Anderson, Bellaire Win State Swimming Tourneys

Anderson High School of Austin won the Girls' State Swimming Championship with 32 points. Bellaire of Houston was runner-up with 26 points, and White of Dallas accumulated 24 points for third place.

Bellaire High School of Houston won the Boys' State Swimming Championship with a team total of 50 points. Runner-up Clear Lake of League City scored 44 points, and Lee of Houston accumulated 25 points for third place.

UIL To Give Housing Help First State Meet Only

The Interscholastic League office and the Austin hotels/motels will cooperate this year in providing housing only for the first weekend that contestants and sponsors come to the 65th Annual State Meet, May 1, 2, 3, 1975, (Literary, Girls' Track and Field, Golf and Tennis, and One-Act Play—April 29-May 3).

Contestants who qualify under Sections 22 and 23 of the Spring Meet Plan, Page 38, Constitution and Contest Rules, in the above-named events, and their sponsors who request housing beginning on Wednesday, April 30, or Thursday, May 1, through the League office will be assigned accommodations. (Also One-Act Play, April 29-May 3).

Registration of contestants is required, whether or not the League assigns lodging reservations. Registration will be in Thompson Center for all contestants, except One-Act play competitors who will register at Hogg Auditorium.

Housing Telephone

Beginning at 8:00 a.m. on Monday, April 21, until 5:00 p.m. on Friday, April 25, all requests for room reservations for contestants and sponsors planning to attend State Meet will be handled by telephone only. The telephone number to call is: Area Code 512 477-0928.

Reservations will be made on a "first come, first served" basis. Your reservation will be confirmed at the time of the conversation, provided your request for housing be-

gins Wednesday, April 30, or Thursday, May 1.

If you are unable to secure housing prior to State Meet, assistance will be provided at League Headquarters at Thompson Center.

All groups must come prepared to pay for their lodging. If the group was assigned rooms by the League housing office, the school will be held responsible for all charges incurred as a result of this assignment whether or not the rooms are occupied or as a result of misconduct or damages to the hotel/motel property.

No Double Reservations

If you make reservations through the League housing office, do not make additional reservations in other hotels/motels for this same group. You will be liable for the cost of unoccupied rooms.

If the League accommodations are not satisfactory to your contestants and sponsors, cancel the reservation with the hotel/motel, and advise the League office that you have done so.

Schools Responsible

Hotel and motel managers will report misconduct and damage incurred by any group assigned to League officials. These reports will be forwarded to the school involved.

The League has the right to refuse lodging for any students who do not appear to be properly chaperoned. Sponsors are requested to

stay at the same housing establishment as the students.

If you request rooms for one person, we suggest you come prepared to pay the rate for a "two-double-beds" to a room accommodation.

FRIDAY, MAY 2

NO RESERVATIONS WILL BE CONFIRMED

All Austin hotels and motels are usually filled to capacity on Thursday of State Meet weekend.

NO ATTEMPT WILL BE MADE TO ASSIGN, OR CONFIRM, LODGING FOR CONTESTANTS AND SPONSORS ARRIVING IN AUSTIN ON FRIDAY, MAY 2.

Telephone calls received in the housing office for reservations beginning on Friday, May 3, may be noted. Details such as the number of persons, type of accommodations needed, etc., will be listed only; however, **NO CONFIRMATION** can be granted.

The League Headquarters office at Thompson Center on Friday, May 2, will provide assistance in securing rooms. Please bear in mind that checkout times vary in hotels/motels, and those arriving before noon on Friday should not expect immediate room assignments.

May 1-3, May 9-10 Both State Meets

The League's 65th annual State Meets are scheduled for the weekends of May 1, 2 and 3 for academic, literary, girls' golf, tennis and track and field, and May 9 and 10 for boys' golf, tennis and track and field events. One-Act Play is scheduled for April 29 through May 3.

Most contestants and sponsors will register at League Headquarters at Thompson Center for events scheduled for May 1, 2 and 3. Registration will begin at 2 p.m. on Thursday, May 1. Thompson Center is west of the Villa Capri Motel and readily accessible from the Interstate Highway 85.

One-Act Play

One-Act Play participants will register on the day of their contest at 7:30 a.m. at Hogg Auditorium. Conference B One-Act Play competition will be on Tuesday, April 29, Conference A on Wednesday, April 30, Conference AA on Thursday, May 1, Conference AAA on Friday, May 2 and Conference AAAA on Saturday, May 3. Participants will receive instructions and their delegates tickets when registering at Hogg Auditorium.

Track and Field

Girls' track contestants who arrive on Friday, May 2 will pick up their track numbers at the stadium.

All contestants competing during May 1, 2 and 3, except those in drama, will register at the League Headquarters in Thompson Center.

