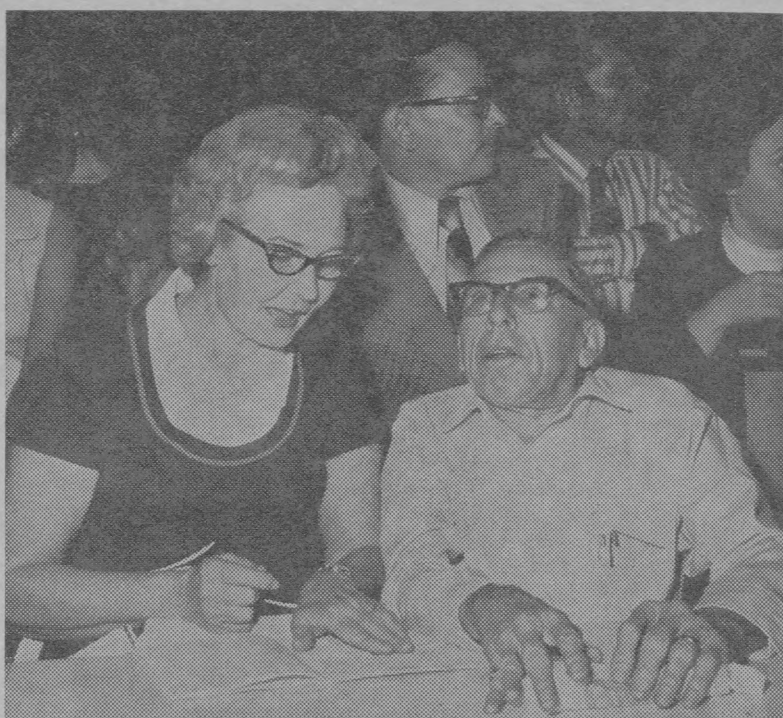

UIL Housing Office Plans Reservations Procedures

The Interscholastic League and the Austin hotels and motels will cooperate again this year in providing housing for the contestants and sponsors coming to the 62nd Annual State Meet, May 4-6, 1972.

Contestants who qualify under Sections 22 and 23 of the Spring Meet Plan, page 38, Constitution and Contest Rules, and their sponsors who request housing through the League office will be assigned accommodations.

Registration of contestants is required, whether or not the League assigns lodging reservations. Registration will be in Thompson Conference Center for all contests, except one-act play competitors who will register at Hogg Auditorium.

Track numbers may be picked up at Thompson Conference Center on Friday, May 5.

Beginning on Monday, April 24, until 5:00 p.m. Monday, May 1, all requests for room reservations for

contestants and sponsors planning to attend the State Meet will be handled by telephone only. The telephone number to call is:

Reservations will be made on a "first come, first served" basis, and your reservation will be confirmed at the time of our conversation.

If you have not made reservations by Tuesday, May 2, assistance will be available at Thompson Conference Center League Headquarters upon your arrival in Austin.

All groups must come prepared to pay for their lodging. If the group was assigned lodging by the housing office, the school will be held responsible for all charges incurred as a result of this assignment, whether or not the rooms are occupied, or as a result of misconduct or damages.

If you made reservations through the League office, do not make double reservations with hotels and motels. You will be liable for the cost of unoccupied rooms.

Hotel and motel managers will report misconduct and damage in-

curred by assigned groups by the housing office to League Officials. These reports will be forwarded to the school involved.

The League has the right to refuse lodging for any students who do not appear to be properly chaperoned. Sponsors are requested to stay at the same housing assignment as the students.

Those requiring one-to-a-room reservations must be prepared to pay the full two-double-beds-to-a-room rate. Only a few single rooms are available.

NO FRIDAY, MAY 5
RESERVATIONS CONFIRMED

All Austin hotels and motels are usually filled to capacity on Thursday of State Meet weekend. No attempt will be made to assign lodging for contestants and sponsors arriving on FRIDAY, May 5.

However, every effort will be made to secure accommodations as soon as possible. Please keep in mind that checkout times vary in hotels and motels, and those arriving before noon on Friday should not expect immediate assignments.

