



# Please Read UIL Mail

As this issue of the Leaguer goes to press, spring meet entry blanks are being mailed to each high school which has paid its membership fee, as well as to the elementary and junior high schools. Each school will need an entry blank when its contestants enter district meet.

No doubt, many of these entry blanks will be dropped into the wastepaper basket by the busy administrator, under the impression he is dis- PORT NECHES-GROVES carding a circular. Then about ten days before the meet, he will be annoved to discover that, apparently, the State office has not mailed him violation of Rule 7 of the Track Plan. his entry blanks. He will then either call long distance or send a telegram to register the complaint that his school has not received its entry blank. This will cost him from 50 cents to \$2.50.


The State Office will promptly mail him additional entry blanks, which will not reach him for two or three days. Then his district director will object to receiving the late entry. More telegrams will be exchanged with the State Office. Some temper will be generated. This will be deleterious to the digestion, and faulty digestion will further aggravate temper, and so on.

Moral: Open and examine all mail carefully and especially that sent VIDOR HIGH from the League office.

"We want to do something for the athletes," is a statement frequently found in correspondence about enforcement of the League's Award Rule and Amateur Rule. These requests for permission to make various awards or provide sundry gifts place upon the League the burden of denying some benevolently inclined group this privilege of making its projected gifts or recognition.

We can readily see that this can easily result in making the League a locally unpopular organization, especially with those individuals toward whom such benevolent intentions are directed. Such groups mean well, and we do not question their god intentions. However, their efforts to "do something for the athletes" are all too often really against the best interests of the players.

These rules were first incorporated into the CONSTITUTION AND CONTEST RULES by decisive referendum because school administrators CLARKSVILLE HIGH realized that expensive awards and material inducements are and can be used as recruiting devices. Once competition in such awards was under way, the wealthy schools would have an overwhelming advantage over others in securing talent, especially in athletics. Such competition RIVERCREST (BOGATA) would practically become "bidding," and would kill effective competition and destroy the amateur spirit among sports competitors, which is the finest flower of our interschool competition.

Competition And Cooperation

The League believes strongly in controlled competition. Competition is part of life. People are going to strive to excel, regardless of condtions which surround them. From the time we are born to the present, we all have to struggle and we will have to compete until we leave the earth. The baby competes for the attention of its father or mother. The child in school vies for grades, for social approval and for friends; this continues through the entire educational system, from first grade through college.

After schooling is finished, we compete in seeking a husband or wife, PICTURE MEMORY BULLETIN in securing the job we prefer; we seek social or professional status, ad infinitum. We are born to be competitive creatives. No rules or regulations, or philosophical beliefs can destroy this competitive instinct, this spur to accomplishment.

Some sincere people, however, think that we should cooperate and should not compete. This may sound good but, in reality, even when we cooperate we are competing. Cooperatives set up in agriculture and in other areas compete against one another to see which can obtain more advantages for its members. Cooperative houses at the university, where students pool their resources and live together strive to see which can provide the most efficient operation. Further, cooperation requires complete and absolute understanding and giving; rarely can we find any such unselfing group, which will take no opportunity for personal gain.

Cooperation does have its place. Members of the debate team cooperate with each other, as do members of a band, a choir, or an athletic squad. Competition and cooperation are not contradictory but, in reality, are supplementary. We are first to admit that uncontrolled competition can be harmful, can create complexes and psychoses, and may RECOMMENDED MUSIC be injurious both physically and mentally. However, the League does JUDGES not believe in uncontrolled competition, but in competition guided by rules and regulations which promote fair and equitable rivalry. League rules are to educational competition as civil laws are to business: A means to equal competition.

The primary purpose of the League is to insure and promote conover others in securing talent, especially in athletics. Such competition trolled and equal competition. For sixty-seven years, the League has sponsored and stressed controlled and educational competition. We believe it to be a vital factor in education and for the world in which we live,-a basic ingredient which can not and should not be ignored.