Boys' track contestants will register on May 9 and 10 at Memorial Stadium, Gate 6 and receive their track numbers at that time.

Delegates Meetings

Sponsors and coaches of literary and academic events will meet at Thompson Center for events scheduled for May 1, 2 and 3. Registration will begin at 7:30 a.m. in Room 2-102, Thompson Center. Administrators and girls' athletic coaches will meet at 7:30 a.m. in Thompson Center, Room 1-126 on Saturday, morning May 3.

There will also be a meeting of administrators and boys' athletic coaches at 7:30 a.m. in Thompson Center, Room 1-126 on Saturday morning, May 10.

All delegates are welcome at these meetings. Results of the debate preferential ballot and of the April referendum will be announced at the meeting at 7:30 p.m. on Thursday, May 1.

Results of various contests will be posted on the bulletin boards in the lobby at Thompson Center, as soon as they are announced. This will include literary and tennis events.

State Meet Parking Must Be Regulated

Because of overcrowding, contestants will not be permitted to bring cars on campus, but will have to park elsewhere. Nor will buses be permitted on campus.

To park and register at League State Meet Headquarters, you should exit from the Expressway 35 (sometimes called the Interregional) at Manor Road. Parking space is immediately west of, or behind the Villa Capri, which you can see from the Interregional Highway.

Thompson Center, which is

League Headquarters, is just south of 26th street and just east of Red River Street.

Parking on campus will be permitted for typing and shorthand competition, or for picking up the machines when these events are over.

Exit from the Expressway on 19th street, go west on 19th to Speedway, turn north on Speedway to the campus booth. The campus officer will direct you where to park while you move your typewriter.

LIBRARY NEEDS HELP

Don't put money or letters in library rate packages. Return packages when due. Notify us when packages are delayed getting to you. ILPC Director Max Haddick presented the award, and said, "Never before have so many people been so earnestly involved in the honoring of a teacher with this award. We have had hundreds of letters from all over the world, telling of the wonderful work Mrs. Steward has done. We are all proud of her."

Service Award

Mrs. Minnie McGee, journalism teacher at Forest Park High School of Beaumont, was given the ILPC Service Plaque in recognition of her work with ILPC, Journalism Education Association, workshops, and her outstanding teaching.

Edith Fox King Distinguished Merit in Teaching awards were presented to Mrs. Lorene Denney of Austin Reagan, Mrs. Bette Titlow of Brenham High, Mrs. Marjorie Walraven of Corpus Christi Carroll, and Miss Yvonne Matthews of Humble High School. These awards are presented to those teachers who have distinguished themselves through outstanding teaching records. Mrs. King presented the awards.

Magazine Award

A special Magazine Excellence Award plaque was presented to Lincoln King, adviser, and the staff of Lobolly Magazine of Gary High School. Dr. Haddick said the award came as a result of the great work of Lobolly in preserving the cultural heritage of Gary and Panola County.

"I hope that more Texas publications will follow the lead of Lobolly," Haddick said. "We need to work hard to preserve our history and culture now."

As we approach the end of the 1974-75 school year, we feel that it would in order to commend all coaches, sponsors or other personnel who have worked with the League program, either athletic, music, drama, or literary, and assure each of these individuals that we appreciate his assistance.

Thousands of young people, from the elementary to the high school level, have competed in League events, have learned what it means to work hard and to give their best win, lose or draw, and have been inspired to greater accomplishments through League competition.

The League is constantly amazed that it has been able to carry on its extensive program with so small a staff. More students compete in League events and the League offers a greater variety of contests than in any other state in the union. Thousands of men and women—coaches, teachers, and administrators—not to men judges and officials and graders, have invested much time and effort in the program. Without them, these varied activities could not be carried out. These volunteers (with possibly, a few draftees) make the League program possible.

May we say to each, "Thank you," and also wish for each a pleasant and happy summer.

Coaches Have New Home

The League would like to offer our congratulations to the Texas High School Coaches association upon their acquisition of a new headquarters office building in Austin. It is an excellent facility, easily accessible, which should bring more coaches to their headquarters.

The League, school administrators and coaches form an essential triangle in providing educational athletic activities. The League, as one side of the triangle, serves as a base for organization and direction, with administrators forming the second side, contributing general policy, eligibility rules, contest rules and educational philosophy. Coaches provide the third side of the triangle by providing leadership and instructional skills in athletics.

It is essential that the League, administrators and coaches maintain high levels of moral and ethical character traits in order to justify high school athletics as being truly educational. All must provide personal examples of good moral and ethical conduct. It is not what you say but what you do that counts.

