A focused, concise and specific essay beats a vague and rambling essay.

ESSAY PROMPT

POTENTIAL DISCUSSION POINTS PREPARED May 2, 2022 might include, but should not be limited to...

- United Nations On March 2, in a rare emergency session, the U.N. General Assembly overwhelmingly voted to condemn Russia's attack on Ukraine and to demand that Moscow immediately end its military operations in Ukraine. A total of 141 U.N. member states voted to support Ukraine's sovereignty and territorial integrity while condemning Russia's further invasion. Only five countries voted against the resolution Russia, Belarus, Syria, Eritrea and North Korea while 35 countries abstained.
- Austria Austria doesn't support Ukraine's admission in the EU. Austria's finance
 minister ruled out any EU sanctions that target oil and gas coming from Russia.
 Austria's Chancellor Karl Nehammer said he raised alleged Russian atrocities in
 Ukraine during a "tough" and unfriendly meeting Monday with Vladimir Putin -- the
 first Western sit-down with the Russian President since he launched the invasion.
- Britain Britain is a staunch supporter of Ukraine and has accused Russia of plotting
 to overthrow the government in Kyiv. British Prime Minister Boris Johnson met
 with Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelensky and warned Russian citizens about
 the potential human cost of war. Britain also sent antitank weapons to Ukraine, and
 Johnson said he is considering deploying fighter jets and warships to the region.
- German Even as some of its allies ramp up military support for Ukraine, Germany
 has taken a more cautious approach. The crisis is an early test for Chancellor Olaf
 Scholz, whose party has promoted rapprochement with Russia. Russia accounted for
 55% of Germany's gas imports in 2021 and 40% in the first quarter of 2022.
- Poland Russia's gas supplies are looking highly uncertain after Poland and Bulgaria were told their supplies would stop.
- China China has aimed to strike a delicate balance between Moscow and the West
 when it comes to the Ukraine crisis. For Beijing, endorsing an invasion of Ukraine
 by Putin would further deteriorate its ties with Western nations, but Xi also seeks to
 strengthen China's growing relationship with Russia. Putin traveled to Beijing for the
 Opening Ceremonies of the Winter Olympics and met with Xi in person for the first
 time in nearly two years.
- Japan Zelenskyy thanked Japan for being the first Asian nation to pressure
 Russia over its invasion of Ukraine. Japan froze the assets of dozens of Russians
 and prohibited exports to 81 Russian organizations in response to Moscow's war in
 Ukraine. Japan refrained from imposing harsh sanctions on Russia after the invasion
 of Ukraine and annexation of Crimea in 2014. Abe Shinzo, Japan's longest-serving
 prime minister, met Vladimir Putin, Russia's president, 27 times between 2012 and 2020.
- *India* Neutral. India's neutrality on Ukraine rooted in deep ties to Russia, lingering mistrust of U.S. A deputy U.S. national security adviser traveled to New Delhi to press India to take a more forceful stance against Russia over the Ukraine war.
- Cuba Mixed. The Cuban government's failure to condemn the invasion conflicts with Cuba's history of international solidarity with Ukraine. During and since the run-up to the Ukraine invasion, Cuban state media parroted Russian propaganda in support of Putin's actions, as well as Russian claims of genocide perpetrated by the Ukrainian government. It has also criticized the "hypocrisy" of sanctions against Russia.
- North Korea "The Ukraine situation is never irrelevant to us." With global attention
 focused on Europe, "there is a possibility that North Korea will conduct strategic
 provocations," South Korean President-elect Yoon Suk-yeol said. In late April, North
 Korea put two new ICBMs on parade, a warning officials said.
