

Houston Fund Now \$15,000

More than \$118,000 in college scholarships is being offered to participants in League literary and academic contests this year by the Texas Interscholastic League Foundation.

Funds for the grants are provided by a number of Texas foundations and individuals.

Houston Endowment, which has given 20 grants of \$500 each for many years, has increased its offering to 20 grants of \$750 each. The recipients will get \$500 upon enrollment in college. A \$250 additional payment will be made when the student enrolls for his sophomore year.



It has been reported that students may arrive and register, stating that their sponsor or their parents will appear later. To avoid any problems, managers have advised the League office that no student or group of students will be permitted to register unless accompanied by adult chaparons.

Misconduct or damage to hotel or motel proprety will be reported to the League office.


Will Be Held At Driskill



League. During his tenure, Dean Eddy has always been impartial and fair in conducting hearings involving League rule violations. Not once, after all the many sessions over which he has presided, has any public school administrator been critical of the manner in which the hearings have been conducted. Perhaps not all have been satisfied with the final decision of the State Executive Committee, but none has complained that he was not given a full, complete, and fair hearing.

In addition to being chairman of the State Executive Committee, Dean Eddy has been called upon to serve as presiding officer at numerous other meetings involving the many affairs and activities of the League. The League is the largest organization of its kind in America. It involves more than 500,000 public school students, thousands of sponsors and coaches, hundreds of public school administrators, and sponsors 26 separate contests, in five conferences, which progress to state championships, many of the contests also providing two divisions, one for PICTURE MEMORY ERROR boys and one for girls. Nor does this list of contests include the morethan 200 events which are provided through the League's Music Competition program.

In addition to the public schools and the League office, 49 colleges and universities cooperate with the League in holding tournaments, meets, and conferences on each of their separate campuses throughout the state.

In aiding and assisting this program, Dean James R. D. Eddy has been a far-sighted and busy man. The public schools of Texas and the general public are indebted to him for his personal devotion and leadership in the educational progrom of the great state of Texas.

Iransfer Rule Under Study

2. Under Rule 3, Section 1, Article III, the League will use the original modification to Article VII, Section 14, the Transfer Rule, has been in effect for appermit re-entry. proximately 35 years. This is the rule which renders football and basketball transfers ineligible for a period of one year after they have changed CONSTITUTION CORRECTIONS schools.

CONSTITUTION CORRECTIONS Final paragraph on Page 13 under Art, IV, Constitution and Contest Rules, should be carried as SECTION 5. Setion 19, Page 121, should read: Mem-berships:—All soloists competing in ap-proved sole events must be members of a band, orchestra or choir that has entered regional music contests. Setion 28, Page 124, should read: Mem-berships:—All ensemble members competing in events listed in Rule 34 must be mem-bers of a band, orchestra or choir (parent organization) that has entered the regional music contest. Members of twirling en-sembles are not required to march in the contest performance. Page 113, Under Classification, add:A— High schools with an average membership of 115-224 students, inclusive, in grades 9, 10, 11, 12. In 1931, M. H. Duncan, superintendent of schools at Lubbock, circularized public schools, proposing a stringent one-year transfer rule. Duncan proposed that "a pupil changing school is not eligible to participate in conference football games until he has been in attendance at that school for one year."

Duncan sent a questionnaire to member schools and received 246 replies. Of this number, 173 or 50% were for the rule and 73 or 30% were against the proposal. Since the survey required that both superintendent and high school principal sign the inquiry card, he found, by counting the individual votes, that 273 administrators or 72% favored the rule and 107 or 28% were against it.

It might be interesting to note that, of the 173 member schools who favored the vote, 164 or 94% favored its becoming immediately effective, in September, 1931, and nine wanted it to become effective a year later.

Recently, the Legislative Council instructed the League office to conduct a separate survey concerning the application of Article VIII, Section 14, and to make recommendations concerning the possible amending of this long-standing League rule. Both the Legislative Council and the League office wish to emphasize the importance of any change being made in this very important eligibility rule.

It's A Great Year

The April Leaguer is the last one for the school year of 1966-67. This has been one of the League's greatest years; in football, basketball, volleyball, track and field, baseball, music, literary and academic contests, and in fact in all League activities, participation has been at an all-time high.

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For the 1967 track and field season, it should be noted that the 330-yard intermedi-ate hurdles will be run in all League meets. This event will replace the 180-yard low hurdles. The 330-yard intermediate hurdles will be run over eight (8) hurdles (height -36 inches), 49.213 yards to the first hurdle, 38.272 yards between hurdles and 12.833 yards from the last hurdle to the finish line. The 330-yard intermediate hurdles will be run in two heats against time, four to the heat in Conferences A, AA, AAA and AAAA. Conference B 330-yard hurdles will the heat in Conferences A, AA, ÁAA and AAAA. Conference B 330-yard hurdles will have six in the finals. In case of ties, the points will be split and a flip of the coin will decide the medal winner. The winners from each region will run in one heat and the other heat will consist of second place winners. Track facilities at Memorial Sta-dium will not permit eight lanes of hurdles around the track at the present time. Only track shoes with short spikes or running shoes will be allowed on runways to the broadjump, the pole pault, and the high jump at the State Track Meet.

POSTSCRIPTS ON ATHLETICS BY DR. RHEA H. WILLIAMS

One of the acknowledged purposes, and perhaps the most important of the American public school system, is to educate and develop in the youth of our country those citizenship traits which will result in a truly democratic American. Many different viewpoints have been suggested to best reach this goal. Practically all educators, however, agree that competitive athletics, properly supervised, offer value in citizenship training to be found nowhere else in the school program.

On the athletic field each student goes through a leavening process which, in its citizenship influences, is far-reaching. Here the fact that his father is the local banker is of no consequence, as he must stand among his teammates and earn his position on the squad by his personal achievement. The athletic field equalizes the rich and the poor, the white and the tan, the Protestant and the Catholic; there exists no class distinction, no favoritism, no political influence. In team sports a student makes the first string by what he can do on the athletic field, his competitive spirit, and his ability to give and take, and for no other reason.
