A Resolution to Amend the Constitution to Distribute Electoral College Votes Proportionally

BE IT ENACTED BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT: 1 RESOLVED, By two-thirds of the UIL Congress here assembled, that the following 2 article is proposed as an amendment to the Constitution of the United 3 States, which shall be valid to all intents and purposes as part of the 4 Constitution when ratified by the legislatures of three-fourths of the 5 several states within seven years from the date of its submission by the 6 Congress: 7 ARTICLE --8 **SECTION 1**: In presidential elections, electoral votes shall not be allocated to 9 candidates on a winner-takes-all basis or according to the winner of 10 districts within states. Instead, electoral votes shall be allocated 11 proportionally according to the popular vote within a state. 12 **SECTION 2**: This amendment will not affect other aspects of the Electoral College 13 14

process, including the number of votes granted to each state, the number of votes needed to win presidency, and the process by which electoral representatives are chosen to be in the electoral college.

17 **SECTION 3:** The UIL Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.

A Bill to Prohibit the Death Penalty

1	BE IT ENACTE	D BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	Capital punishment shall be prohibited and replaced with a sentence of
3		life without parole for current and future prisoners sentenced to death.
4	SECTION 2.	Capital Punishments shall be defined as the process of sentencing
5		convicted offenders to death for the most serious crimes (capital crimes)
6		and carrying out that sentence. The specific offenses and circumstances
7		that determine if a crime is eligible for a death sentence are defined by
8		statute and are prescribed by Congress or any state legislature. Life
9		without parole shall be defined as the incarceration of convicts for their
10		natural lives without the possibility of release on parole.
11	SECTION 3.	The Department of Justice and District Attorney Offices will be
12		responsible for carrying out this prohibition of death penalty sentencing.
13	SECTION 4.	This legislation will be enacted by January 1, 2025.
14	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Resolution to Tax Mega Churches

1	WHEREAS,	Mega Churches and Large Evangelism Properties are tax-exempt creating billions
2		of dollars in lost revenue; and
3	WHEREAS,	Pastors of Mega Churches and Large Evangelism properties live in homes owned
4		by the church, which allows an excessive amount of land in the church name;
5		and
6	WHEREAS,	Mega Churches and Large Evangelism Properties take in substantial income
7		which is unlawful; and
8	WHEREAS,	Any Church or Evangelism Property with a congregation over one thousand
9		should pay property taxes; and
10	WHEREAS,	Any pastor living on land owned by the church larger than two acres should pay
11		taxes on the land they live on; and
12	WHEREAS,	Any property not directly benefiting the church or any charity should pay
13		property taxes; now, therefore, be it
14	RESOLVED,	The UIL congress assembled recommends the solution to tax Mega Churches.

A Bill to Change the Assumed Non-Consent of Organ Procurement

1	BE IT ENACTE	ED BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	The United States federal government should change the presumed non-
3		consent of organ procurement to presumed consent unless expressed
4		otherwise.
5	SECTION 2.	Presumed consent is where citizens over the age of 18 must place their
6		name on a national opt-out register, otherwise their consent for donating
7		their organs will be presumed. The United States' system for organ
8		procurement operates under a model of expressed consent. This means
9		that an individual will not be an organ donor unless he or she explicitly
10		states otherwise.
11	SECTION 3.	The United States Department of Health and Human Services will oversee
12		the implementation of this bill in cooperation with the Health Resources
13		and Services Administration (HRSA).
14		A. The Organ Procurement and Transplantation Network (OPTN) will still
15		be responsible for organ recovery and transplantation.
16		B. The HRSA will still provide oversight of the OPTN.
17	SECTION 4.	This legislation will go into effect immediately upon passing.
18	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Make American Sign Language the Universal Language to Learn in Schools

1	BE IT ENACTE	D BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	The United States federal government will enact a plan to require
3		students to learn American sign language, or ASL, as a core class in the
4		American education system.
5	SECTION 2.	American sign language is defined by the Oxford dictionary as a system of
6		communication using visual gestures and signs, as used by deaf people.
7	SECTION 3.	The U.S. Department of Education will oversee this bill and place sign
8		language into the country-wide school curriculum or American
9		curriculum.
10		A. Failure to implement this curriculum will result in a fine of \$50,000 for
11		the school.
12	SECTION 4.	Implementation of law will occur on or before September 1, 2024.
13	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Resolution to Unveil All Alien Information

1	WHEREAS,	For decades, the United States Federal Government has not been forthcoming
2		with the American people about information concerning alien life forms or
3		Unidentified Aerial Phenomena (UAP); and
4	WHEREAS,	Since the government released information about the existence of non-human
5		life in the summer of 2023, it has proved that the Federal Government was lying
6		to the American people since the 1930s; however, by releasing all information
7		and evidence regarding non-human life and UAPs to the American people, the
8		government can start to reclaim its credibility; and
9	WHEREAS,	The impact of continued distrust could lead to anarchy in an already fractured
10		political atmosphere in the United States, leaving our nation more vulnerable to
11		internal and external threats; and
12	WHEREAS,	We must take all steps possible to rebuild trust between the government and
13		the people; now, therefore, be it
14	RESOLVED,	That the UIL Congress here assembled make the following recommendation that
15		all information and evidence pertaining to the existence of alien life forms
16		and/or unidentified aerial phenomena be released to the American people
17		immediately.