State Meet Parking Must Be Regulated

Because of overcrowding, contestants will not be permitted to bring cars on campus, but will have to park elsewhere. Nor will busses be permitted on campus.

To park and register at League State Meet Headquarters, you should exit from the Expressway 35 (sometimes called the Inter-regional) at Manor Road. Parking space is immediately west of or behind the Villa Capri, which you can see from the Inter-regional Highway. Thompson Center, which

is League Headquarters, is just south of 26th Street, and just east of Red River Street.

Parking on campus will be permitted for setting up typewriters for the typing and shorthand competition, or for picking up the machines when these events are over. Exit from the Expressway on 19th Street. Go west on 19th to Speedway. Turn north on Speedway to first campus booth. The campus officer will direct you where to park while you move your typewriter.

El Paso Eastwood Paper Struck Twice By Errors

Lightning can strike twice. For two consecutive years the Eastwood High School of El Paso Sabre newspaper staff have heard their paper low rated at the Interscholastic League Press Conference convention. Both times the ratings were wrong.

This year the staff heard that the Sabre had been given a third class rating, when they had actually won the highest award given by ILPC, The Award of Distinguished Merit.

"The Sabre is one of Texas' finest scholastic papers," said ILPC Director Max R. Haddick. "The error was mine. I was rushed for time and I just made a mistake."

Haddick cited Mrs. Daisy Meacham, Eastwood High Journalism teacher, and her students for their courtesy and sportsmanship. "When

I called to tell them that I had made the mistake, they were delighted to hear of their winning the top award, but they were so polite and sporting that I felt even worse about making the mistake," Haddick said.

Records at Interscholastic League Press Conference have been carefully checked and corrected to show that Mrs. Meacham and her students have been credited with winning the highest award.

"High school journalism in El Paso is great," Haddick added. "The El Paso schools are leaders in Texas scholastic journalism. I just wish all Texas schools had such fine publications. I am sorry that I made the mistake, but I am proud of The Sabre and the fine students at Eastwood High School."

Coach, Teacher, Administrator

Lee Mitchell Served Schools For 41 Years

Lee Mitchell is retired after 41 years as coach, teacher and administrator—but he and his wife, Ruth, still attend many sports events.

He started his career in 1931 at Thrall as teacher of American History, Medieval History, Ancient History, Civics-Economics and General Science and coach of basketball, football, track and baseball. In his spare time he was also principal.

He coached four years at Thrall, two at Columbus, six at El Campo, four in Athens, two in White Oak, eight in Gladewater, one at Gainesville and five at Columbus on a second tour of duty there. After ending his coaching career at Columbus he moved to East Texas, serving as principal at Wills Point and teaching at Van.

During his career his home won nine district football championships. In 1961 he was named High School Track Coach of The Year by the Texas Sports Writers Association. In 1963 he was elected to the Texas Hall of Fame by the Texas High School Coaches Association.

Mitchell played high school football, baseball and competed in track at Kemp, where he graduated in 1926. He attended Burleson Junior College where he won the state junior college 100-yard dash and was fourth in the 220. He was catcher on the Burleson baseball team.

He married Ruth Tiner and they had six sons, all of whom competed in athletics. Sonny Mitchell scored 34 points in track in one year for White Oak, a record that stood for years. Pat Mitchell ran the 180-low hurdles in 18.4 in 1959 to set a national high school track record.

Bubba is at Dow Chemical in Freeport. Don, an Aggie, is a nurseryman in Huntsville. Mike, also an Aggie, is a captain in the Air Force. Sonny is in Virginia working in construction. Tootie is teaching in Vidor. Pat graduated from A&M.

Mitchell said either he or his wife had attended every event one of their boys participated in, even the SMU-Notre Dame game in South Bend, Ind.

The Mitchells have ten grandchildren. Last July 4 all six of their sons and ten grandchildren visited and made it "one of our happiest times" the Mitchells said.

Track, Field Report Needed

Only the track and field district winners need to be certified by the school to the regional meet. Winners in literary events, tennis, and golf are "certified" by the report the district director forwards to the regional director.

