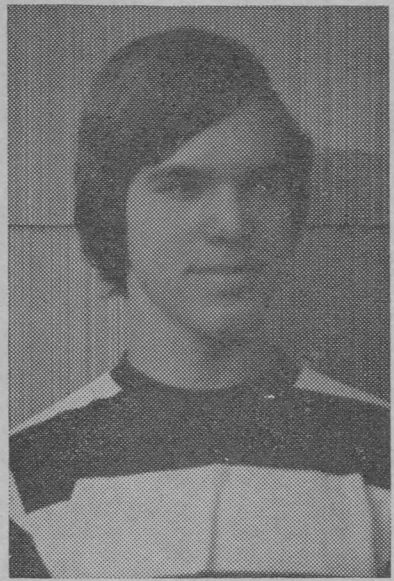


## State Basketball Playoff Schedule Announced

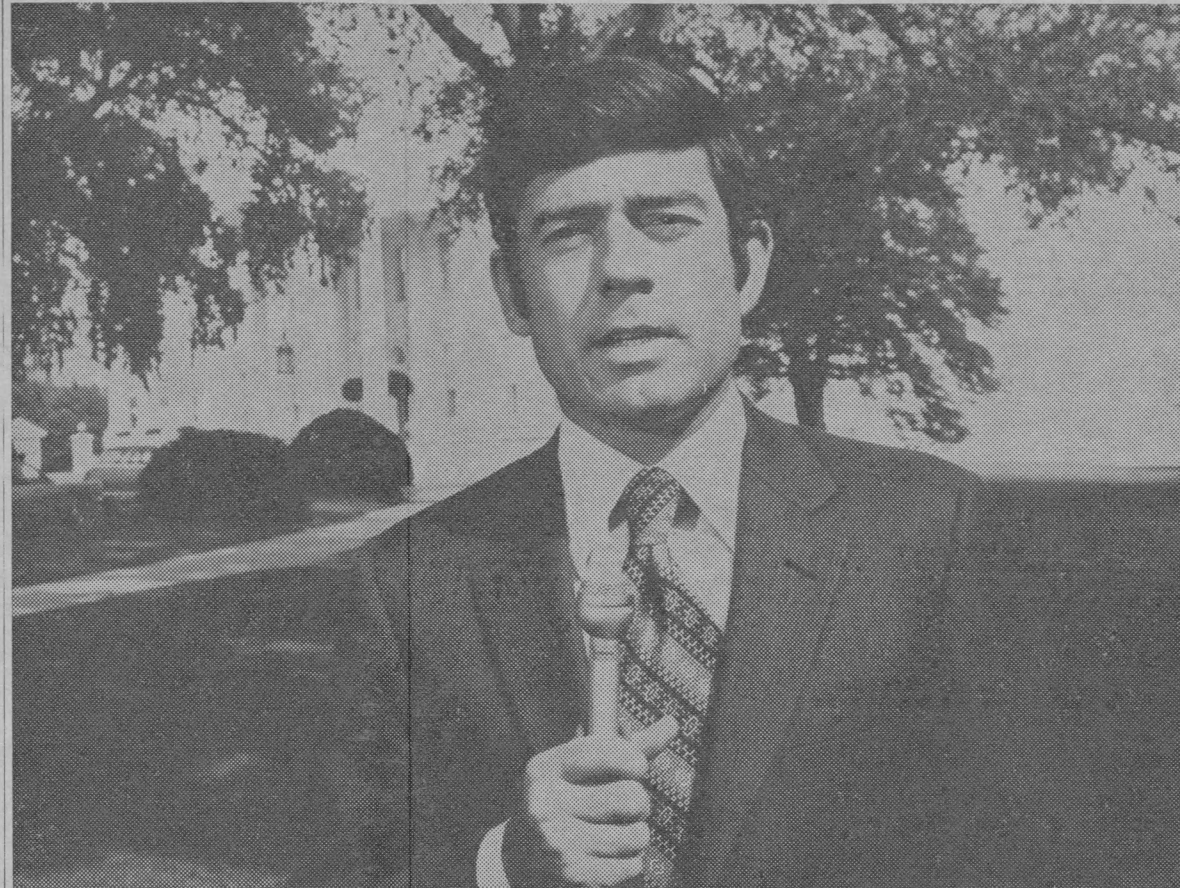
He plans a career in business administration in chemical engineering and will attend Stanford, the University of Pennsylvania, or Rice.

