the passing of this bill. 15 SECTION 4. This bill will put into effect a state of emergency, demanding that all 16 projects described shall be undertaken immediately and at considerable 17 18 pace. SECTION 5. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void. 19

11		conscious and aware. Today, more and more people are looking for
12		products that are not only unprocessed but that also contain fresher
13		ingredients. Organically grown and unprocessed foods are becoming
14		progressively more available and cost effective in super markets and
15		health stores around the country, therefore food companies need to
16		encourage this and accommodate to what the public is requesting.

A Bill to Remove Minimum Sentencing for Drug Crimes to Prevent Prison Overcrowding

2	SECTION 1.	All mandatory minimums for drug crimes will be removed in order to
3		prevent further prison overcrowding.
4	SECTION 2.	Drug Offenses are defined as any crime where drugs are the sole charge
5		of the crime, it excludes crimes that involve additional charges besides
6		drug charges. Mandatory Minimums, or Mandatory sentences, are
7		defined as a court decision setting where judicial discretion is limited by
8		law.
9	SECTION 3.	The Department of Justice will oversee the implementation of this bill.
10		A. All drug crimes will be sentenced based on the amount of the
11		substance and the context of the crime.
12		B. Any states failing to comply with these federal standards will be
13		formally reviewed by the Department of Justice
14	SECTION 4.	The implementation of this bill will go into effect immediately after it's
15		passed.
16	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void

A Bill to Restructure Corporate Tax Code in Order to Encourage Business Growth in America

1	BE IT ENACTE	D BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	The United States will ensure the growth of current and future
3		companies of America, while also encouraging foreign companies to
4		move into the United States, by restructuring the current corporate tax
5		bracket system so 15% is the new highest tax bracket and all the other
6		brackets are shifted down proportionally.
7	SECTION 2.	Companies are defined as a commercial business. Manufacturing is
8		defined as making something, rather it be a good, product, or something
9		else entirely, on a large scale using machinery.
10	SECTION 3.	The IRS will oversee the implementation of this bill and enforce all new
11		tax and tariff policies.
12		A. Any business found using tax havens will not receive any tax break or
13		subsidies from the federal government, and will be subject to 15%
14		higher taxes if future violations occur.
15		B. Any business based in the US using foreign manufacturing will be
16		forced to pay a tariff equivalent to 5-10% of the good or product
17		value.
18	SECTION 4.	This bill will be implemented at the beginning of the 2018 Fiscal year.
19	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Implement the Nuclear Development for the Future of America(NDFA) to Ensure Long Term Energy Stability for America

1	BE IT ENACTE	D BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	This bill will create a new energy plan, the NDFA, which will be given 500
3		billion US dollars. This money will be used to make new nuclear power
4		plants, research new innovations in nuclear power, fusion being a prime
5		example, and to hire any experts necessary for development and
6		research. This will be done to ensure long term energy stability in the U.S
7	SECTION 2.	Nuclear power is defined as any electric or motor power generated by a
8		nuclear reactor. A nuclear power plant is a facility that converts atomic
9		energy into usable power. Experts are defined as anyone with long-term
10		experience or degrees in nuclear power and infrastructure.
11	SECTION 3.	The Department of Energy (DOE) will oversee the implementation of this
12		bill along with oversight from the Environmental Protection Agency(EPA).
13		A. The DOE will assign experts and all other necessary employees
14		oversee the creation of new nuclear power plants.
15		B. The EPA will have final say over green lighting of new nuclear power
16		plants to make sure there is no high risk of potential catastrophic
17		damage is done to the environment or citizens.
18	SECTION 4.	The bill will go into effect beginning in 2017.
19	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

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A Bill to Curtail the Hacking of Social Media Accounts by Adding New Password Requirements for All Social Media Profiles

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT: 2 SECTION 1. All social media outlets must code and present an additional password option 3 for social media account users via finger print, voice recognition, and facial 4 recognition. The social media account user will be presented with all three 5 options and must choose at least one additional security password. SECTION 2. Social media outlet is defined as any form of electronic communication in which 6 7 users create online communities to share information, ideas, personal 8 messages, and other content; such as but not limited to Facebook, Snapchat, 9 Instagram, Twitter, LinkedIn. 10 SECTION 3. Enforcement will be conducted by the FBI Cyber Division in conjunction with the Computer Fraud Abuse Act. 11 12 A. The user who willingly gives away their password will be issued a citation up to \$10,000. 13 14 B. A person who hacks into any social media account will receive up to 15 ten years jail time and a citation up to \$10,000. 16 C. A monetary citation will be charged to all social media outlets that 17 do not offer the additional password options. Implementation will occur on February 1ST, 2017. 18 SECTION 4. 19 SECTION 5. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