If, for any reason, a contestant of one school can not compete, he should notify the regional director and the alternate who is then entitled to enter in his stead.

Schools Will Vote On Debate Topic

League member schools will this month vote on the final preferential ballot which will decide which of the three following propositions in the "public school financing" area will be the debate problem for the 1972-1973 school year:

Resolved: That a voucher system should be established as the primary means of financing elementary and secondary education in the United States

Resolved: That governmental financing support for all public elementary and secondary education in the United States should be provided exclusively by the federal government.

Resolved: That public funds should be the primary means of financing parochial and secular private elementary and secondary education in the United States.

These proposals will be on the debate preferential ballot, now being voted on by schools. Results will be announced at the State Meet.

Meanwhile, each member school should rank the topics in the order of its choice, then sign and return the ballot to the League office for tabulating. Superintendents may wish to confer with the debate coach before selecting the topic to be ranked first, second, and third respectively.

Grid Practice Limits Cited In Rule 30

School administrators and coaches are reminded that they should read closely Rule 30 of the Football Plan regarding football spring practice for junior high and elementary school grades. The rule states:

"Any high school football team shall be disqualified for district honors the following fall if their school system

(1) holds any preseason football practice in junior high school or elementary school prior to the opening day of school, or

(2) conducts any spring football training either in elementary school or junior high school the preceding spring.

Pupils in the ninth grade may participate in spring football training in Conference AAAA schools provided

(1) that such participation is on a site and at the same time as the high school squad practices and

(2) that said high school is the one which the junior high school students will attend the following fall."

Thanks For Work Done

As we approach the end of the 1971-72 school year, we feel that it would be in order to commend all coaches, sponsors or other personnel who have, during the year, worked with the League program, either athletic, music, drama, or literary, and assure each of these individuals that we appreciate his assistance.

Thousands of young people, from the elementary to the high school level, have competed in League events, have learned what it means to work hard and to give their best, win, lose, or draw, and have been inspired to greater accomplishment through League competition.

The League is constantly amazed that it has been able to carry on its extensive program with so small a staff. More students compete in League events, and the League offers the greatest variety of contests, than in any other state in the union. Thousands of men and women,—coaches, teachers and administrators,—not to mention judges and officials and graders,—have invested much time and effort in the program. Without them, these varied activities could not be carried out. These volunteers (with, possibly, a few draftees) make the League program possible.

May we say to each, "Thank you," and also wish for each a pleasant and happy summer.

Gifted To Compete

During the first weekend in May, hundreds of the most gifted pupils in Texas public high schools will compete in Austin for honors in literary, drama and athletic contests.

For many, the State Meet will be the culmination of years of dedication and hard work. Although hundreds of other talented boys and girls have failed to reach this level, their lives have nevertheless been enriched by working and learning and competing, even if they did not reach the State Meet. The League philosophy is that, even though every one cannot win, every one is made richer by his experience with educational competition.

In tribute to these boys and girls, it should be noted that participation in League activities is purely voluntary and is not part of the school curriculum, nor is it required for graduation from high school. Several thousand young people have put forth the extra effort and have sacrificed their time in order to compete in these athletic and academic contests. The direction and impetus which their initiative has provided will make them better citizens and is evidence of the value and integrity of our youth, often too easily overlooked in the troubled world of today. We are encouraged when we realize that these young people are not content to be "average" but want to make their own contributions to their schools and communities.

Our hats are off to these fine young men and women. They are the "cream of the crop" of Texas youth.

We hope that every school will have special ceremonies honoring these fine students and athletes, who have gone beyond the regular call of duty by seeking and striving and winning in the League's athletic, drama or literary competitions.

League Wins Legal Action

Last month, the League's authority to make a contract for exclusive radio and telecast rights for athletics was challenged by a Texas radio station.

Injunction was sought in Texas federal court in Austin, on the basis that such a contract was in violation of the first amendment,—that is, freedom of the press. After both sides had presented their case, Judge Jack Roberts denied the injunction and the issue became moot.

