Looking Forward

In this last issue of the *Leaguer* for the 1958–59 school year the League Staff extends its thanks to the thousands of school administrators, sponsors, coaches, teachers and students who have expended their time and effort in making this one of the HARTLEY League's most successful years.

Next year the League will celebrate its 50th birthday. Each school will be urged to present a program of some kind during the 1959-60 school year commemorating its activities in the GIRLS' BASKETBALL League program and the number of years it has been active in League work. It would also be a good time to recognize former League champions.

In addition, there are still some men active in school affairs who attended the organizational meeting of the League in Abilene in 1910. Any teachers or administrators who served during those formative years of the League should also be recognized.

What Bounds Authority?

For many years the Minnesota League has had a rule governing the use of intoxicating liquor and the use of tobacco by contestants. Two years ago a proposal to extend the rule to govern "conduct" was defeated.

The penalty for the use of intoxicating liquor is ineligibility for the remainder of the school year. This could be an entire year or only a few days.

The penalty for smoking during a sport season is suspension for three weeks for the first offense; another three weeks for the second offense; and ineligibility for all activities for the yards," "%," etc. remainder of the school year for the third.




