11		recidivism rate and help those who are in dire need of aide.

A Bill to Require Interpreters at All Federal Buildings to Ensure Equal Access to All U.S. Citizens

- SECTION 1. This bill will require all federal buildings to provide an interpreter for any language that makes up 10% of the population within that district based on the most recent census report.
- SECTION 2. An interpreter is regarded as an employee that is fluent in the language
 and able to relay conversations in both languages. Languages will be both
 verbal (i.e. Spanish, Mandarin, Korean) and non-verbal (i.e. American Sign
 Language, British Sign Language).
- 9 **SECTION 3.** The implementation of this bill will be overseen by The Department of Health and Human Services.
- 11 **SECTION 4.** This bill will take effect on at the start of the next fiscal year.

3		article is proposed as an amendment to the Constitution of the United
4		States, which shall be valid to all intents and purposes as part of the
5		Constitution when ratified by the legislatures of three-fourths of the
6		several states within seven years from the date of its submission by the
7		Congress:
8		ARTICLE I Section 2-3
9	SECTION 1:	The following term limits for Congress will be imposed.
10		A. Members of the United States Senate will be allowed to serve a
11		maximum of 15 years.
12		B. Members of the United States House of Representatives will be
13		allowed to serve a maximum of 11 years.
14		C. Any time served in one chamber will count toward time served in the
15		other chamber.
16	SECTION 2:	The UIL Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate
17		legislation.

9	WHEREAS,	These genocides are causing millions of women daily to be sterilized and

13		need to prevent genocide from occurring once again but failed to take
14		steps that will prevent this from ever happening again; now, therefore be
15		it
16	RESOLVED,	That the UIL Congress here assembled require that the United States
17		Office of Foreign Assets Control impose sanctions on countries who are
18		committing acts of genocide to prevent future genocide and promote the
19		general welfare of the global community.

A Bill to Ban SAWs and LCAFDs

- 2 **SECTION 1**. The sale, transfer, manufacture, knowingly importation, or possession of
- a semiautomatic assault weapon (SAW) or large capacity ammunition
- feeding device (LCAFD) are hereby banned.
- 5 **SECTION 2**. A semiautomatic assault weapon has an ability to accept a detachable
- 6 magazine and has at least two of the following: A) folding or telescoping
- stock, B) pistol grip that protrudes conspicuously beneath the action of
- the weapon, C) bayonet mount, D) flash suppressor or threaded barrel
- designed to accommodate a flash suppressor, or E) grenade launcher. A
- large capacity ammunition feeding device means a magazine, belt, drum,
- feed strip, or similar device that has a capacity of, or that can be readily
- restored or converted to accept, more than 10 rounds of ammunition.
 - **SECTION 3.** The Justice Department and its branches of law enforcement officers will
- enforce this law. The law shall not apply to the possession, sale, or
- transfer of any semiautomatic assault weapon otherwise lawfully
- possessed under federal law on the date of enactment of the Assault
- Weapons Ban of 2022.

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- SECTION 4. This bill will take effect on January 31, 2023.
- SECTION 5. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

3		tax credit and increased deduction for expenses for public and charter
4		elementary and secondary school teachers.
5	SECTION 2.	Teacher refers to those with at least a bachelor's degree employed full time
6		in a public or charter school that is a teacher of record who provides direct
7		classroom instruction. Public and charter school refers to schools that are
8		publicly funded and free to attend for students in pre-kindergarten through

11		A. The current deduction for expenses of \$250 will be increased to \$1,000.
12		B. A tax credit equal to the sum of

16		c. \$10,000 for teaching in a Title 1 school.
17	SECTION 4.	This bill will be implanted for the 2024 tax year.

A Bill to Prohibit People Under the Age of 18 from Purchasing or Possessing Energy Drinks

- 1 BE IT ENACTED BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
- SECTION 1. Any person under the age of 18 years old shall be prohibited from both
 purchasing and possessing energy drinks.
- SECTION 2. Energy drinks are defined as a beverage containing at least sixty-five
 milligrams of caffeine per eight fluid ounces and contains
 methylxanthines, B vitamins, or herbal ingredients. The term does not
 include coffee or any substantially coffee-based beverage.
- 8 **SECTION 3.** The Food and Drug Administration (FDA) shall enforce this bill.

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- A. Anyone guilty of distributing, delivering, giving, or selling an energy drink to an individual under the age of 18 shall be punished by a fine not less than \$100 for the first offense, \$250 for the second offense and \$500 for the third offense.
 - B. Additional penalties shall be levied on businesses who have repeated offenses within their establishment.
- 15 **SECTION 4.** This policy shall go into effect immediately upon passage.

A Bill to Implement Ranked Choice Voting to Make Every Vote Matter

The United States will move from the electoral first past-the-post system 2 to a popular vote ranked choice ballot. 3 "Electoral first past-the-post system" is system in which the candidate SECTION 2. 4 who receives the majority of the electoral college vote is declared the 5 winner. "Ranked choice voting" is a system in which voters rank 6 candidates from most favorable to least favorable. After initial votes are 7 counted, votes for the least popular candidate will have their second 8 9 choice counted instead. A Bill to Approve the Implementation of and Funding for the Use of Artificial Intelligence in Health Care

1	BE II ENACIE	D BY THIS OIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	The use of artificial intelligence (AI) for the purpose of approved health
3		care application will be classified as part of standard treatment for
4		patients in need of long-term assisted care and covered within all
5		federally funded health care insurance programs and facilities.
6	SECTION 2.	It is understood that the operation of any AI system or robotic equipment
7		will be monitored and controlled by human medical professionals. In
8		addition, as AI technology improves and becomes increasingly
9		autonomous, all programming and development will be designed in good
10		faith and within the bounds of any AI related legislature passed into law
11		by the U.S. Congress.
12	SECTION 3.	This bill will be overseen by the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid
13		Services and Energy and Commerce Committees for approval of
14		prescribed AI care as standard practice when deemed appropriate, and
15		for approval of funding and granting of purchasing power for AI systems

A Bill to Ban Trading of Stocks by Members of Congress

3		of Congress to secure any privately owned tradable assets in a blind trust.
4		Elected members of Congress will be ineligible to actively participate in
5		any form of stock trading for the duration of their term.
6	SECTION 2.	Stock trading will be defined as any exchange of shares of any company
7		through the stock market. A blind trust is defined as a financial
8		arrangement in which a person in public office gives the administration of
9		private business interests to an independent trust in order to prevent
10		conflict of interest.
11	SECTION 3.	The Financial Industry Regulatory Authority, with oversight from the
12		Securities and Exchange Commission, will oversee enforcement of this
13		bill.
14	SECTION 4.	This bill will be implemented 90 days after passing.
