TWO FIELD TEAMS FOR LEAGUE WORK

Instruction in Playground Games and League Work Now Available

The University Interscholastic League is able now to announce the employment of two field teams to assist schools in the organization of playground games, preparation for athletics contests, organization of literary and debating societies, and coaching in declamation and the other literary work.

The two teams are composed, respectively, as follows: Team No. 1: Leon Folsom and Miss Amanda Stoltzfus; Team No. 2: W. J. Kirk, and Miss Annie Peevey.

A team is sent to a county only at the request and with the co-operation of the county superintendent of public instruction. The department pays the expenses of the team to and from the county, while the entertainment and transportation of the team is provided for by the county superintendent in co-operation with local communities served.

A fair idea of the work of the team may be gotten by examining the following tentative program, which may be altered, of course, to suit the needs of individual communities:

PROGRAM FOR SCHOOL RALLY (One day and one evening)

9 a. m.—Teacher introduces county superintendent who explains general purpose of School Rally.

Galley Two

9:10-9:30—Talks by University team detailing nature of the Rally and its purpose.

9:30-10—Calisthenics for everybody led by physical instructor.

10-12—Special playground games suitable to the particular school taught and explained to all students, who are divided into appropriate groups according to sex and size. Also indoor games and amusements for the Rainy Day Recess.

12 M.—All are gathered into school room. Short talk on General Hygiene with special reference to eating.

12:30 p. m.—Basket lunch is served.

LEAGUE MEMBERS LIST BY COUNTIES

LEAGUE'S HISTORY AND DEVELOPMENT

From Small Beginning Organization Now Greatest of Its Kind

The University Interscholastic League was organized in 1910 at the State Teachers' Association meeting, as merely a debating league among high schools affiliated with the University of Texas. E. D. Shurter, Professor of Public Speaking in the University, was the originator of this movement which has grown from year to year until it is now the largest as well as the most thoroughly organized league of its kind in the United States.

The organization did not remain long merely a debating league, nor did it for long confine its membership to high schools affiliated with the University. Gradually, more contests were attempted, the organization was expanded to include all public white schools in Texas, new divisions were created, the administration force was enlarged, until it can now be asserted that, judged either from the number of contests scheduled, the number of divisions in operation, the number of county organizations belonging, the area covered, the number of schools enrolled, or the number of contestants participating, it is the largest interscholastic organization in the county. It is the child of the State Teachers' Association, and is organized and conducted on a democratic basis by the public school teachers of the state.

Organization.

Its organization perhaps requires a word of explanation. The administration of the league heads up in the Extension Department of the University of Texas, the director of the Extension Department being State Chairman of the League, and the responsibility for the detailed administration of the League resting in the School and Community Division of the Department, the head of this Division, Roy Bedichek, serving as Vice-Chairman of the organization. Miss Willie Thompson is the League's Secretary, and Treasurer, and Leon Folsom is Physical Training Director. Other members of the Extension force are frequently called in to assist in the

PACKAGE LIBRARY RULES ANNOUNCED

Rigid Requirements Must Be Observed in Interest of All

The Extension Loan Library, University of Texas, has collected a large number of package libraries of the best pamphlet material and magazine articles available on Government Ownership of Railroads. They are loaned to any school in the state that applies for them. The only cost to the borrower is the payment of the postage both ways.

In order that every school entering the debating contests may have an equal chance to use this material, it has become necessary to make the following rules in regard to it.

1. **Person From Whom the Application Must Come.**—The request for the libraries must come from a teacher, librarian, or the president or secretary of a debating club, who will assume responsibility for the fair distribution and prompt return of the material. The person writing for the library should add his official title after his name, such as English Teacher, Principal, Librarian, or President of Debating Club.

2. **Number of Packages That May Be Borrowed.**—Not more than TWO PACKAGES may be borrowed by one school until after the county contests. Then the successful contestants may borrow a library a second time to prepare themselves more completely for the district contests. The only exception to this rule will be in case of cities where there is a large number of contestants and a special request is made by the principal or superintendent. One package contains enough material for a small school where there are not more than six contestants.

2. **Time Limit.**—Package libraries must be returned promptly at the end of TWO WEEKS. No renewals will be permitted. Schools that do not observe this rule the first time the libraries are borrowed will not be allowed to borrow them to prepare for the district contests.

4. **Waiting List.**—If the package libraries are all in use at the time a request is received, the name of the applicant will be placed on the waiting list and a library will be sent as soon as one is available.

5. **Lost Material.**—Borrowers will be expected to pay the actual cost of all material lost.

MAKE NINTH YEAR THE BEST

To leaguers old and young: We are entering upon the ninth year of the League's activities under most encouraging auspices, at least as compared with the past years. Let us hope that both the war and the flu have gone forever. Membership in the League continues to increase in geometric ratio. There are far more counties having 100 per cent membership this year than ever before—just how many our office records do not as yet show.

There are two matters that I wish to stress. First, get every rural school in your county to join the League, and, second, let every school join at once. The latter admonition is too frequently disregarded. Plan in advance for those events that you wish your school to enter and let the pupils begin work towards them. Don't wait until after the Holidays or next spring when the county meet is at hand. There is no reason, for example, why work on the question for debate should unduly interfere with class work, provided the work

is organized in time. The same applies to the newly organized contest in Public Speaking. Use the topics that are prescribed for the extempore speaking and essay-writing contests, page 47 of the Constitution and Rules, for both oral and written exercises in the regular English classes. Any live teacher will at once see how this plan will vitalize the work by relating it to a definite project. In preparation for the spelling matches, use the word lists for regular spelling lessons. Let all teachers that you come in contact with know that the *Leaguer* is not sent to schools until the membership fees are paid.

administration during the rush season of the year, and the following members of the University of Texas faculty compose the state executive committee: E. D. Shurter, Roy Bedichek, L. W. Payne, Jr., L. T. Bellmont and D. A. Penick.