The plaintiff indicated that he would broadcast the game, even if "delayed." An injunction was prepared, but at the last minute the plaintiff agreed not to pursue this course of action.

The most compelling reason for granting exclusive contract, insofar as the League was concerned, was to procure wider dissemination of the games. For the first time in League history, every single community which had a team in either the boys' or girls' tournaments had a broadcast "back home,"—in past years, coverage ranged from 50 to 60%, with no consistency of coverage; three stations in one community might carry the broadcast and none in another.

From the League's standpoint, there has been no violation of the first amendment, since we have increased rather than diminished the spread of information about the games, reaching all communities from which the teams came, rather than just a few.

POTH JUNIOR HIGH

Poth Junior High School was disqualified from all honors in music for the 1970-71 school year and is placed on probation for the 1972 season for failure to file an acceptance card.

MOORE HIGH

Moore High School of Waco has been placed on probation in football for the 1972 season for violation of the Football Code.

ALVARADO HIGH SCHOOL

Alvarado High School was placed on probation in one-act play for 1972 school year by the district executive committee for violation of the One-Act Play Contest Rules 1-3-2.

DISTRICT JOURNALISM

District Journalism contests will be conducted in the 1972 Spring Meet in these districts: 1, 2, 3, 4, 5 and 16, 17, 18, 19, 20, 21, 22, 23, 24 in Conference AAAA; and districts 1, 2, 3 in Conference AAA, and districts 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8 in Conference AA.

LA JOYA HIGH

The League's State Executive Committee has placed La Joya High School on probation in basketball for the 1972 season for violation of the Basketball Code.

SAINT JO HIGH

Saint Jo High School has been suspended in One-Act Play for the 1971-2 school year for failing to participate in competition after filing acceptance card, under provisions of Rule 1-2-2.

TRAVIS HIGH (AUSTIN)

Wm. B. Travis High School Band of Austin was disqualified from Concert and Sight-reading honors for the 1970-71 academic year, and suspended from University Interscholastic League Competition for the 1971-72 academic year for use of ineligible performers.

SLIDE RULE

The accuraspeed slide rule can not be legally used in League Slide Rule competition.

JOURNALISM ACCEPTANCE CARDS

Journalism Acceptance Cards will not be required for the 1971 Spring Meet Journalism Contests. All League member high schools are eligible to enter the League Journalism contests without any acceptance card.

JOURNALISM CONTEST

The time limit for the Feature Writing Contest has been changed to 60 minutes. There is no change in either judging procedures or contest administration.

BASEBALL RULES, 1972

The League's baseball schools will use the "optional modification" regarding substitution. Base runners will not be required to wear helmets on the base paths.

Aluminum bats are permissible in interschool baseball games for the 1972 season.

TRACK AND FIELD

The 1972 state high school track meets will be held on the tartan surface track in Memorial Stadium. Each participant in the running events, as well as in the field events, will be required to wear spikes that do not exceed one-fourth inch in length.

OAP UNIT SET

The Unit Set, while recommended by the State Office, is not required of any school at any contest level.

LOS FRESNOS-PREMONTE HIGH

Music Theory Notes

Aural Training Need Vital In Competition

Hark! The time draws nigh for sharpening innocent ears in preparation for the contest in June. Probably the main area in which students still need to review is that of ear training, and especially in the category of non-tertial chords.

If your students have written compositions using non-tertial sounds, as was suggested in an earlier Music Theory Notes column, they will already be familiar with the sounds of some of these chords. However, familiar or not, almost any student can use help in developing aural skills in this area.

The portion of the exam involving non-tertial triads is included to help acquaint students with some of the many contemporary sounds they hear in their new band, orchestra, and choral music; in contemporary jazz; and in the music of certain rock groups.

One problem is that there are so many pitch combinations available in new music. In order to limit the scope of non-tertial chords to be included on an exam, only triads (chords containing three distinct pitches) which can be built in stacked perfect fourths or major seconds will be included.

The following list of the various positions of the two chords just mentioned includes all the positions which might be present on the exam.