Athletics Are A Bargain

The word "money" plays a big role in high school sports. And it's a word, and a role, which needs some clarification. A recent communication out of the office of Clifford B. Fagan, executive secretary of the National Federation of State High School Associations, does a good job in one snappy sentence of putting interscholastic sports and the money problem in focus:

"Interscholastic athletic programs are not the educational frills, but educational staples. Money spent on athletics is not an educational extravagance, but an educational bargain."

The letter from Fagan to state associations like the League all over the country goes on to say that "money spent for expanding athletic programs remains a pittance in comparison to the total school budget."

Support for this last point is made by calling attention to fact that only .69 of 1% of the entire school budget in the in the City of Madison, Wisconsin, is used to subsidize interscholastic athletics.

"We challenge any other area of the curriculum to effectively operate a program for so many students at even twice the cost," writes Fagan.

He goes on to say: "Athletics are successful as educational tools because instructors and participants interact in emotional situations where they are visibly and measurably accountable for their performances. Athletics are perhaps the most economical way of reaching and effecting positively great numbers of boys and girls."

Another recent article in the State Journal, this one an interview of Gene Calhoun, member of the Board of Education in Madison, includes these remarks:

"I suppose it is always possible in a terrible budget pinch that some people who don't understand values might want to cut the athletic program, but I think parents and people in the community would rise up and insist that it continue . . . If you lost athletics, you would lose one of the supportive pillars. You would lose people who support the whole program."

"Understanding values" really is the key to the whole problem of money as it relates to interscholastic athletics or, for that matter, as it pertains to anything. The question we must ask ourselves ultimately is: "Are we getting our money's worth?"

"Where can you get a better bargain than an Interscholastic Activities program for less than 1% of your total school budget?"

ILPC Workshop Will Be Aug. 3-7

The Interscholastic League Press Conference Summer Publications Workshop will be held at UT Austin in Jester Center from Aug. 3 through Aug. 7.

There will be instructional sequences in newspaper, yearbook, photography and special teacher sequence. The workshop is designed to provide as much practical work as possible, said Director Max R. Haddick.

Tuition for the workshop has been tentatively set at \$75 for those staying in double rooms and \$85 for those staying in single rooms. Dr. Haddick said, "We are trying to keep costs low and will not be able to set the exact rate for another week. We will mail full information to all schools in two weeks."

One-Fee Only

The only fee will be the tuition which includes room, board and instructional costs. Those who register for photography will have to pay a small additional amount for their film and paper which is not furnished. All photographic chemicals and darkroom equipment will be furnished.

Students will arrive at Jester Center on Sunday, Aug. 3, and will leave about noon on Thursday, Aug. 7.

Instructional Staff

Haddick said he is proud of the instructional staff that has been assembled for the workshop. Col. Chuck Savege, Prof. Mario Gar-

cia, Miss Patricia Clark, Prof. Bill Seymour, James F. Paschal, Haddick, and a number of others have already signed up to teach.

A limit of 500 students has been set, due to housing and instructional facilities limits. Last year 486 attended. Haddick said reservation would be made on a first come, first served basis. He added that Austin area students not staying in the dorm would be tuition only, the amount to be announced in the mailings.

One Fun Session

"We will have only one fun session," Haddick said. The last night of the workshop students and teacher may attend a final carnival, auction and party session. Haddick said that he felt that all would enjoy the whole workshop, but that the work schedule for all would be heavy.

There will be a special workshop area open to all students. This will be open until midnight, for those who wish to work late.

"This will be an instructional workshop," Haddick said. "We are not trying to provide a party. It is designed for serious students and teachers who want to increase their communications knowledge and skills."

"No students will be allowed to attend the workshop unless they come with an adult adviser," Haddick said. "This is basic League policy, and it must be observed."

1975 Is History, 1976 Our Promise

The 1975 ILPC convention is history. It was great. More than 100 sessions and about 3600 delegates are the record. The ratings have been announced. The Individual Achievement Awards Winners announced. Now is the time to assess our year and our progress.

I firmly believe that all who compete are winners. Those who make the top ratings are rewarded and inspired. Those who make lower ratings are shown areas in which improvement can be made. I feel that 1975 was our best year yet. The competition, both in publications and in the individual contests was the stiffest.

But all the critiques and rating sheets are without value if we do not profit from them. We all have to study our work and see how we can make 1976 even better. Look honestly at your scores and critiques. Even those rated at the top are not perfect. There is always room for improvement. Now is the time to set standards and lay plans for making your own work and your publications better and of greater educational value.

An Honest Look

The convention was great, but we have already started scheduling sessions for 1976. We are never satisfied. I know that we fell short in some ways. You know of other ways we can improve our convention. Please write me your suggestions. Don't be afraid of hurting my feelings. I want to make ILPC the finest journalism association possible. Your suggestions will help.

