A Resolution to Support Third Party Candidates to Break Two-Party Political Gridlock

1	WHEREAS,	Third party candidates are at a substantial disadvantage in state and
2		federal elections; and
3	WHEREAS,	Despite the fact that 40% of voters identify as independent, independent
4		party candidates rarely win elections; and
5	WHEREAS,	A significant amount of U.S. citizens are not being represented by the
6		current two party system; and
7	WHEREAS,	Policies that affect the population are becoming increasingly partisan;
8		and
9	WHEREAS,	Filing requirements are variable and create barriers for independent
10		candidates; now, therefore, be it
11	RESOLVED,	That the UIL Congress here assembled recommend increased funding for
12		advertising campaigns for independent candidates, a national
13		standardization of requirements to run for public office, and an
14		elimination of filing fees; and, be it
15	FURTHER RES	OLVED, That the 15% popular vote requirement to enter national debates
16		be eliminated.

A Bill to Incentivize States to Follow CDC Guidelines During a Declared Healthcare Emergency with COVID-19 Relief Funding

1	BE IT ENACTE	D BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	Congress will use its enumerated powers to incentivize states to enforce
3		Centers for Disease Control (CDC) recommended guidelines with federal
4		funds. Federal funds will be allocated towards states if they meet certain
5		requirements.
6	SECTION 2.	The following requirements must be met in order to receive funding:
7		A. States must enact CDC recommended guidelines as related to the
8		control of a Pandemic Healthcare Emergency
9		B. States must enact CDC recommended guidelines as related to the
10		control of a Pandemic Healthcare Emergency
11		a. Mask mandates
12		b. Social distancing
13		c. School closures
14		d. Public vaccination requirements
15	SECTION 3.	Federal funds must go towards the following:
16		A. Improving sanitation, disease spread control and testing.
17		B. Providing aid to people in need of health interventions.
18		C. Economic relief for those impacted by pandemic interventions.
19	SECTION 4.	This bill will be implemented January 31, 2022.
20	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Federalize CPS to Protect Children to Expand to Verbal Abuse and Neglect

1	BE IT ENACTED BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:	
2	SECTION 1.	Child Protective Services (CPS) will be federalized and extend child
3		removal power to include verbal abuse.
4	SECTION 2.	Verbal abuse is the use of words to demean or control someone. Neglect
5		is failing to care properly.
6	SECTION 3.	The bill will create a Federal Child Protective Services Agency within the
7		Department of Health & Human Services (FCPS).
8		A. The newfound FCPS will work in tandem with state and local agencies
9		to provide relief & assistance.
10		B. Funding will be through normal means.
11	SECTION 4.	Legislation will be enacted immediately with the agency becoming active
12		effective June 1, 2022.
13	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Resolution to Mandate Insurance Companies to Cover Mental Health Services

1	WHEREAS,	Mental health Services are either unaffordable or unreachable for a
2		majority of U.S. workers; and
3	WHEREAS,	55.1 Million Americans, or 1 out of every 5 individuals, struggle with
4		mental health issues that insurance currently does not cover; and
5	WHEREAS,	Mental health issues spill over into all aspects of society and generally
6		shape societal norms and health; now, therefore, be it
7	RESOLVED,	That the UIL Congress here assembled make the following
8		recommendation mandating that private insurance companies fully cover
9		counseling, medicine, and all other treatments aimed to better increase
10		mental health.

A Resolution to Expand Public Transportation to Alleviate Unemployment

1	WHEREAS,	Unemployment becomes increasingly concerning amidst a global
2		pandemic; and
3	WHEREAS,	Over 8 million people are unemployed in the United States; and
4	WHEREAS,	Hundreds of businesses struggle to find employees; and
5	WHEREAS,	Less than a third of people in metropolises can reach their job through
6		public transport within 90 minutes; and
7	WHEREAS,	Public transport employs over 13 million people; and
8	WHEREAS,	Increasing public transport would create thousands more jobs; and
9	WHEREAS,	Increasing public transport will allow the unemployed workforce more
10		employment opportunities; now, therefore, be it
11	RESOLVED,	By the UIL Congress here assembled that each of the 50 states
12		substantially increase either rail, subway, or bus infrastructure after
13		increasing fuel taxes; and, be it
14	FURTHER RES	OLVED, That this investment be focused in connecting residential areas
15		that currently lack public transport with areas that are rich with
16		businesses.