1. Secundal (can be built in stacked major seconds) triad. Assume that the basic chord is spelled C-D-E. The following are the closely spaced chords which can be derived from it (all chords listed here are spelled up from the lowest note): C-D-E, D-E-C, E-C-D.

2. Quartal (can be built in stacked perfect fourths) triad. Assume that the basic chord is spelled G-C-F. The following are the closely spaced chords which can be derived from it: G-C-F, F-C-G, C-F-G, F-G-C.

These are the only non-tertial chords which will be on the exam, although they may be played at any pitch level. Contestants will not be concerned with pitches, but with the intervals involved. In order to identify a non-tertial chord, the student must identify the exact intervals over the bass; e.g. if E-C-D were played, the student would identify the chord by writing m7/m6 (minor 7th, minor 6th). On the exam each chord will be played two times, the first playing arpeggiated. Obviously this is not an exercise in identifying "chord type," but rather an exercise in interval identification. This is just the sort of problem involved if one is to describe the sounds one hears in some new music.

The 1972 State Music Theory Exam will be much like the 1971 exam, except that church modes

will not be included. Following are the problems for which contestants should be prepared.

Written Skills

1) Identify and write notes in four clefs (treble, bass, tenor and alto) by letter name and octave segment.

2) With the meter signature given, be able to draw the correct note and rest for any requested time value.

3) Recognize and write all major and minor key signatures.

4) Do simple harmonic analysis of four-part chorales, including a few nonharmonic tones.

5) Given a simple melody add one, two or three voices in any style which is consistent within itself.

Listening Important Too

The following items include listening as well as written skills. Be able to construct and to identify by sight and by ear:

1) Meter (or time) signatures according to meter type and beat type (duple simple, triple compound, etc.).

2) One-octave major and minor (pure, harmonic and melodic) and whole-tone scales.

3) All simple (an octave or smaller) intervals. Both melodic and harmonic intervals will be played for aural identification.

4) Tertial triads (major, minor, augmented and diminished). There will be inversions of major and minor triads only.

5) Selected non-tertial triads (see above).

6) All of the following seventh chords: dominant seventh (D7)—major triad, minor seventh; diminished seventh (d7)—diminished triad, diminished seventh; half-diminished seventh (hd7)—diminished triad, minor seventh; major seventh (M7)—both triad and seventh are major; and minor seventh (m7)—both triad and seventh are minor. There will be no inversions of seventh chords.

7) There will also be melodic dictation. The short melody will be played five times; the contestant will be given clef (treble or bass), key and meter signatures, and number of measures.

Forgive us if we take a few days to answer your queries. Thanks for the many fine comments on the convention. Each year we will try to make it better, and the compliments just spur us on.

I commented on the lack of original humor at the convention, and I got a flood of comment and samples back. Many of the samples are great, and I have so acknowledged by sending compliments, certificates, and laughing my head off. Some are not so good. Some are not original. Let's all keep trying. This old world has plenty of gloom, sadness, hysteria and panic. Good humor is the bright and shining effort to make the earth cleaner and more beautiful.

ILPC Workshop

We are working hard to get all the details worked out for the Summer ILPC Newspaper-Yearbook Workshop. You should receive application blanks by the time this Leaguer arrives. The program is still being formed. If you have any suggestions, now is the time to write them in.

This will be a working workshop. We will have a fun session or two, but the emphasis will be on work. Students and teachers will do practical work on yearbooks and newspapers. They will learn more and more ways to improve their publications. The only purpose of the workshop is to make all of you better at your chore of learning communications in all of its aspects.

The cost of the workshop is \$60 for those who will share a double room in Jester. For those wishing single rooms the price is \$70. We try to set the price just high enough to cover expenses. Contest Judging

Each year we try to get the best possible judges for the contests. Naturally there is a subjective element in the rating of newspapers and the Individual Achievement Award entries. For this reason, we do not use the same judges two years in succession. We try to represent all viewpoints in judging.