One problem is students and advisers who come to Austin, but do not attend sessions. This is wrong. We are not trying to provide you with an excuse for

Music Matters

1975 In Music Was A Very Good Year

I had written a letter to Aunt Floss attempting to explain some of the contest rules and regulations. For example, why a 10th, 11th, or 12th grade student can't play in a Class III ensemble; or a student in an interschool contest outside of the UIL can't accept an award exceeding \$20, or any amount if the same student received a school jacket for participation in any other League activity. And, explaining the difference between a "meet" and a "contest" is almost impossible.

She didn't understand that a "meet" could be one contest of several. For example, several bands in a parade where an award is given for the group who travels the furthest distance, or for the largest band, is a "meet" but if no award is given—no contest—it is not a "meet." Her final reply was: "They had to meet somewhere to start the parade." About this time I gave up and let her have the last word.

There is no way I could explain that unless the meet was for a contest, it was not a "meet" at all. Anyway, I wanted to write about the contest year because this is the last column for the 1974-75 school year.

"It Was a Good Year"

When history reviews music in Texas, I believe that this will be a vintage year. Several important decisions were either made or accepted. Not all of them were directly related to the contest, yet, indirectly they will impinge forcibly upon what the contest becomes.

The position of TMEA and MENC, although not a League function, has been reflected in the maturity of thinking toward music in the schools. Whether a cause or effect, I cannot say, but there appears a stronger bond of band-choir-orchestra directors toward unity instead of the separate fraternalisms that have so frequently permeated other times of stress. There is a feeling of interdependence kind of confidence that comes with maturity, with having been tried and won.

Adjudication Workshop

For the past year our adjudication workshops have shown a decided change of attitude. Participants have more openly criticized the taped performances especially in terms of interpretation, style and musical awareness.

Medium Ensembles

With the initiation of the me-

dium size ensembles, we have broken ties with the classical past and opened the doors to contemporary instrumentations and now music. In the experimental ensemble, we have recognized the traditional processes.

A New Breed

Probably the most encouraging observation of 1974-75 was the kind of young men and women who have joined our forces. It was a thrill and a sort of satisfaction to watch them at the convention. They had that aggressive—hungry look of determination and self-confidence. Obviously, most of them knew why they were there and where they were going. There is no doubt in my mind as to the future of music in education in Texas as long as these young people maintain their impetus.

Yes, I told Aunt Floss that this had been a good year. The inter-regional ratings were better balanced than in previous years. No one region dominated the state contest ratings. Outstanding organizations were found in all regions; good individual performers came from all parts of the state as evidenced by the All-State organizations and TSSEC.

There were over a 100,000 in 1974-75 solo-ensemble contests; 1328 bands, 1107 choirs and 130 orchestras representing 1539 schools. Although these statistics are impressive, it is the quality of performance levels in which we have pride!

Questions And Answers

Q. If a student athlete visits a college or university and does not pay for his/her own transportation, room, board, or entertainment, is he/she in violation of League rules?

A. Yes, if the purpose of the trip is to discuss the possibilities of receiving financial aid at a later date for participation in athletics for the college. A student who violates this rule would be ineligible for all athletic activities for a period of one year from the date of the violation.

Q. May boys' track competitors wear hats or head bands?

A. No. This is not a part of the traditional track uniform, and a runner should not be allowed to run with a hat, cap or head band. If a head band is needed to keep hair from the contestant's eyes, he should use a string. Also any jewelry or wearing apparel that may come off or in any way affect another runner must be removed prior to the start of a race.

Q. Is it a violation of League rules for athletes to wear school owned blazers or game jerseys at pep rallies or assemblies?

A. It is not a violation of Article VIII, Section 8, the Amateur Rule, for football players to wear school owned jerseys or blazers at football or pep squad rallies, but it could be a violation if these are worn all day or all week.

Q. Under Article VIII, Section 19, the Five Year Rule, how are years counted?

A. Years are counted consecutively (whether or not the student is in school) from the time of first enrollment in the eighth grade for as many as two subjects. At the conclusion of the fifth year from his first enrollment in the eighth grade the student becomes ineligible for further League participation. (Note: Article VII, Section 8, the Composite Rule)

Q. May a student that changes schools be eligible for League activities if his parents do not move into the school district to which he changes.

A. No, a student changing schools is not eligible in League contests whose parents reside outside the school district, until he shall have been in attendance at the school or in the school system to which he changes for one year immediately preceding the contest.

Q. If a student is not passing in three subjects seven days prior to an athletic contest, is he eligible?

A. No, Article VIII, Section 3, states that a student must be passing three subjects seven days prior to any athletic contest.