A Bill to Increase Use of Renewable Energy in Bitcoin Mining to Reduce Energy Use Pollution

1	BE IT ENACTED BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:	
2	SECTION 1.	Bitcoin mining in the United States shall adhere to 80% use of renewable
3		energy to support energy needs of mining.
4	SECTION 2.	Renewable energy is defined as energy that is generated from natural
5		processes that are continually replenished. Bitcoin is defined as the
6		processing of transactions in the digital currency system.
7	SECTION 3.	The Internal Revenue Service (IRS) along with the Environmental
8		Protection Agency (EPA) will enforce the legislation.
9		A. The EPA will monitor the renewable energy levels of Bitcoin mines
10		and relay the information to the IRS.
11		B. The IRS will implement a 15% tax increases for one calendar year, for
12		each instance of nonrenewable energy usage exceeds 20%.
13	SECTION 4.	Bill will take effect upon passage.
14	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Resolution to Urge States to Include Child Development and Trauma Training to their Minimum Licensing Requirements

1	WHEREAS,	Police currently do not undergo extensive training on the handling of
2		children or teenagers; and
3	WHEREAS,	Children go into police interviews feeling as if they are being interrogated
4		as victims or witnesses; and
5	WHEREAS,	Officers are directly responsible for working with at-risk youth with no
6		training in adolescent behavior; and
7	WHEREAS,	Trauma informed practices will teach police how to recognize,
8		understand, and properly respond to effects of trauma in children; and
9	WHEREAS,	With COVID-19 the Children's Advocacy Centers are more backed up than
10		ever with it taking up to 3 months to get in for an interview that will be
11		sent to police; and
12	WHEREAS,	If police were equipped to handle children and teenagers, this time could
13		drastically decrease and speed up the interview and trial process; now,
14		therefore, be it
15	RESOLVED,	By the UIL Congress here assembled that states include child
16		development and trauma training to minimum licensing requirements;
17		and, be it
18	FURTHER RES	OLVED, That states who do agree to include this advanced training will be
19		funded by reallocation from the Department of Defense budget.

A Bill to Increase State Authority to Decrease the Spread of Covid-19

- 3 regarding Covid-19 mitigation. Individual states will be responsible for
- 4 mitigation efforts.
- 5 SECTION 2. Covid-19 mitigation includes vaccination, masks, and distancing
- 6 guidelines.
- 7 **SECTION 3.** State governors shall have final consideration measures in their states.
- SECTION 4. State mitigation laws will become effective immediately upon passage of
 this bill.
- 10 **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

1	WHEREAS,	Current law enforcement agencies are under scrutiny regarding systemic
2		racism and their outdated methods inhibiting their ability to provide for
3		the peace and safety of all citizens; and
4	WHEREAS,	Restructuring police departments to better meet the needs of the citizens
5		will create a more peaceful society. New training policies will also help
6		educate police officers, both current and future, and ensure more highly
7		skilled professionals enter law enforcement; and
8	WHEREAS,	The current system is steeped in systemic racism. Mass demonstrations
9		and protests throughout the last two years have highlighted this issue. A
10		lack of trust has developed on both sides; now, therefore, be it
11	RESOLVED,	That the UIL Congress here assembled make the following
12		recommendation for a nationwide restructuring of police departments;
13		and, be it
14	FURTHER RES	SOLVED, that more inclusive training curriculum shall be mandated.

A Resolution to Become Energy Independent by Creating More Sustainable Practices

1	WHEREAS,	The United States employs non-sustainable energy practices, which result
2		in a dependency on the natural resources of other countries to meet
3		energy needs; and
4	WHEREAS,	The United States must evaluate current practices, such as drilling and
5		production of fossil fuels, to determine how safer and more sustainable
6		methods could be applied. Renewable practices, such as wind and solar
7		energy, could be further researched and used more efficiently, thereby
8		decreasing our country's dependence on foreign resources; and
9	WHEREAS,	The United States currently is not using renewable energy production
10		effectively, and is relying on oil and gas production to meet our energy
11		demands. Current oil and gas production practices are detrimental to the
12		environment and deplete land and water resources; now, therefore, be it
13	RESOLVED,	That the UIL Congress here assembled make the following
14		recommendation to become more energy independent by expanding
15		green methods; and, be it
16	FURTHER RES	SOLVED, That the United States move towards more sustainable
17		production

A Resolution to Extend Eviction Moratoriums to Prevent Widespread Homelessness

1	WHEREAS,	Over 8 million Americans are facing losing their homes due to the
2		economic shockwave of Covid 19; and

4		recovering and workers behind on bills; and
5	WHEREAS,	Homelessness is a self-perpetuating cycle of poverty with virtually no
6		avenues for escape; and
7	WHEREAS,	Landlords have increased rent prices across the nation with worker pay
8		remaining steady or decreasing; now, therefore, be it
9	RESOLVED,	That the UIL Congress here assembled make the following
10		recommendation for extending the eviction moratorium for at least five
11		calendar years as of passing the resolution.

