

THE ESSAY

NOTE: Contestants who do not write an essay will be disqualified. Essay length is not a major grading factor as long as the essay is substantial and demonstrates a sincere effort to discuss the assigned topic. Cover as many corners of the issue as practical, including historical, political, economic, social and cultural, when relevant. Avoid including your personal opinions, as more than enough information on the subject has been published. A focused, concise and specific essay beats a vague and rambling essay.

PROMPT

In setting foreign policy, the guiding principle is to serve the national interest. Whether it's political, economic, military or cultural, America's interest has to be considered when presidents make decisions regarding foreign policy. Ronald Reagan was seen as anti-Communist and his policies reflected that. "Mr. Gorbachev, tear down this wall," he challenged the general secretary of the Community Party of the Soviet Union in West Berlin in 1987. George H.W. Bush dealt with Iraq. And Dwight Eisenhower effectively ended the Korean War and kept China out of Taiwan. But not all presidents are evaluated so positively when it comes to foreign policy.

If the report card on the Biden administration's foreign policy were set in stone after his first year (or so), what grade would Biden get?

Pick three issues or events related to foreign policy during Biden's term in office and support the grade by evaluating those issues or events on political, social, cultural and/or economic grounds.

ESSAY PROMPT

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POTENTIAL DISCUSSION POINTS PREPARED Feb. 18, 2022 might include, but should not be limited to...

- *Grade* Students should start by giving the Biden administration a grade. That should help them with their thesis/opening.
- *America is back* Biden' ran on a platform of "America is back," vowing to reset the country's standing in the world and to repair ties with its allies.
- Russia Biden's response to Ukraine has consisted of lots of high-flown rhetoric
 but little substance. Lots of threats. Little action. "The United States is prepared
 no matter what happens," he said. Ready with diplomacy. Ready with economic
 sanctions. "Nations have a right to sovereignty and territorial integrity. They
 have the freedom to set their own course and choose with whom they will
 associate." However, he also made it clear that, because Ukraine was not a NATO
 nation, the U.S. would not be sending troups in. However, the U.S. will provide
 support.
- China Biden has restored a more traditional approach to U.S. foreign policy in
 the Far East. Specifically, Biden has shown a greater emphasis for human rights,
 including his administration's diplomatic boycott of the Beijing Olympics and
 "rock-solid" support for Taiwan. Joined by Canada, India, Australia, Lithuania,
 Kosovo, Belgium, Denmark and Estonia, the diplomatic boycott had little impact
 even after Russian athletes were found with performancing enhancing drugs in
 their system.
- Australia The surprise joint announcement by U.S. President Joe Biden,
 British Prime Minister Boris Johnson, and Australian Prime Minister Scott
 Morrison of a new military and technology pact among their three countries—
 AUKUS—dropped like a bombshell in capitals around the world. The genesis of
 the agreement was Australia's requirement for a submarine that can handle the
 increasing reach and size of the Chinese Navy through the South China Sea into
 the waters off Australia. While this was, overall, a big win for Biden, it was a
 diplomatic slap in the face to France.
- Middle East As Kirsten Fontenrose, former senior director for the Gulf at the
 White House National Security Council, said, Biden's foreign policy in the Middle
 East thus far has been sometimes reactive (Afghanistan, Egypt), sometimes
 contradictory (won't sell arms that might violate human rights, but greenlights
 human rights violators in Syria and Afghanistan), sometimes short-sighted (Saudi
 Arabia, United Arab Emirates), and sometimes not evident (Libya, Lebanon). But
 Biden never said the Middle East would be his focus.
- Afghanistan In late August, the U.S. extricated its military from a two-decadelong conflict, but the country, and tens of thousands of Afghan allies, were left with the Taliban ostensibly in charge. Biden's administration mismanaged the process set in motion before he took office by abruptly pulling out all U.S. forces and 16,000 contractors at once without a plan to safely evacuate Americans and Afghan allies.