Q. May a student participate in a rodeo, win a prize of valuable consideration, and remain eligible for UIL athletic activities?

Yes. Rodeo was removed from the Amateur and the Awards Rule.

Q. Under Article VIII, Section 19, the Semester Rule, how are semesters counted?

A. Semesters are counted consecutively (whether or not the student is in school) from the time of first enrollment in the eighth grade for as many as two subjects. At the conclusion of the tenth semester from his first enrollment in the eighth grade the student becomes ineligible for further League participation. (Note: Article VII, Section 8, the Composite Rule)

Q. If a student is not passing three subjects seven days prior to an athletic contest, is he eligible?

A. No, Article VIII, Section 3, states that a student must be passing three subjects seven days prior to any athletic contest.

Q. May a student that changes schools be eligible for League activities if his parents do not move into the school district to which he changes.

A. No, a student changing schools is not eligible in League contests whose parents reside outside the school district, until he shall have been in attendance at the school or in the school system to which he changes for one year immediately preceding the contest.

Medics List Essentials For Football Training

Is your boy one of the several hundred thousand American youngsters who will soon be "going out" for football at his junior high or high school?

If so, you will be vitally interested in the American Medical Association's pointers that will help to insure that your boy is properly conditioned for this vigorous sport.

Pre-Season Exam

Beginning with a satisfactory pre-season medical examination, there is no substitute for requiring a standard of physical fitness that assures sufficient strength and endurance, a good level of skill, and adjustment to hot and humid weather before exposing any individual to the rigors and risks of tackle football.

Some of the AMA recommendations are aimed at coaches, but some of them are for the individual players.

Conditioning Program

Boys should follow faithfully a personal conditioning program during the summer, based on information gained through the school's health and physical education classes plus some specific training for football.

At least the first week of practice should be limited to non-contact drill with emphasis on conditioning and fundamentals. Shorts, T-shirts and football shoes are the recommended training gear in this period because of the heat. The boys also should wear their mouth protectors to become accustomed to them.

The second week should include only controlled body contact drills and avoid wide-open play. Practice games or game-condition scrimmage should be avoided until after at least two weeks of practice. A minimum of three weeks of carefully planned practice should precede the first regular game.

Football A Privilege

Some further thoughts—Participation in interscholastic football is not a right, but a privilege, for those who can demonstrate the high level of physical and emotional fitness necessary to play aggressively, skillfully, and with sportsmanship. Participation in schoolboy football should not detract from keeping up with a broad-based physical education program and from sampling other sports during the off-season.

Concern by school boards. Concern by superintendents. Concern by principals. Concern by coaches and sponsors of all league activities.

Concern about what? The concern is about your program, one of the finest in the nation. Is it possible that there are forces working against, rather than for, the high school activity programs?

Last year in Texas, there were over 750,000 participants in league activities, yet you must overcome some challenges that spell trouble for these activities. While you might not think it to be true in your school, sports and activity programs can be in jeopardy. Threat come from:

* Efforts by vested interests, overzealous fans and parents who would challenge any and all of your standards of conduct and eligibility in the courts.

* Unruly fans, young and old, whose conduct at contests infringes on the rights of others and even endangers their lives.

* Those that would make your program a political football and take it from you and others who are trained to guide and lead youth.

* Taxpayers who vote against increased revenue for their schools.

The Texas state high school league is primarily concerned with activities direction and with the establishment of controls to insure sane athletic and activity programs. In an attempt to avoid excesses which would certainly grow without desirable controls, it is necessary for member schools to set policy, rules, regulations and standards to govern the activities.

Limits Unpopular

Such limits are often unpopular with those who believe in unlimited sports promotion and who give little thought to the underlying principles

The instruction provides for participants to concentrate on one group of activity, drama or debate, and one University Interscholastic League individual event. The instructional period will end with a play festival and final rounds of debate.

University faculty, experienced high school teachers, and guest teachers will staff the workshop.

UT Drama Workshop Will Begin June 5

The University of Texas at Austin Department of Drama will sponsor its 13th Annual High School Theatre Workshop from June 11 to July 5.

The workshop will emphasize instruction in acting, stagecraft, makeup, voice, dance, with special lectures in costume design, directing, theatre history, lighting, scene design, and play writing.

New Facilities

Classes will be held in the air-conditioned Drama Building and

Laboratory Theatre. Department of Drama faculty and guest instructors will conduct the instructional activities of the workshop and direct productions. Professional playwrights, directors, and actors from the E. P. Conkle Workshop for playwrights will serve as guest lecturers and discussion leaders.

Students who will be sophomores, juniors or seniors in September 1975 are eligible. Enrollment will be limited to 20 boys and 20 girls. Applications must be made prior to May 19, and a \$40 registration fee will be required for each workshop participant. Workshop students will reside in air-conditioned Jester Center Halls and be supervised by resident University counselors. Workshop counselors will live in the dormitory in both the boys and girls sections.