A Resolution to Reform the Judicial System from Retribution to Rehabilitation

1	WHEREAS,	The United States houses 2.3 million incarcerated individuals; and
2	WHEREAS,	This number is 22% of the world's total prison population with the
3		incarcerated stacked inside prisons focused on retribution; and
4	WHEREAS,	Retributive justice perpetuates the incarceration problem with a 76.6%
5		recidivism rate and acts as a form of structural violence after release with
6		released individuals not able to engage in democracy or effectively
7		engage with society; now, therefore, be it
8	RESOLVED,	That the UIL Congress here assembled make the following
9		recommendation for switching the justice paradigm of the United States
10		judicial system from retribution to that of rehabilitation.

A Resolution to Remove Cigarette Butts to Decrease Pollution

1	WHEREAS,	The biggest man-made contaminant of the world's oceans is not plastic straws,
2		or even plastic bags, but cigarette butts; and
3	WHEREAS,	98 percent of cigarette filters are made of plastic fibers (cellulose acetate) that
4		are tightly packed together, which leads to an estimated 1.69 billion pounds of
5		cigarette butts winding up as toxic trash each year; and
6	WHEREAS,	Of the 5.6 trillion cigarettes that are made with these filters each year, as
7		many as two-thirds are dumped irresponsibly; and
8	WHEREAS,	The trillions of cigarette butts generated each year throughout the world pose a
9		significant challenge for disposal regulations, primarily because there are
10		millions of points of disposal, along with the necessity to segregate, collect and
11		dispose of the butts in a safe manner, and cigarette butts are toxic, hazardous
12		waste; now, therefore be it
13	RESOLVED,	That the UIL Congress here assembled make the following recommendation: a
14		ban on further production of cigarettes with filters in the United States.

A Bill to Allocate Funding to Improve U.S. Infrastructure

1	BE IT ENACTE	D BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	The federal government of the United States of America will administer
3		\$1 trillion in funding over the next 6 years to address and correct
4		outdated and inefficient infrastructure investments.
5	SECTION 2.	Priority for the investment funding is as follows:
6		A. Energy efficient infrastructure.
7		B. Transportation infrastructure.
8		C. Public water and sewage infrastructure.
9		D. Renewable energy infrastructure.
10		E. Upkeep of ecological infrastructure.
11		F. Funding for local infrastructure projects and developments.
12		G. Additional infrastructure needs.
13	SECTION 3.	The United States Departments of Commerce, Transportation, Energy,
14		Interior, and the Environmental Protection Agency will oversee said
15		projections depending on specific jurisdictions and areas of expertise.
16		A. Funding will be through normal means.
17		B. A goal of 2 percent of the annual GDP investment in infrastructure
18		spending from all sources will be set going beyond 2028.
19	SECTION 4.	This bill will be implemented January 31, 2022.
20	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Resolution to Urge Pharmaceutical Companies to Self-Regulate Pricing of Drugs in the United States

WHEREAS,	Pharmaceutical companies have no clear method for establishing the
	price of prescription drugs; and
WHEREAS,	The price of the same drug seems to vary wildly depending on the point
	of distribution around the globe; and
WHEREAS,	Prescription drugs such as Insulin, Lisinopril, Humira, Stelara, Enbrel, and
	other high cost life-saving drugs are not items that should be luxuries
	available only to the wealthy; and
WHEREAS,	The citizens of the United States should not bear the full and complete
	burden of recouping the research and development costs of these drugs;
	and
WHEREAS,	Global price controls in other countries have been effective in keeping
	costs within the reach of the average household without a marked
	decrease in research and development; and
WHEREAS,	Pharmaceutical companies remain one of the most profitable sectors in
	the world economies for investors; now, therefore, be it
RESOLVED,	By the UIL congress here assembled that pharmaceutical companies be
	urged to self-regulate and reign in the costs to United States consumers
	of their products to within 10% of the average international market (AIM)
	price; and, be it
FURTHER RES	OLVED, That the UIL congress put those companies on notice, that if they
	choose to continue to take unfair advantage of the prescription drug
	markets in the United States there will be future legislative action to
	curtail such behavior and protect our citizens from abusive, monopolistic,
	market violations.

