#### POTENTIAL DISCUSSION POINTS PREPARED March 13, 2025 might include, but should not be limited to...

In his 2025 State of the State address, Texas Gov. Greg Abbott outlined seven emergency items as legislative priorities for the current session, including education, taxes and technology. Pick any THREE of Abbott's items and discuss the historical, political, economic, social and cultural background of each of the issues

- Republican control: The 89th Texas Legislature convened on January 14, 2025, with Republicans
  maintaining control of both chambers.
- From the speech: Abbott laid out seven emergency items that he said would help Texas remain a national leader: cutting property taxes, a "generational investment" in the state's water infrastructure, increasing teacher pay, beefing up vocational career training programs for students after high school, allowing the use of public dollars for private education purposes, stiffening the state's bail laws and creating a cybersecurity hub in San Antonio.
- Conservative agenda: Lt. Gov. Dan Patrick also outlined sweeping conservative agenda with list of top 25 legislative priorities including proposals to cut property taxes, shore up the state's electric grid and water supply, and infuse religion into public schools. The top two bills are the state budget, Senate Bill 1, and a voucher-like education savings account program, Senate Bill 2.
- School choice: Abbott said the state "must be No. 1 in educating our children." School voucher legislation failed, despite repeated attempts in the last legislative session. This became Abbott's No. 1 priority. SB2 easily passed the Senate and legislators were hopeful it would pass the House. Under this legislation, families would receive up to \$10,000 per year per student to use for tuition, textbooks, transportation, and therapy at an accredited private school. Children with disabilities would receive up to \$11,500 per student. The bill would use \$1 billion of the state's budget surplus to fund around 100,000 education savings accounts. About 80% of funds would go to families with special needs children or those earning under \$161,000 per year. Critics of school vouchers in Texas argue that they hurt public schools by taking away funding and giving private schools an unfair advantage.
- Teacher pay raises: Recognizing the critical role of educators, Abbott proposed increasing teacher
  salaries to attract and retain quality professionals in Texas schools. In designating it an emergency
  item, Abbott said, "We must fund and train the best teachers. That starts with giving our teachers a
  pay raise this session. To increase teachers' average salary to an all-time high, I am declaring teacher
  pay an emergency item. Additionally, we must reward the best teachers by putting them on a path to
  earn a six-figure salary."
- Property tax relief: Texans pay some of the highest property tax bills in the country. Abbott emphasized the need to provide substantial property tax relief to Texans. Texas lawmakers have vowed to provide tax relief to property owners, and the House and Senate have so far agreed to spend at least \$6 billion in state funds to do so. But the two chambers have competing ideas about how to deliver the cuts. Both chambers want to send \$3 billion to school districts so they lower their tax rates, a tax-cut method known as "compression." Decreasing the tax rate would lower property tax bills for homeowners and business owners alike.
- Regulation of THC products: A law from 2019 allowed the commercialization of hemp products with THC levels under 3%. Lawmakers argue that the consumable THC products being sold in stores are unregulated and often contain more THC than what is legally allowed. SB3 aims to ban all hemp products containing THC, addressing concerns over unregulated high-THC products like gummies that have emerged due to a loophole from a 2019 farm bill. The bill has sparked significant debate, with advocates arguing for better regulation rather than an outright ban, emphasizing the potential impact on businesses and consumers who rely on these products for health reasons.
- Water infrastructure: Highlighting the importance of sustainable resources, Abbott called for significant investments in water infrastructure to support the state's growing population and economic activities. The governor also asked lawmakers to make a "generational investment" in the state's water infrastructure, saying it was an issue that affected every family and business. "Some of our water supplies are drying up," he said. "Many communities have leaking and broken water lines. Agriculture producers in the Rio Grande Valley and out in West Texas, they don't have water to be able to grow their crops."
- Bail reform: To enhance public safety, Abbott called for a constitutional amendment to prevent
  judges from releasing violent offenders on bail, citing concerns that current policies allow dangerous
  individuals to reoffend upon release. He said "activist judges" have too much discretion to let repeat
  offenders out on bail, "only to see them harm more Texans."
- Creation of a Texas Cyber Command: Abbott said he wants the state to lead in the field of cybersecurity
  and proposed the creation of a "Texas Cyber Command" in San Antonio, to help fight off attacks
  from hostile foreign nations like Russia, China and Iran. Abbott also threw his support behind a bill
  that would bar people from countries designated as hostile foreign nations from owning land in the
  state. He also said people who are not U.S. citizens should not be allowed to work in state and local
  government.