Three plays with workshop personnel will be presented the final two days. The plays will be directed by Jerry Worsham, drama director, Snyder High School; Robert Singleton, drama director at Anderson High School in Austin; and Joe Manry, instructor of drama at The University of Texas at Austin.

Courses for Teachers

Special Workshop courses for drama teachers interested in developing individual talents and teaching skills will be offered. Eight semester hours of credit may be obtained by registering as a "transient" student for drama courses F365, F276 and F605a, devised to parallel the workshop program.

Those seeking hours in drama to comply with the TEA plan for drama teacher certification, or to meet local requirements will benefit greatly. The workshop will better prepare teachers for play production activities, for participation in the UIL One-Act Play Contest and for teaching the variety of theatre subject areas needed for the new quarter system.

The 49th State Meet One-Act Play Contest will conclude the largest and finest drama competition in the country and will begin our golden anniversary celebration. Join us for the new five-day, 40-show, five-conference competition. I'll look for you at Hogg Auditorium April 29-May 3, in Austin. If you include Broadway, Off-Broadway, and Off Off-Broadway, you might find 40 shows playing in New York or perhaps you could find as many in London.

You and your students are cordially invited to be with us. Eight Conference B plays will begin our celebration on Tuesday at 4 p.m. The final four B productions will follow at 7:30 p.m. At the conclusion, Conference B winners will be announced and awards will be presented. The remaining four conferences (A, AA, AAA, AAAA) will follow in sequence through Saturday. Some entries at the State Meet OAP contest will win four times to get to the top. Join us for the conclusion of a most unusual and gratifying year!

Admission per session is \$1 for students and \$2 for adults. Delegate passes will be provided for all State Meet participants.

Handbook Addendum

No new HANDBOOK will be published this year! The ADDENDUM for 1975-76 to the HANDBOOK FOR ONE-ACT PLAY, Seventh Edition, will be published in September.

It will include all changes made for this year and one major change voted by the Legislative Council last November. 1976 One-Act Play Directors must be full time employees of the school system! There will be other administrative changes approved by the State Executive Committee. The Title Entry deadline will be earlier, new plays will be added to the Lists, and corrections made in administrative operation.

Do Not Order

Please don't order a new OAP HANDBOOK, because it will be a duplicate of the current gold version. Stop your administration from making automatic order for this publication. Almost 3,000 have been used in two years. We have less than 1,000 for 1975-76 operation. Hang on to your HANDBOOK FOR ONE-ACT PLAY, Seventh Edition. There will be no replacements after stocks are expended.

Proposed Changes

Three proposed changes for OAP were made by the Texas Educational Theatre Association advisory committee. These changes will be reviewed by the Legislative Council's Literary and Academic Committee next fall and passed along with their recommendation to the full Council meeting Nov. 2.

The following were passed by the committee to be presented:

1. The Contest Manager shall not be a participating one-act play director in that contest. (Addition to Rule 3,b)

2. The League-Approved Unit Set should be provided at the contest site. (Revision of Rule 2,b,5)

3. Four company understudies as substitutes for the possible 15 cast and three crew members may be certified as eligible. These four may be used only to replace an existing company member. (Revision in Rule 2,b,3)

What's Your Opinion

One-act play directors at the TETA convention felt strongly that a contest manager at any contest should not be a participant. Many recognized they would still organize zone and district OAP, but felt someone else should serve as the "official" contest manager. What is your reaction?

The League-Approved Unit Set is a matter of discussion where OAP directors gather. Hundreds of schools have built or bought part or all. Most directors feel the Unit Set should be strongly encouraged for each contest site, but not required.

The addition of four eligible understudies seems to complicate an already full OAP Eligibility Notice. Oh yes, we plan to use the current stock. We have enough forms for about three years of operation. Even with the administrative problems of having to use old forms and list 19 names in only ten blanks, the idea has merit and I support this recommendation.

The intent is to allow the understudy to participate as a company

member only as a substitute for one of the maximum 15 cast or three crew. The recommendation is not to load backstage areas with more people. The idea is to provide a method of replacing vital personnel. What is your judgment? Do you visualize complications?

Your opinions concerning the three TETA recommendations and other suggestions for OAP change should go to Cheryl Allen, Drama Director, Winnie: East Chambers High School. Send a carbon to me. Thirty copies of all recommendations to the Legislative Council must be submitted to the State Office 30 days before the Nov. 2 meeting. No recommendations from any individual or organization will be otherwise considered.

The TETA proposals and other OAP problems will be discussed at director's meetings during drama sessions at the nine student activities conferences planned for next fall.