A Resolution to Increase Military Presence in the Arctic

1	WHEREAS,	The United States military lacks coordinated defense in the Arctic region;
2		and,
3	WHEREAS,	This lack of security poses a national risk considering the Arctic is a
4		strategic approach for enemy nations; and,
5	WHEREAS,	The abundance of natural resources such as natural gas, oil,
6		and rare-earth deposits in the Arctic can lead to strategic competition
7		amongst foreign nations for territorial exploitation; and,
8	WHEREAS,	Increasing military presence in the Arctic sets a standard for Arctic
9		security for international cooperation; now, therefore, be it
10	RESOLVED,	That the UIL Congress here assembled shall increase military presence in
11		the Arctic to increase national security.

A Bill to Ensure Sustainable Electrical Vehicle Charging Stations by 2040

1	BE IT ENACTED B	BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	By the year 2040, all commercial electrical vehicle charging stations will require to be
3		powered by at least 50% renewable energy. Failure to comply will face a penalty, and
4		revocation of usable tax-credits related to electric vehicle charging station subsidies.
5	SECTION 2.	Electric vehicles (EVs) are to be defined as vehicles that utilize a battery and electric motor as
6		a means of transportation and have compatibility with electrical vehicle charging stations.
7		Electric vehicle charging stations, (EVCs) refers to stations or devices specifically provided
8		with the intended use of being used to charge an electric vehicle. Renewable energy is
9		defined by the Environmental Protection Agency as a "fuel source that restore themselves
10		over short periods of time and do not diminish." Such as solar, wind, hydro, geothermal,
11		biofuel, and other sources.
12	SECTION 3.	This bill will be jointly implemented by the Department of Energy (DoE), and The United
13		States Internal Revenue Service (IRS).
14		A. The Department of Energy (DoE) will be responsible for tracking and monitoring that
15		EVCs are relying on no less than 50% renewable energy for charging EVs, and reporting
16		annually when stations fall below this threshold.
17		B. The United States Internal Revenue Service (IRS) will be responsible for enforcement of
18		this bill. If an EVC falls below the renewable energy threshold, then that EVCs profits will
19		be taxed, by 50% for failing to meet the threshold requirement. If compliance is
20		reached, the following calendar year penalties will be revoked.
21		C. Additionally, if a station is found to have two years or more of consecutive threshold
22		penalties, then accessibility to EVC Tax Subsidies will be prevented, and will not be able
23		to be claimed for that calendar year.
24	SECTION 4.	This legislation is to go into effect on January 1, 2040.
25	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Prohibit Any President of The United States from Suspending, Denouncing, or Withdrawing from NATO Without Senate Approval Following an Act of Congress

1	BE IT ENACTI	ED BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	Any President of the United States shall be prohibited from suspending,
3		denouncing, or withdrawing the United States membership from NATO
4		without congressional approval, as NATO is an essential military alliance.
5	SECTION 2.	An Act of Congress will be defined as a statute enacted by the United
6		States Congress that passes through both the House and Senate.
7	SECTION 3.	The House of Representatives and Senate along with the United States
8		Department of State shall oversee the implementation of this bill.
9	SECTION 4.	This bill will take effect on January 20, 2024 at the start of the 2024
10		presidential term.
11	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Stop the Manufacture of Assault Weapons and to Reclaim Existing Assault Weapons

1	BE IT ENACTE	ED BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	All manufacturing of assault weapons will cease, excluding manufacturing
3		for military and law enforcement. In addition, existing assault weapons,
4		voluntarily surrendered, will be purchased, destroyed, or repurposed.
5	SECTION 2.	Assault weapons are defined as semi-automatic or automatic firearms,
6		excluding handguns.
7	SECTION 3.	The Bureau of Alcohol Tobacco Firearms and Explosives will oversee
8		enforcement.
9		A. Assault weapons voluntarily surrendered will be purchased for \$2000.
10		B. Assault weapons surrendered will be made available to law
11		enforcement entities through a grant program, any unclaimed or
12		unusable assault weapons will be destroyed.
L3	SECTION 4.	This bill will go into effect January 1, 2026.
L4	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Legalize the Sale of Non-Vital Organs to Promote Organ Transplants