There is no way that I can change the judges' ratings. They are hired because of their professional ability as shown by education and career accomplishments. I would never overturn a judges' rating, any more than I would even try to overturn a ruling by a football official. Their rulings are final. Of course, if there is an error in addition or subtraction in the making of the ratings, I would correct this mechanical error as quickly as possible.

Feature Writing

The reporter should rarely get into any story, unless he is a part of the event on which the story is based. Our judges reported great overuse of "I," "We," "Us" and similar ways that reporters pushed their own opinions and comments into news and feature stories. This is a basic error.

The final paragraph that says, "It was a great party" or "The team did its very best and we are proud of them" detracts from the story and costs the story in any judging.

Judges also noted that many feature writers were not very familiar with their subjects. They got a few obvious facts, and then started writing. This resulted in fragmentary, incomplete stories. This hurts the paper and the story.

Postscripts On Athletics

Some Rules Critics Seek Personal Goals

Most people will agree that the ideals and standards of our society are being questioned, undermined and attacked. Not all change is bad, but much of the change advocated is not founded in reason or logic. Many who seek to change our society disregard the organization and means of orderly change and improvement.

This applies to the University Interscholastic League organization. We as educators (administrators, teachers, coaches and sponsors) must take a more active and aggressive stand before attacks from individuals and outside groups. These individuals and groups will continue to whittle at and attack eligibility rules and rules for each athletic plan to meet their individual needs. The individuals and groups are not concerned with the effects on the educational programs.

These groups and individuals are concerned with exploiting athletics and athletes to benefit their group or themselves. In some situations over-zealous parent's try to live through their child's life, and other times organizations attempt to use high school athletic teams to promote their organizations, community, or town.

Educators connected with the various League programs have two alternatives.

1. Give in to the pressures and accept rule changes that dilute the value of our programs and consequently our educational system, or

2. Make a concentrated effort to build support for League programs. The only choice we have is quite evident.

We must involve all school personnel and actively sell them on the importance of strong amateur programs. The school personnel should in turn sell the people of the community on the strengths of a well disciplined program. Too many times we hide behind the League rules without supporting them.

The time has come to sell or "sell out!"

Special Rules Apply In State Track, Field

The 1972 Boys' State Track and Field Meet in Austin will be conducted as follows, and schools should make their plans accordingly:

1. In the shotput, discus and long jump, all eight contestants will qualify to the finals.

2. Discus and Shotput—The meet will not furnish instruments. Each contestant may use his own, if it meets specifications, but it must then be in the pool for any contestant to use. A rubber discus is not legal for outdoor meets. Refer to Rule 33 in the NCAA Track and Field Rules.

3. Tartan Surface—All track events and jumping events will be

held on a tartan surface. The maximum spike length that will be allowed is one-quarter inch. Spikes will be checked.

4. 440-Yard Run—This event will be run in lanes all the way.

5. 880 and Mile—These events will be run in lanes around the first turn and then break at the pole.

6. 220-Yard Dash—This event will be run around the curve.

7. 330-Yard Intermediate Hurdles—The intermediate hurdles will finish at the same place as other races around the curve.

8. Mile Relay—The first lap will be run in lanes. The second runner for each team may break to the inside after the exchange.

Baseball Tournament Will Be Held June 8-9

Play-Off Schedule

June 3—Last date to determine regional baseball champions, Conferences AAAA and AAA.

June 8, 9—State Baseball Tournament, Conferences AAAA and AAA.

June 9—Last date to determine Conferences AA and A regional champions and Conference B bi-district champions.

State Tournament

The State Baseball Tournament will be held in Austin at Nelson Field, located just north of Highway 290 (Houston Highway) in the northeast part of Austin.

The Conference AAA semi-final games will be played in the afternoon on June 8, with the AAAA semi-final games following that night. There will be no third-place games in the State Tournament this year.

The AAA championship will be played Friday evening June 9; the AAAA championship game will follow immediately.

Ticket prices for this tournament will be \$1.50 for adults and \$1 for students per session. Each school is allowed one reduced-price ticket for the State Baseball Tournament. This ticket will be priced the same as a student ticket.