Conference Sites

The sites are Austin, Huntsville, Odessa, Houston, Arlington, Kilgore, Canyon, Kingsville and Wichita Falls. A general program will be in the September LEAGUER. OAP sessions will focus primarily on the role of the director in the One-Act Play Contest. There will be a variety of programs at some sites in addition to the major focus.

The only critic judging workshop planned is during the annual convention of the Texas Educational Theatre Association, the first week of February at Southern Methodist University, Dallas.

Play Writing Contest

The Texas Educational Theatre Association and affiliate Texas Secondary Theatre Conference and Texas Creative Dramatics-Children's Theatre Conference is sponsoring its third annual one-act play writing contest. One category is for plays generally suitable for the OAP Contest. Playwrights of Texas must submit an approximately 40-minute play in English for a cast of not more than 15 actors that can be simply staged.

All scripts must be unpublished and rely inherently on dialogue and action. Details of the contest may be obtained from Dr. Ralph Culp, Division of Drama, North Texas State University, Denton. Hurry! The deadline for entries is May 31, 1975 and there is a cash first prize this year!

Return Questionnaire

Return your critic judge and unit set questionnaires to the State Office. They are vital to OAP evaluation. At the same time, send along any new ideas. We are interested in your comments about the contest and your suggestions.

Postscripts On Athletics

Ethics In Athletics Endangered By Few

What has happened to ethical standards in athletics? Those of us in athletics have prided ourselves in that we have not lowered our principles and have maintained high ethical and moral standards, especially during the past few years of rapid social change. We pride ourselves in that we offer a program for young men and women that is above dishonesty and deceit—a program that will help to mold the type of character that we would like for our leaders of tomorrow to possess.

Have we been as pure as we like people to think? Probably the large majority have, but there are always a few who put winning games, matches, and meets above everything else. Who suffers? Usually the young men and women who are in the program suffer when coaches resort to the "win at all costs" attitude.

Unofficial Reports

There have been unofficial reports that

(1) Some coaches do not follow League rules regarding workouts during the off-season;
(2) Coaches allow players to participate whom they know have violated a League rule;
(3) Coaches offer to buy films of opponents from coaches at schools that have played that opponent earlier;

(4) Coaches hire people to film games of future opponents;
(5) Coaches teach illegal techniques and plays and actually spend time practicing these illegal acts to disguise them so that officials cannot detect them during games; and
(6) Coaches call officials prior to the game to discuss how the game should be called.

The above-mentioned practices do not cover all the unethical practices, but these are the ones that have been reported to the League Office.

The Players Suffer

If a coach is guilty of using these types of techniques, who suffers? For the most part, athletics in general suffer, as the "anti-athletic" patrons are provided with more ammunition for their attack.

The sad part is that the players of the coaches who do use unethical practices are the ones who suffer. They are taught that it is fair to cheat or beat the rules just so that you can win. Many coaches rationalize their actions by saying that other coaches are "beating the rules" and that they want their boys to have the same advantage.

How Do You Win

Is it an advantage? Illegal or unethical acts may provide immediate advantage to win a game, but is winning the game everything? Players can "win" a game without having the highest score if they give 100 percent of their effort in preparing for a game and in playing the game itself. This is not to say that winning the game is not

important, for this is what sports and athletics are about; but it is how we play and how we win that is important.

Some coaches, parents, and school administrators want to know why unethical practices in athletics cannot be controlled. The reason is that unethical practices in organizations or in society in general cannot be controlled completely. You cannot make a law or write a rule that will cover everything, nor can you enforce every law or rule every time it is violated. Nearly every law or rule can be circumvented or violated without being caught.

Take Pride in Honesty

The only way that we can keep the standards of athletics in their proper plane is to see that we all maintain proper ethical standards at all times. We should pride ourselves in being above dishonesty or deceit. We in athletics espouse that our athletic program is the best program in our society for developing a sound moral and ethical character in our young men and women. I agree with this, but unless we change the behavior of some of our individuals who work in our athletic programs, our programs may deteriorate to the point where they are removed from our school program.

The time is now to stand up for the good in your athletic programs and to eliminate those who are contributing to the downfall of the program.

Joe Richardson To Referee State Track, Field Meet

Joe Richardson, currently head trainer at Stephen F. Austin State University in Nacogdoches, will serve as referee for the Sixty-fifth Annual Boys' State High School Track and Field Meet to be held in Austin on May 9 and 10.

Richardson coached at Cleveland High School for 11 years. During this time, he served as athletic director and head coach of all the major sports. He was also athletic trainer for all sports.

Coach Richardson then moved to Liberty High School, where he was assistant football coach and head track coach for six years and also athletic trainer for all sports.