CBS NEWSMAN DAN RATHER will be the speaker at the ILPC Awards Banquet on March 17. The native Texan has had a distinguished career starting in this state and going on to national prominence. His experience in printed media as well as electronic media, give him a broad outlook on the problems and challenges of communication today.

### CBS' Dan Rather To Speak At ILPC State Convention

CBS News White House Correspondent Dan Rather, recognized as one of the most knowledgeable reporters and analysts of national politics, will be the speaker at the Awards Banquet of the 46th Annual State Convention of the Interscholastic League Press Conference at the Villa Capri on March 17.

Rather is anchor man of the CBS Sunday News. He started anchoring the CBS Sunday News on Nov. 15, 1970, and has been White House correspondent since Feb. 1964, except for a 21-month stint in 1965 and 1966 as CBS London Bureau Chief.

#### Convention Coverage

He was anchor man of the Midwest desk for CBS News' Election Night '70 coverage, and was floor reporter at both the Republican and Democratic National Conventions in 1964 and 1968. It was at the 1968 Democratic convention in Chicago that Rather took a nationally televised punch to the midsection, delivered by a security guard who had been evicting a delegate from

Georgia from the convention hall. Rather appeared on CBS News' year-end "Correspondents' Report" in December, 1970, and he is regularly on hand for CBS News Summary and Analysis following Presidential news conferences and speeches. He appeared on the CBS News Special, "Meet the New Senators" in 1971 and accompanied President Nixon on his European trip in September 1970.

#### To Network in '62

He joined CBS News in 1962 as Chief of the Southwest Bureau in Dallas, and he became White House correspondent after he distinguished himself as CBS News' key correspondent in Dallas during and after the assassination of President Kennedy in 1963.

Rather began his career in journalism in 1950, working as an Associated Press reporter in Huntsville, Texas. He was also a reporter for United Press International (1950-52, KSAM Radio (Huntsville, 1950-

53), KTRH Radio (Houston) and the Houston Chronicle (1954-60) plus being reporter-writer for KTRK-TV (Houston) in 1959. Before going to CBS, Rather was director of news, special events and public service for KHOU-TV, CBS Television Network affiliate in Houston.

#### Sam Houston Graduate

Rather received his B.A. degree in journalism from Sam Houston State College in Huntsville. He also attended the University of Houston and South Texas School of Law.

He was married to the former Jean Goebel. They have a daughter, Robin, and a son, Daniel.

"I am delighted that we can get Dan Rather for our speaker," said Dr. Max R. Haddick, ILPC Director. "He has the experience and the ability that make for an outstanding career in journalism and a great speaker."

### Education Centers Aid In League Conferences

Educational service centers at two locations have aided the League and host schools in planning and staffing the fall student activities conferences.

### Girls' Track Plans Due

Schools will be assigned to girls' track districts in January. These districts will not coincide with the Spring Meet Districts as there are only two conferences in girls' track.

Schools that are assigned to conferences AAAA, AAA and AA for the Spring Meet will be assigned to Conference A for the girls' track program.

Schools assigned to conferences A and B for the Spring Meet will be assigned to Conference B for the girls' track and field.

Approximately 674 schools have accepted the girls' track plan. The regional meets will be held April 27 and 28. Regional sites will be named in February.

The State Meet will be held May 11 and 12 in Austin.

### Regional Committees Select Dates, Sites

For the 1971-72 school year each region in Conference AAA Boys' Basketball has a Regional Chairman appointed to serve with the district winning schools in determining which method will be used in selecting a regional champion.

The regional Committee may elect to play a tournament at a site and time determined by the Regional Committee, or they may elect a regional play-off series. The regional play-off series may be paired and played under the following schedule:

Using Region I, AAA, as an illustration, the winner of district 1AAA plays 2AAA, and 3AAA plays 4AAA in a one-game play-off to be played either on February 19 or 20 at sites to be selected by participating teams. The winners in each case will then play a one-game series on February 23 or 24 at a site to be determined by the two participating schools.

In case there is a tie vote as to what procedure shall be used, the chairman will break the tie by casting his vote.

#### Regional Chairman

Conference AAA regional chairmen are Region I, Districts 1-4, Bill Vardeman, Supt., Levelland, and Region II, Districts 5-8, Wilburn Echols, Supt., Gainesville. Also, Region III, Districts 9-12, Kenneth Welch, Supt., Columbia-Brazoria, West Columbia, and Region IV, Districts 13-16, Drew Reese, Supt., Pleasanton.