A Bill to Repatriate Foreign Terrorist Fighters to Prevent Further Unrest

1	BE IT ENACTE	D BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	The United States federal government will ensure that any Foreign
3		Terrorist Fighters (FTFs) are guaranteed repatriation.
4	SECTION 2.	A FTF is defined as any U.S. citizen who travels to a state other than the
5		United States to participate in, aide, or plan a war.
6	SECTION 3.	The U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services will implement and enforce
7		this bill by granting repatriation requests by FTFs.
8		A. The United States Department of Justice will be responsible for
9		prosecution of respective crimes committed by FTFs.
10	SECTION 4.	This bill shall be implemented immediately upon passage.
11	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Mandate Animal Distancing in Farms to Reduce Unethical Farming Conditions

1	BE IT ENACTE	D BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	Animals in farms be given one foot of space per 6 inches of animal
3		lengthwise.
4	SECTION 2.	Farms are defined as an area of land and its buildings used for growing
5		crops and rearing animals, typically under the control of one owner or
6		manager.
7	SECTION 3.	Oversight will be done through the Department of Agriculture
8		A. Farms will have one calendar year from passage of the bill to meet
9		compliance standards
10		B. Farms not meeting the bill will be fined \$100,000 per animal in the
11		general area of captivity.
12	SECTION 4.	Bill will become law upon passage with companies and farms having one
13		calendar year before implementation of fines.
14	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Resolution to Create a Work Program among Welfare Recipients to Increase Employability and Morale of Unemployed Americans

1	WHEREAS,	Welfare recipients need more opportunities for work; and
2	WHEREAS,	Opportunities for work could be provided through subsidized positions in the
3		private sector, as well as in public service works; and
4	WHEREAS,	Welfare recipients will be further enabled to contribute to society by gaining
5		employable skills and experience, and will begin working towards financial
6		independence; and
7	WHEREAS,	A work program would decrease the negative stigma surrounding those on
8		welfare, which is essential to improve the morale of the recipients; and
9	WHEREAS,	The gaining of employable skills and experience by welfare recipients would help
10		create a positive contribution to our society as well as positively impacting the
11		lives of those on government assistance and their families; now, therefore, be it
12	RESOLVED,	That the UIL Congress here assembled promote the idea of a work program
13		among welfare recipients.

A Resolution to Create Universal Gun Ownership Age Requirements

1	WHEREAS,	The United States federal government shall hereby require that each
2		individual state reduce the legal age to 16 years of age for purchasing,
3		owning and/or possessing a firearm; and
4	WHEREAS,	Owning shall be defined as having the firearm registered under your
5		name and in your possession or stored on one's personal property; and
6	WHEREAS,	Firearms shall be described and defined as a factory model unaltered
7		semi-automatic and single shot low caliber rifles and shotguns with no
8		firepower or performance enhancing modifications not including
9		handguns; and
10	WHEREAS,	Creating a universal age restriction/requirement among all states will
11		promote transparency; improving vetting, assessment, regulation,
12		mentoring, and supervisory administration; and
13	WHEREAS,	All states in the U.S. must provide six hours of mandatory hands-on
14		firearm safety classes and all states in the U.S. will have the option to
15		allow 16-year-olds to undergo multiple classes to own a low caliber
16		hunting rifle or shotgun, in addition to two 3-hour workshops (for a total
17		of 6 hours) and one 2-hour hands-on instructional class with a mandatory
18		final exam to complete the firearm safety class; now, therefore; be it
19	RESOLVED,	By the UIL Congress here assembled that universal gun ownership age
20		requirements in the U.S. will be instituted; and, be it
21	FURTHER RES	OLVED, That all laws in conflict shall become null and void upon passage.

A Bill to Ban the Use of Polygraphs in Courts to Help Eliminate the Chances of Unreliable Science Influencing the Jury

1	BE IT ENACTE	D BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	Polygraphs will no longer be admissible as evidence in criminal court
3		cases in the U.S. seeing as it is an unreliable source of information.
4	SECTION 2.	A polygraph test is a tool used to conduct physiological exams that
5		indicate changes in heart rate, respiration, skin conductivity, and more as
6		a person answers questions.
7	SECTION 3.	To ensure the enforcement of this bill, it will be overseen by the
8		Department of Justice
9		A. Funding will be through normal means.
10		B. Judges that allow violations of this legislation in their courts will be
11		subject to the penalties of contempt of court.
12	SECTION 4.	This bill will be implemented January 31, 2022.
13	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.