The individual school is the unit upon which the organization is each year built up. Any public white school in Texas that is below collegiate rank and that is under the jurisdiction of, and receives an apportionment from, the State Department of Education is eligible to membership. The individual school becomes a member simply by remitting its appropriate fee to the State Chairman, University Station, Austin, Texas. Upon the payment of the fee, the school becomes a member of the League, is entitled to all publications issued by the League, and is privileged to enter its contestants in their appropriate divisions at the county meet.

The County Committee

This brings us to a consideration of the county organization. It is usually at the teachers' institute that the county organization is formed each year. Place for interscholastic league organization is usually scheduled on the institute program, in accordance with advice from the State Department of Education.

It is usual that the election of officers for the county takes place during one of the early sessions of the institute. The following officers compose the county executive committee: Director General, Director of Public Speaking, Director of Spelling, Director of Essay Writing, Director of Athletics, and Director for Rural Schools. The county superintendent of Public Instruction is *ex-officio* Director for Rural Schools, unless the institute otherwise directs.

During the institute week and thereafter the Director General should endeavor to enroll as many schools and collect as many fees as possible.

It is the business of the county executive committee to set the time and the place for the county meet,

to notify the various schools which are members, and, at the county meet, each of the officers named has direct charge of those contests indicated by his respective title. When the county officers have finished with the county meet and certified the winners to the district officers, their duties in connection with the league work are completed for that year.

The District Meet.

For the purpose of holding district contests, the state is divided into thirty-two districts, each district comprising from four to fifteen counties, depending upon the relative density of the population. The district centers are located with a view to convenience of railroad connections and available automobile roads. The county contests having all been held in March, notification from the district officers are sent out stating the time and the place of the respective district contests, which are all held in the month of April. The winners in the district meet are all entitled to participate in the State meet, which is held at Austin the first Thursday, Friday and Saturday in May of each year.

Events are regularly scheduled and provided for by the League in debate, declamation, extempore speaking, spelling, essay writing, and athletics. Other contests are listed as optional, that is, it is within the discretion of the county committee to list certain other contests at the county meet. This provision is made in order that the machinery of the League may, in so far as possible, be adapted to the needs of the respective counties joining in the organization.

Contests Scheduled.

The contest in debate is divided into two divisions, one for high schools and one for rural schools. The debate in each division is open to both boys and girls without discrimination.

The extempore speaking contest is conducted in one division only, and is open to any pupil who is within the age limits.

The contest in declamation is in six divisions; the first separation is made on the basis of the class of school competing, there being one division for rural schools only, and another division for all other schools. The rural school division is again divided, there being one division for boys and one for girls. The division in declamation, comprising schools other than rural schools, is divided first into one division for girls and one for boys, and each of these is divided into senior and junior divisions. The Constitution and Rules of the organization, sent upon request to any teacher in Texas, explains fully and in detail the basis for all of these divisions.

The spelling contest is conducted in two divisions, one for juniors and one for seniors.

There are four divisions in essay writing, as follows: Rural schools, ward schools, Class A high schools, and Class B high schools. The classification of the schools is made clear in the Constitution and Rules.

The other major division of the

League's activities is concerned with promoting athletic contests. In the county contests in Track and Field events there are two divisions, junior and senior, made on the basis of the age of the contestants. In the State Contests in these events, there are two divisions, made on the basis of the classification of the schools into Class A and Class B. There are no district eliminations in Track and Field, any school in the League being allowed to enter a track team at the final state contest. The district track meet is therefore optional with the district executive committee. On the other hand there are county and district eliminations in tennis for both boys and girls, but there are no senior or junior or Class A or Class B divisions in tennis. Basketball, football and baseball are all provided for in the Constitution and Rules, but these contests end with the county meet and are optional with the county executive committee. In the county contest, there is usually scheduled girls' junior, girls' senior, boys' junior and boys' senior basketball contests as a part of the regular athletic program.

Fees and Rebates.

The fees collected from the various schools are graduated as follows: one, two, and three-teacher schools not situated in an incorporated town, \$1; ward school and schools have four teachers or more and less than 600 white scholastics, \$2; schools have 600 white scholastics, or more, \$3.

The amount collected in fees is returned to the schools in the form of rebate for the railroad fare of those contestants who attend the state meet. In case there is a sufficient amount so collected, the entire railroad expenses of those coming from distant points is returned; if the amount is not sufficient, as large a percentage of the railroad fare is returned as possible.

All of the contests scheduled by the Interscholastic League are educational, and every effort is made to have all schools emphasize the educational feature of the work and not allow it to degenerate into a mere scramble to win. This matter is really in the hands of the individual school teachers—in some instances, the educational features of the work are not properly held in view, but the League furnishes a machinery for guiding and directing the contest principle which is invoked.

The League has proved to be a powerful agent for enlisting the interest of the patrons in the school. The try-outs in the local schools may easily be made a feature of community meetings, and the whole community's interest thus enlisted in the schools.