#### Conference AAA (Girls)

In Conference AAA for girls, in Region I, Districts 3 and 4 will play each other in a one game play-off on February 12 or 13. The winner of this game will play the District 1 winner for the regional championship on February 16 or 17.

In Regions II, III and IV the odd-numbered districts will play the even-numbered districts in a first-round regional game, with 3 vs. 4, 5 vs. 6, and 7 vs. 8 on February 12 or 13.

The winners of the first round will play each other for the regional championship on either February 16 or 17.

#### A and AA Championship (Boys)

The following schedule for selecting regional champions in Conferences A and AA, Boy, has been authorized by the State Executive Committee for the 1973 season.

There will be a one-game play-off for the A and AA boys on February 19 or 20 to determine which team will qualify for the regional tournament to be completed on the following Saturday, February 24.

#### B and AAAA Championships

The odd-numbered district winners will play the even-numbered district winners in a first-round elimination on February 26 or 27. The survivor of the first-round game will advance to the respective regional tournament to be completed on the weekend of March 2 and 3.

#### B, A and AA Girls

For the girls there will be a one-game play-off on February 12 or 13 to determine which teams will qualify for the regional tournament, to be completed the following Saturday, February 17.

This will mean only four teams will be represented at the regional tournament in Conferences A and AA for boys and girls and in AAAA for boys. In Conference B there will be eight teams in each regional meet.

In each region for both boys and girls in all classes, the bi-district game will be between odd-numbered and even-numbered districts; e.g., 1 will play 2; 3 will play 4; and 5 will play 6.

## Drug Abuse, Poverty, World Affairs Proposed 1973-1974 Debate Topics

Drug abuse, poverty and world affairs are the three major areas selected by the Advisory Council of the National University Extension Association for the 1973-1974 high school debate.

Dr. Rhea H. Williams, representing the League, with the assistance of debate coaches Cecil Trainor of Louise and Mrs. Peggy Caravantes of Gregory-Portland, represented Texas at the selection sessions. Each year two debate coaches from Texas are invited to assist the council in evaluating suggested debate areas and topics.

#### AREA I: Drug Abuse

In view of the extreme problem of drug abuse and the work being done in this area, the selection of drug abuse as the first topic was made. The first problem area is: What should be the policy of the United States government toward drug abuse and control?

Discussion questions are:

1. What controls should the federal government establish to regulate the sale, use and possession of psychoactive drugs having drug abuse potential?

2. What should be the policy of the federal government toward the treatment of drug addicts?

3. How should the sale, use and possession of psychoactive drugs be controlled?

#### Suggested Debate Resolutions

Suggested debate resolutions are:

Resolved: That the federal government should legalize and control the sale of all psychoactive drugs having abuse potential.

Resolved: That treatment for all persons addicted to psychoactive drugs should be provided by a national system of drug rehabilitation.

Resolved: That the sale, use and possession of all psychoactive drugs having abuse potential should be controlled exclusively by the federal government.

#### AREA II: Poverty

The second topic area selected is: What should be the role of the federal government in extending public assistance to all Americans living in poverty?

Under this area the following discussion questions were formulated: 1. What should be the role of the federal government in guaranteeing a minimum income for all citizens?

2. What should be the responsibility of the federal government toward providing for the employment of United States Citizens living in poverty?

3. To what extent is the reduction of poverty a public responsibility?

Suggested Debate Resolutions

Suggested debate resolutions are:

Resolved: That the federal government should guarantee a minimum annual income for each family unit.

Resolved: That the federal government should provide a program for the employment of all employable United States Citizens living in poverty.

Resolved: That the federal government should enact a program of comprehensive welfare for United States citizens living in poverty.

#### AREA III: World Affairs

The third topic area was: What should be the role of the United Nations in world affairs?

Discussion Questions are:

1. How can the United Nations

more effectively maintain peace in the world?

2. What should be the role of the United Nations in the administration of non-military aid?

3. What should be the role of the United Nations in achieving a stable world population?

Suggested Debate Resolutions

Suggested debate resolutions are:

Resolved: That the United Nations should establish a permanent peace-keeping force.

Resolved: That the United States should administer all non-military assistance between or among sovereign nations.