1	BE IT ENACTE	D BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	The sale of non-vital organs will now be legal only at Mayo Clinic Care
3		Network (MCCN) hospitals to increase organ pools therefore lowering the
4		cost of transplantations to recipients.
5	SECTION 2.	Non-vital organs are defined as any organ that can be transplanted
6		without the donor needing assistance to live through treatments and/or
7		medicine. MCCN is the highest-ranking transplant hospital network
8		nationwide therefore will oversee all non-vital organ transplants. Only
9		hospitals that are a part of the Mayo network may participate in the
10		procurement and transplanting of non-vital organs.
l1	SECTION 3.	The Health Resources and Services Administration will see that:
12		A. Anyone looking to give an organ will be spared the operation costs as
13		well as be compensated with \$10,000.
L4		B. Any hospital who is not part of the Mayo Clinic Care Network that
15		performs a transplant of or sells a non-vital organ will be fined
16		\$100,000, doubling with each offense.
L7	SECTION 4.	This bill will go into effect on January 1, 2025.
L8	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Create an Agency Dedicated to Regulating Technology and Technological Affairs

BE IT ENACTED BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT: 1 A new agency will be formed dedicated to establishing standards of regulation for Technology 2 SECTION 1. 3 and Technological Affairs, particularly pertaining to online and computer development. This agency is to create, and enforce existing regulations on; 4 5 A. Usage of online-users data and information, such as the harvesting of data, what kind of info is harvested, and regulations to protect user privacy and information. 6 B. Al Technologies, to question and regulate ethical constraints on this technology, and to 7 ensure safe development of said technology. 8 9 C. Industry-standard regulations for technological companies, sites, and software. To ensure moral and legal development and compliance in the interest of the digital user. 10 D. Laws dedicated to monitoring technological advancement, practices in the industry, and bills 11 12 to protect the digital user. 13 E. Other advancements and regulations in the technological field, not yet listed or not yet seen. 14 SECTION 2. Technology, and Technological Affairs is to specifically outline and focus on technologies that are primarily computer and or digitally based, such as Social Networking Site (SNS), Electronic 15 Commerce, Computer Software, Computer Hardware, and Artificial Intelligence (AI). AI 16 Technology is to be defined as technology or software that utilizes machine learning and or 17 artificial neural networks to perform a task or function, such as recommending content, creating 18 images, writing text, or any other function not listed. The digital user is to be defined as an 19 20 individual, corporation, or entity that utilizes the internet and proprietary computer software and or hardware. 21 SECTION 3. This bill will create the agency, "The United States Bureau of Technological Affairs." (BTA), to 22 ensure enforcement of this bill and its provisions. This agency will be funded by the Department 23 of the Treasury and Internal Revenue Service (IRS). 24 A. Funding will be secured by implementing a 10% tax on profits generated by selling Consumer 25 Electronics in the United States, carried out by the IRS. 26 B. Additional funding may be secured by the passing of new regulations on technology, or 27 technological services. Additional funding may be allocated as the agency absorbs duties 28 previously loosely regulated by other departments or agencies. 29 30 **SECTION 4.** This legislation will be implemented in the next fiscal year.

4	SECTION 2.	Public Option will provide people with a choice between Public Option
5		Insurance or their private insurance.
6	SECTION 3.	The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services will oversee the
7		implementation of Public Option so that a Universal Healthcare System is
8		achieved.
9		A. The funds will be allocated from the United States Department of
10		Defense budget using 1.7 trillion per year combined with the current
11		and expected budgets of Medicare and Medicaid to meet a total
12		budget of 24 trillion dollars.
13	SECTION 4.	This legislation will go into effect January 1, 2025, and will be
14		implemented over a 10-year period.
15	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Require Automatic Voter Registration

2	SECTION 1.	The United States federal government will implement an automatic voter

4	SECTION 2.	Automatic voter registration is a system that registers all eligible voters in
5		upcoming elections.
6	SECTION 3.	All states in the United States of America will be required to implement
7		an automatic voter registration processes for federal elections.
8		A. Individuals may choose to opt out of voter registration by mail or
9		through the newly created government website.
10	SECTION 4.	This legislation will go into effect January 2, 2025.
11	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Ban Praeger U Materials in Public Schools to Stop the Indoctrination of America's Youth

1	BE IT ENACTE	ED BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	Public schools in the United States will be prohibited from purchasing,
3		distributing, or using Praeger U. educational materials in any form.
4	SECTION 2.	Praeger U educational materials shall be defined as any electronic, video,
5		or printed material that is written for the purpose of classroom
6		instruction.
7	SECTION 3.	The United States Department of Education will oversee the enforcement
8		of this legislation. Schools in violation of this bill will lose $\frac{1}{2}$ of all federal
9		funding for a period of 1 year.
10		A. Repeated violations of this legislation will result in an additional 1%
11		decrease in federal funding each year.
12	SECTION 4.	This legislation will go into effect in July of 2024.
13	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Require a Period of Paid Parental Leave