2	SECTION 1.	All location-based augmented reality game software programmers must code
3		the app to crash whenever the speed of the user's phone exceeds the average
4		walking/running speed of 8mph. The reality game software programmers must
5		also code the application to eliminate federal and state properties from
6		incentive-gaining locations within the game.
7	SECTION 2.	Crashing is defined as an automatic resetting of the application. Federal and
8		state properties are defined as locations owned by the United States of
9		America, such as, but not limited to, national parks, memorials, and government
10		buildings.
11	SECTION 3.	The Federal Communications Commission will regulate the location and speed
12		restrictions.
13		A. The first offense will be a monetary citation enforced by the Enforcement
14		Bureau unit within the Federal Communications Commission.
15		B. The second offense will result in the revocation of the user's license of the
16		application.
17	SECTION 4.	Implementation will occur on February 1, 2017.
18	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Increase International Disease Screening for Infectious Disease; such as, but not limited to, Zika Virus and Ebola, for All People Entering the United States.

1	BE IT ENACTE	D BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	All people traveling to the United States after being in an area of an
3		outbreak for an extended period of time must go through a mandatory
4		disease screening before departing for the United States.
5	SECTION 2.	An extended period of time is defined as thirty days or more spent in an
6		infected area. The person is not allowed to re-enter the United States
7		until the screening is cleared by the Unites State Federal Government,
8		which can take up to three weeks.
9	SECTION 3.	The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention will be the enforcement
10		agency.
11		A. The sample tested must be from within thirty days of the date of
12		departure.
13		B. The citizen's passport will be suspended until they are declared clear
14		by a negative test result from the Centers for Disease Control and
15		Prevention.
16		C. Under special circumstances, the results of the test can be expedited
17		to achieve a faster departure.
18		D. The United States has the right to exercise extraterritorial jurisdiction
19		over international airports.
20	SECTION 4.	Implementation will occur for departures on February 1 st , 2017.
21	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Allow the Municipalities of U.S. Territories to Declare Bankruptcy

1	BE IT ENACTE	D BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	This bill will allow municipalities of U.S. territories to file for bankruptcy
3		and gain protection from its creditors while it can address its debts. It
4		would also include territories in the legal definition of municipality.
5	SECTION 2.	U.S. territory is defined under the "Territorial Clause" of the U.S.
6		Constitution in which "The Congress shall have Power to dispose of and
7		make all needful Rules and Regulations respecting the Territory or other
8		Property belonging to the United States." Municipality is defined in the
9		Bankruptcy Code as a political subdivision or public agency or
10		instrumentality of a State, and would be renewed to include political
11		subdivision or public agency or instrumentality of a territory.
12	SECTION 3.	The United States Trustee Program will oversee the enforcement of this
13		law. This program will be funded by the United States Trustee System
14		Fund.

- SECTION 4. This law will take effect on January 1, 2017.
- SECTION 5. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Prohibit Gun Purchases by Individuals Currently Placed on the "No Fly List"

BE IT ENACTED BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT: 1 All individuals currently placed on the Federal Bureau of Investigation's SECTION 1. 2 3 "No Fly List" will be prohibited from purchasing a new or used firearm. Removal from the list will allow a renewal of all gun ownership rights 4 enjoyed by the individual prior to their placement on the list. 5 The "No Fly List" is the document issued and maintain by the Federal 6 SECTION 2. Bureau of Investigation that details individuals that are suspected or 7 known terrorists and forbids them from flying within U.S. airspace. 8 Firearms include all guns currently legal to be owned in the United States. 9 SECTION 3. The Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives and the Federal 10 Bureau of Investigation will oversee the enforcement of the law. 11 Violations of this law will include fines, confiscation of illegally obtained 12 weapons and possible imprisonment. 13 The law will take effect on January 1, 2017 SECTION 4. 14 SECTION 5. 10		from the previous five years.