Resolved: That the United Nations should develop and implement a plan to achieve a stable world

#### Preferential Ballot

The University Interscholastic League annually mails a preliminary survey to its member schools, asking that they vote on the problem area which they consider most suitable for debate. Once the area is determined, a later preferential ballot is sent. Results of this preferential voting establishes the actual debate proposition in the area first voted upon.

Each topic must be "ranked" or the ballot cannot be counted. Since the preferential ranking determines the results, incomplete ballots cannot be counted in the tabulation. It is very important that ballots be returned by the date designated if they are to be included in computing results.

### Green Book Correct One For OAP

"The Sixth Edition of the Handbook For One-Act Play Directors, Judges and Contest Managers with 1972-73 Addendum is the correct one to use for this year," said Lynn Murray, League director of drama.

The cover of the green book carries the number 7017 and the date, Sept. 1, 1970, but it is correct for this year. The number and the date are there for compliance with second class mailing regulations and do not determine the date of the book's use.

Some directors had reordered thinking that the Sixth Edition was obsolete. Murray asked that any director having the sixth Edition not order a replacement. Supplies are very limited.



## Time Of Beginning Again

An old fairy tale has, as its setting, the "land of beginning again." Adults no longer believe in this land, but every new year brings us an opportunity to take account of our accomplishments and failures, our dreams and our goals.

If the year we have finished has been good, let us be thankful. If it could bear improvement, let us, like the impatient prince in the children's story, try to begin again.

May we take this opportunity to wish for you the double blessings of earning and achieving happiness, of being friendly and finding friends, of setting goals and working toward them. The opportunities we find and the talents we have vary from person to person, but each of us has received 365 days for 1973. We hope you find yours filled with happiness and prosperity.

## The Code Of The Best

Football and basketball officials are subjected to a great deal of verbal abuse during their respective seasons—both from the stands and sidelines—and the time to put a stop to this sort of cheap dramatics is now.

Upholding the League's Football Code is a serious responsibility, one that is shouldered by every school administrator. It cannot be shirked without accepting the consequences. Pains should be taken to educate parents, students, athletes, and just plain fans that the League cannot, and will not, tolerate abuse of officials.

Disrespect with the officials is, perhaps, the right of the fan, but disrespect, especially when actively displayed, is another matter. It will be dealt with according to League regulations and invariably will end with disqualification, suspension or probation for the responsible school.

## Educational Competition

Throughout the years, the University Interscholastic League has been the prime promoter of educational competitions. A few individuals and some schools have objected to the Interscholastic League competitive program in the high schools. These individuals do not realize that school life may unnecessarily shield students from realities. All too often, students have been graduated from high school still ignorant of, and unprepared for, the stiff competitions they will encounter as soon as they leave their own schools.

It needs to be recognized that public schools, through competition for grades, for achievement in athletics, for school honors, for places of distinction, have been serving a most useful purpose in preparing their students for the defeats and the victories to come later in life.

The League, as it pauses to observe its 63rd Anniversary during the 1972-73 school year, is proud of its record, and is looking forward to many more years of beneficial service to the public schools of Texas.

## Are Exceptions Justified

Each new school year brings dozens of telephone calls to the MSHSAA office inquiring about the possibility of making an exception to the standards adopted by the schools for interscholastic activities. The most frequent requests are based on exceptions to the: (1) transfer standards; (2) academic standards; and (3) citizenship standards. The common reason given for asking for most exceptions is that it would be beneficial to the individual to be allowed to participate.

When an exception is requested, consideration must be given as to whether it will benefit both the individual and all other individuals. It may have the immediate result of being satisfying to the individual for whom the exception is made, but the question must be raised as to whether his attitude will be influenced more from the experience of participating than from knowing that he has been excused from meeting a standard that other students meet. Does he sympathize with the player who is sitting on the bench because of his being permitted to participate? Will this lead to later exceptions being expected and the developing of an attitude of nonconformity?

Careful attention must be given to the possible psychological effects upon other students who will realize that an exception was made for a particular student and he does not have to meet a particular standard that others meet. Will this have the effect of minimizing the significance and values of standards? If a student is permitted to participate whose citizenship is questionable, will this enhance or be detrimental to the developing of proper attitudes toward good citizenship? It is questionable whether an exception will have a good psychological effect upon this great majority when they finally understand that greater concern has been given to an individual who fails to meet the standards that they meet.

Standards must be reevaluated from time to time on the basis of whether they are in the best interest of the majority. No one individual should be given any more consideration than another. When standards are in the best interest of the great majority, exceptions will seldom be psychologically sound!