1	BE IT ENACTE	D BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	All businesses shall be required to give mothers a minimum of 8 weeks of
3		full-pay maternity leave and up to an additional 4 weeks of half-pay if
4		experiencing complications. Additionally, businesses shall also be
5		required to give fathers a minimum of 2 weeks at full-pay with up to an
6		additional 4 weeks at half-pay if complication deem caregiving necessary.
7	SECTION 2.	Full pay shall be defined as the salary or hourly-rate based on a 40-hour
8		week. Half pay shall be defined as the salary or hourly-rate based on a 20-
9		hour week. Mothers shall be defined as the birthing or legally adoptive
LO		individual. Fathers shall be defined as one additional co-parent.
l1	SECTION 3.	The Internal Revenue Service (IRS) shall oversee and enforce this
12		legislation through the following means:
13		A. Tax Credits per employee granted to companies or employers in
L4		compliance with the law.
L5		B. Annual audits of company or employer financial statements.
L6	SECTION 4.	This bill will be in effect as of January 31, 2024.
L7	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Raise the Wage to Federal Minimum Match the Current Standard of Living

1	BE IT ENACT	ED BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	The federal minimum wage will be raised by 42% to accommodate for the increase
3		in inflation since 2009. This will set the new minimum wage for workers at \$10.30
4		and a tipped employee at \$3.02. This bill will be known as the Fair Labor Standards
5		Act (FLSA) of 2024.
6	SECTION 2.	A Tipped Employee is an employee who receives tips as a part of their service. A
7		tipped employee must make a combination of \$10.30 an hour with their wages and
8		tips; otherwise, the employer must make up the difference. Student Learners are
9		employees at least 16 years old enrolled in vocational education. Workers with
10		Disabilities are employees that have physical or mental disability that impairs their
11		productive earning capacity. Full-time student workers are employees who are
12		taking at least twelve hours of credit.
13	SECTION 3.	The Department of Labor's Wage and Hour Division administers and enforces the
14		federal minimum wage law.
15		A. Minimum wage exceptions established by the Fair Labor Standards Act of 2009
16		will be maintained. Those exceptions may include but are not limited to full-
17		time students, workers with disabilities or student learners.
18		B. Current exceptions for workers under the age 20 in their first days will be
19		Eliminated.
20	SECTION 4.	This bill will be enacted at the beginning of the third quarter of 2024.
21	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Reduce Food Loss in United States Food Production

BE IT ENACTED BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT: 1 SECTION 1. The United States discards more food than any other country in the 2 world, averaging 120 billion pounds per year. 3 SECTION 2. Food loss is the edible food that is available for human consumption but 4 5 is not consumed. SECTION 3. The United States Department of Agriculture will oversee and enforce 6 this bill by fining food production and processing entities that contribute 7 to major food loss. 8 A. For every 5% above 10% of food wasted by a food production or 9 processing entity, a fine of \$10,000 per 5% will be imposed. 10 B. A fine may be imposed monthly per that month's food losses. 11 C. Fines will be used for funding more sustainable food production 12 research and aiding citizens suffering from food insecurity. 13 SECTION 4. This bill will go into effect as soon as it is passed. 14 SECTION 5. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void. 15

A Resolution to Support the United States' Involvement and Funding of Ukraine Defense against Russia

1	WHEREAS,	Russia has attacked Ukraine without being provoked; and

4	WHEREAS,	Ukraine and other Eastern European countries do not have the resources and
5		power to defend themselves against a country like Russia; and
6	WHEREAS,	If the United States does not support Ukraine along with the Western European
7		countries in this war, Russia will continue to try to resort to more invasions for
8		expansion of other Eastern European countries, resulting in complete chaos in

A Bill to Support the Development of Nuclear Power Technologies to Reduce U.S. use of Fossil Fuels

1	BE II ENACIE	D BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	The United States federal government will provide tax subsidies to aid
3		the building of Nuclear Power Plants and research of nuclear energy
4		technologies.
5	SECTION 2.	A "nuclear power plant" shall be defined as a thermal power station that
6		uses a nuclear reactor as a heat source and produces a significant amount
7		of power for the grid.
8	SECTION 3.	The United States Department of Energy will oversee the implementation
9		of the bill.
10		A. Any nuclear energy company can request tax subsidies at the start of
11		construction of the reactor. Every month the construction site will be
12		checked to ensure that everything is up to code.
13		B. Nuclear energy research facilities will be able to request subsidies in
14		order to assist funding research that will possibly increase the
15		efficiency and decrease the cost of nuclear energy production.
16		C. Upon receiving tax subsidies Nuclear energy companies will receive a
17		10% tax cut.
18	SECTION 4.	This legislation will go into effect the fiscal year of 2024 and last until
19		2044.
20	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.
