


ESSAY PROMPT

NOTE: *Contestants who do not write an essay will be disqualified.* Essay length is not a major grading factor as long as the essay is substantial and demonstrates a sincere effort to discuss the assigned topic. Cover as many corners of the issue as practical, including historical, political, economic, current events and cultural, when relevant. Avoid including your personal opinions, as more than enough information on the subject has been published. A focused, concise and specific essay beats a vague and rambling essay.

Congress mandated the report. The White House released it. And it is notable for the precision of the calculations and bluntness of its conclusions.

Cite THREE examples of climate change impacts within this academic year and possible economic impacts of each of the changes.

ESSAY PROMPT

A major scientific report issued by 13 federal agencies last fall presents the starkest warnings to date of the consequences of climate change for the United States, predicting that if significant steps are not taken to rein in global warming, the damage will knock as much as 10 percent off the size of the American economy by century's end.

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POTENTIAL DISCUSSION POINTS

- *The report.* The Global Change Research Act of 1990 mandated the report be delivered to Congress every four years. This year, it was 1,656 pages and is available online at https://nca2018.globalchange.gov/.
- Record wildfires. California, like much of the West, gets most of its moisture in the fall and winter. Its vegetation then spends much of the summer slowly drying out because of a lack of rainfall and warmer temperatures. That vegetation serves as kindling for fires. California's climate has always been fire prone and the link between climate change and bigger fires is inextricable. Of the 10 largest fires since 1932, nine have occurred since 2000, five since 2010 and two this year alone, including the Mendocino Complex Fire, the largest in state history. The Camp Fire was the deadliest and most destructive wildfire in California history. It is also the deadliest wildfire in the U.S. since the Cloquet fire in 1918, and is high on the list of the world's deadliest wildfires. The Camp Fire was responsible for 85 fatalities. As of Nov. 19, insured damage was estimated to be \$7.5–10 billion including the destruction of 18,804 structures.
- Food shortages. The need for food will become increasingly urgent as rising temperatures force nations to retool their approach to agriculture, to create new climate-resistant crops, and to develop additional strategies to ensure an adequate food supply for their people. Farming and ranching have depleted land and animal species on a broad scale worldwide, and as the global population grows by an estimated 2.4 billion people in the next three decades, the world will need to produce 70 percent more food than it does today. The oceans covering more than two-thirds of the planet but producing just 2 percent of its food could be a substitute for terrestrial farming. Marine agriculture and farming could also reduce a roughly \$15 billion annual seafood trade deficit, much of it with Asian nations such as China, Japan and South Korea.
- Flooded coastlines. Climate change has already increased the frequency of coastal flooding, including floods just from tides. The combination of water expansion as the ocean has warmed and the melting of land ice into the oceans has driven sea level up about 7 inches since 1900, and the rise is accelerating. From 2005 to 2015, the median annual number of flood days more than doubled along the stretch of coast from Florida to North Carolina. Road surfaces are already being elevated in anticipate of inevitable sea level rise in South Florida. City planners in Annapolis, Maryland have discussed ways protect the city's historic dock, from improving storm drain systems to elevating some urban features. (Source: Climate Central, Oct. 4, 2018)
- Record droughts. Texas had its driest year on record in 2011. A study published in Science Advances and released last fall. "The safest bet is that global temperatures will continue to increase, causing Texas droughts to be warmer and more strongly affected by evaporation." Such droughts causes increases in the price of beef and milk. Other droughts threatened the UK and Europe.
- Rising global temperatures. The world's leading climate scientists have warned there is only a dozen years for global warming to be kept to a maximum of 1.5°C, beyond which even half a degree will significantly worsen the risks of drought, floods, extreme heat and poverty for hundreds of millions of people. The half-degree difference could also prevent corals from being completely eradicated and ease pressure on the Arctic, according to a study by the UN Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change released in October. Temperature records were broken in north Africa, California, and hundreds of people died after deadly heatwaves in Greece and Japan.
- "Climate change is happening now, and it's happening faster and much worse than
 predicted. It's threatening to the world we know and everything in it. It's already
 killing people. This is beyond doubt or argument," Emily Mulligan, head of campaigns
 at GetUp, wrote in *The Guardian*, Jan. 1 2019.



- 1. Distribute contests to students, who will then have 60 minutes to finish.
- 2. Grade the objective portions of the test.
- 3. Enter results of the objective portion of the contest into the UIL online entry system. Do not add essay scores to determine the overall team winner!
- 4. To determine the overall individual winner, pull the top eight papers. In the event of ties, select enough papers to fill eight slots. For example:

- 5. In a 3-person judging panel, must every judge grade each essay? Yes. If more than one person judges essays, make certain that judges reach agreement on which essay is the best. Do not rely solely on point totals. One judge may be more stringent than another. It is possible that a weaker essay, graded by a more lenient judge, can be awarded more points than a stronger essay, graded by a more strict judge.
- 6. Judges should not be excused until verification is completed and results announced as official.

It does not provide a mere shopping list of facts. It inteprets the facts without editorializing. The essay is well written and organized with few spelling, grammar or punctuation errors. The essay is clear, precise and succinct.	Comments:			
A 5-7 ESSAY offers a clear thesis with limited development. It either deals with one aspect in depth or with all aspects more superficially while providing limited analysis. Generally good writing and organization skills displayed. May contain errors of fact that do not seriously detract from the quality of the essay.				
A 2-4 ESSAY lacks a thesis or presents a confused or undeveloped thesis. It deals with the prompt in a superficial way and offers no analysis. Instead, it tends to editorialize. May contain major fact errors, display poor writing skills and rely on bloated, pretentious language.
