A Bill to Give Working Opportunities to Fight the Mental Health Crisis for Veterans

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT: 2 SECTION 1. This policy will give policing agency jobs in school districts to veterans. 3 SECTION 2. Policing agency is a part of an organization that deals with security and 4 protection of the organization. 5 SECTION 3. The US Department of Education and individual state's Military Department will 6 work to provide jobs in order to lessen the mental health crisis for veterans. 7 Each school will require veterans with licenses to take the place of security 8 in schools. 9 Every veteran will be required to go through a small certification, similar to 10 police working on school grounds. 11 SECTION 4. This bill will be enacted in its passing.

A Bill to Prohibit Employers from Firing Employees for Stopping Offenders

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT: 2 SECTION 1. An employer is prohibited from punishing, including termination of employment, 3 any employee who voluntarily attempts to stop a shoplifter or other offender 4 from causing monetary or physical harm to a business. 5 SECTION 2. A shoplifter is defined as a person who attempts to steal store merchandise 6 without paying and may or may not use force or violence to do so. Offender is 7 defined as anyone seeking to cause harm to the business, employees, or 8 pedestrians currently inhabiting the establishment. 9 SECTION 3. The U.S. Department of Labor (DOL) will oversee the implementation and 10 enforcement of this bill. Failure to adhere to this law will result in fines to the 11 employer, not to be less than a year of the terminated employee's salary, 12 working a minimum of 40-hour week every week for the next calendar year from 13 the date of termination. In addition, the employer shall pay restitution to the 14 terminated employee by way of lump sum in the amount equaling that of the 15 employee's current salary rate for the following six months, working a minimum 16 of a 40-hour work week every week from the date of termination. 17 **SECTION 4.** This bill will go into effect January 15, 2025. 18 **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

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A Bill to Hold Hospitals Liable for Costs Resulting in Medicinal Error

1	BE IT ENACTE	D BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	All patients admitted to hospitals will be required to undergo medication testing
3		in all cases except those that are imminently life-threatening. In the event a
4		hospital is aware of any medication intolerance or declines to perform the test,
5		they will be held liable for any untoward effects resulting from drug intake.
6	SECTION 2.	Complications are defined as, but not limited to, any extra medication costs,
7		extra equipment, nursing/specialist fees, longer stays, rehabilitation, and other
8		drug administration to counteract the effects of the drug reaction.
9	SECTION 3.	The United States Department of Health and Human Services and the
10		Department of Justice will oversee the enforcement of this bill.
11		A. Failure to meet these requirements will result in the hospital becoming
12		responsible for all costs incurred after the incident, as well as any previous
13		expenses.
14		B. Adhering to these guidelines will ensure that the hospital is held accountable
15		and responsible for managing the financial consequences of the situation.
16	SECTION 4.	This bill will go into effect January 15, 2024.
17	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Ban the Over-Prescription and Misuse of Antidepressants by Medical Professionals to Their Patients

BE IT ENACTED BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT: 2 SECTION 1. Requires a patient to have a psychological evaluation by a primary care doctor 3 and a psychologist before being placed on antidepressant medication. 4 SECTION 2. Antidepressants are selective serotonin reuptake inhibitors (SSRIs), serotonin 5 and norepinephrine reuptake inhibitors (SNRIs) and atypical antidepressants, 6 which are newer antidepressants that don't fit into other groups. A psychological 7 evaluation is defined as the process of gathering information about a person 8 through mental health services, with the purpose of making a diagnosis. 9 SECTION 3. The National Institute of Mental Health (NIMH), under the jurisdiction of the 10 Department of Health and Human Services, will oversee the enforcement of this 11 law. 12 Α. Physicians who prescribe above the listed medications without following 13 these procedures will be put on a two-year probation and must attend a 14 minimum of 20 clock hours of medical training on these medications and 15 their effects on patients. Repeat offenders will have their medical license 16 revoked. 17 SECTION 4. This bill will go into effect January 15, 2024. 18 All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void. SECTION 5. Introduced for UIL Congressional Debate by Whitesboro High School.



A Bill to Ban the Immigration Marriage Fraud Amendments

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT: 2 **SECTION 1.** To prevent citizenship denaturalization and visa ineligibility resulting from 3 purported fraudulent marriage between immigrants, the Immigration Marriage 4 Fraud Amendments (i.e., IMFA) shall be banned. 5 IMFA engendered procedural changes aimed at curtailing fraudulent SECTION 2. 6 immigration marriages. Denaturalization is the process of stripping citizens of 7 their conditional citizenship status. Thus, this ban shall nullify all sections of the 8 1986 sham immigration marriage statute. 9 SECTION 3. The Department of State and the Immigration and Custom Enforcement 10 Agencies shall oversee the implementation of this bill. 11 A. ICE agencies shall be responsible for ceasing ongoing investigations related 12 to suspected marriage fraud, and shall not conduct any further 13 investigations under the auspice of IMFA. 14 В. The Department of State shall work with relevant agencies, such as the 15 United States Citizenship and Immigration Services (i.e., the USCIS), to 16 develop new procedures for screening visa applications to prevent fraud 17 and abuse. 18 SECTION 4. This bill will go into effect on January 1st, 2025. 19 SECTION 5. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void. Introduced for UIL Congressional Debate by Clerk.