In 1966 he came to Stephen F. Austin University as athletic trainer, defensive secondary coach, and head track coach. He served in these positions for five years.

He retired from coaching football in 1970 and continued with track and training. In 1973 Stephen F. Austin State University as athletic trainer, defensive secondary coach, and head track coach. He served in these positions for five years.

Joe coached many outstanding athletes, 11 of whom were high school state champions and 10 of whom were NAIA college All-Americans. He coached two state high school track championship teams: one in AAA and one in AA. Each of these two years he was runner-up Coach of the Year. In his second season at Stephen F. Austin, his team won the Lone Star Conference Track Meet, and he was selected Lone Star Conference Coach of the Year and also the NAIA Coach of the Year. The last year he coached track at Stephen F. Austin, his team finished fourth in the National NAIA Track Meet.

Joe completed his work toward B.S. and M.Ed. degrees at West Texas State University, Sam Houston State University, and the University of Houston.

He has two sons. David is assistant football coach, head track coach, and trainer at Barber's Hill High School at Mont Belvieu; and Joe Jr., who has his Ph.D., is a professor at Midwestern University. Coach Richardson and his wife, Grace, retired to their home after working for 25 years.



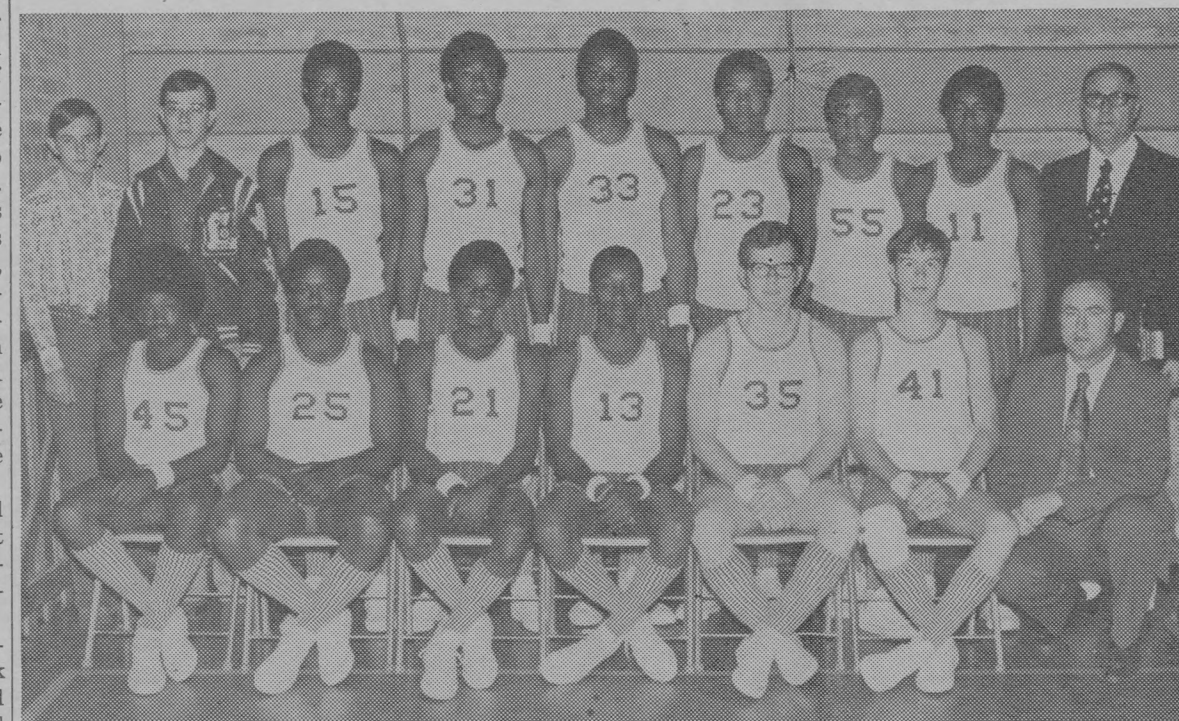

Volleyball Rule 3 Clarification Given

There has been some question as to the official interpretation of Rule 3, Section 3, Article 5 in the 1974-75 National Federation Edition Volleyball Rulebook.

The rule reads: "All players except the server shall be within the team's playing area and in correct serving order with no overlapping of adjacent players front-to-back or side-to-side at the instant the ball is contacted for the serve. No part of the player's body touching the floor shall overlap any part of

another player's body touching the floor. After the ball is contacted for the serve, players may move from their respective positions."

This rule is being interpreted by the State Office to mean that the server does not have to be within the playing area, but the server must not overlap with an adjacent player. The second sentence of the rule, must be enforced for the server as well as for the other players.
