Lincoln-Douglas Debate Format

6-3-7-3-4-6-3
Total of 13 minutes per speaker
Total of 6 minutes for CX
Total of 4 minutes prep per speaker
Total of 40 minutes for the round

Affirmative has the burden of proof

Negative has the burden of clash

Speakers should:

- Dress professionally.
- Be confident.
- Be nice.
- Face the judge.

6 minutes for 1AC

First Affirmative Constructive Speech Good intro with attention-getting device (AGD) States the resolution Defines terms crucial to the debate Gives aff value, criterion, and contentions with reasons and evidence

3 minutes for CX of aff speaker by neg speaker

Cross Examination Neg asks questions Aff answers questions Neg should use this time to clarify his/her understanding of aff case and to lay the foundation for upcoming neg case points

FACE THE JUDGE!



7 minutes for INC

First Negative Constructive Speech **Good intro with AGD** States neg position Re-defines any terms crucial to the debate Gives neg value, criterion, and contentions with reasons and evidence *Attacks aff case (value/criterion/contentions)*

3 minutes for CX of neg speaker by aff speaker

Cross Examination Aff asks questions Neg answers questions Aff should use this time to clarify his/her understanding of neg case and to lay the foundation for upcoming rebuttal speeches in defense of aff case and attack on neg case





No new ARGUMENTS are allowed!

New EVIDENCE and ANALYSIS are okay!

4 minutes for IAR

First Affirmative Rebuttal Refutes neg attacks on aff case Attacks neg case Points out how neg case is not as strong as aff case

6 minutes for 1NR

Negative Rebuttal Refutes aff attacks on neg case Attacks aff arguments Points out how aff has failed to uphold their burden of proof Points out how neg case is better **Summarizes with voters**

3 minutes for 2AR

Second (Last) Affirmative Rebuttal Refutes neg attacks on aff case Attacks neg arguments Points out how aff has upheld their burden of proof Points out how aff case is better **Summarizes with voters**

Taking notes during the debate

"FLOWING"

"FLOWING"

- 1. Listen!
- 2. Signpost/share brief off-time roadmaps.
- 3. Write down major headings and taglines.
- 4. Don't worry if you miss something the first time--if it is a key point, you should hear it again from the speaker when you ask him/her about it in CX time!
- 5. Abbreviate/come up with your own shorthand.
- 6. Figure out the flowing process that works best for you!

- 10. Do impromptu debates over simpler topics, so you can become better at forming arguments.
- 9. Do class debates on the topic before meets.
- 8. If someone (a coach, a judge, or an opponent) uses jargon you don't understand, ASK!

- 7. Make sure you are prepped for at least a week in advance and aren't writing your cases the night before.
 - 6. Make sure you really understand the topic and what you are discussing. It's easy for an opponent to attack your arguments if you don't understand what you're discussing.

- 5. Make sure you are speaking loud and clear even when practicing.
 - 4. Pay attention to your posture while presenting and make needed adjustments to your stance (so you aren't slouching, swaying, etc.).

- 3. Make sure you are maintaining proper eye contact with judges.
 - 2. Be willing to step out of your comfort zone to do new things. The only way to grow is by doing.

And, most important...

1. HAVE FUN!

Whether you win or lose, it is most important that you have a good, "learnable" experience.