A Bill to Require the Release of All Police Body Camera Footage to the Public to Create Better Transparency Within Police

1	BE IT ENACTE	D BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	All federally funded law enforcement agencies will be required to release all
3		footage involving officer-involved shootings, deaths, and injuries from law
4		enforcement warn body cameras within 48 hours of footage being turned in. All
5		footage will be available to the public in an open-access public records database.
6		The footage will be unredacted besides personal identifiable information.
7	SECTION 2.	Personal Identifiable information- will be defined as any representation of
8		information that permits the identity of an individual to whom the information
9		applies to be reasonably inferred by either direct or indirect means, including but
.0		not limited to credit cards, medical records, and faces.
.1	SECTION 3.	The Department of Public Safety, in conjunction with the Department of
.2		Homeland Security, will oversee implementing and enforcing this bill.
.3		A. Failure to comply with this law will result in the reduction of federal funding
.4		for the specific agency in violation.
.5	SECTION 4.	This bill will go into effect starting January 15, 2025.
.6	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Recommission U.S. Highway 66 to Revitalize the Highway and Increase Tourism

1	BE IT ENACTE	D BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:	
2	SECTION 1.	The United States shall recommission U.S. Highway 66 from Santa	
3		Monica, California to Chicago, Illinois in order to revitalize the highway	
4		and increase tourism to towns and cities along the route.	
5	SECTION 2.	"Recommission" should be defined as establishing new signage for the	
6		entirety of the route, re-paving dilapidated sections of the highway, and	
7		co-signing any interstates or highways that took over sections of U.S.	
8		Highway 66.	
9	SECTION 3.	The United States Department of Transportation will oversee the	
10		implementation of this bill.	
11		A. Any roads currently designated as "Historic Route 66" or "Route 66	
12		Scenic Byway" would revert to U.S. Highway 66.	
13		B. Any sections replaced by other highways would receive U.S. Highway	
14		66 signage along with their current designations.	
15		C. Individual states will be responsible for re-paving and maintenance	
16		of roads after re-signage is complete.	
17	SECTION 4.	This bill will go into effect immediately upon passage.	
18	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Offer Work for Homeless People to Ease the Rising Homeless Population

- ¹ BE IT ENACTED BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
- ² **SECTION 1**. This bill will offer jobs to the homeless population, specifically in
- ³ agriculture fields and farms.
- ⁴ **SECTION 2**. Agricultural places of work are in need of more jobs. Most farms offer
- ⁵ food, clothing, and shelter in exchange for help.
- ⁶ **SECTION 3.** The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) will offer jobs where farm
- hands and help are needed in the agricultural field.
- 8 A. The USDA will advertise to the homeless population and inform
- 9 them about the need for agricultural work.
- ¹⁰ **SECTION 4.** This bill will be enacted on May 1, 2024.
- 11 **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Resolution to Stop All Federal Student Loans Except in Six Areas

1	WHEREAS,	Federal student loans have exceeded 1.7 trillion dollars; and	
2	WHEREAS,	41.7% of all students' debts are in default; and	
3	WHEREAS,	Over 68% of all students receive non-employable degrees; and	
4	WHEREAS,	The STEM, health services, and educational fields are falling behind in qualified	
5		employment;	
6	WHEREAS,	The cost of seeking degree's range anywhere from \$300,000 to \$400,000; now,	
7		therefore, be it	
8	RESOLVED,	That the UIL Congress here assembled offer the following solution: Only offer	
9		federally insured loans in STEM, health services, and educational fields.	
10		A. No loan payment shall begin until 5 years of completion of college.	
11		B. Anyone who remains in the educational field shall not have to pay any	
12		money back.	
13		C. Anyone remaining in health education will only have to pay half back.

A Bill to Regulate the Use of AI Generated Deepfakes

1	BE IT ENACTED BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:		
2	SECTION 1.	The	United States Federal government shall ban the use of personalized artificial intelligence
3		(AI)	generated deepfakes.
4	SECTION 2.	Artif	icial Intelligence, or AI, is the theory and development of computer systems able to
5		perf	orm tasks that normally require human intelligence. Deepfakes shall be defined as a
6		phot	to or video of a person in which their face or body has been digitally altered so that they
7		арре	ear to be someone else. A portable device is a small form factor of a computing device
8		that	is designed to be held and used in the hands like laptops, tablets, watches, and
9		sma	rtphones.
LO	SECTION 3.	The	Department of Health and Human Services shall establish the Artificial Intelligence
l1		Ove	rsight Agency (AIOA) to investigate and monitor all personal use of artificial intelligence
L2		via A	AIOA offices.
L3		A.	The penalty for creating deepfakes for revenge pornography would be a
L4			\$10,000 fine and a maximum sentence of 5 years in federal prison.
L5		В.	The penalty for creating deepfakes for defamation would be a \$5,000 fine and
L6			a maximum of 100 hours of community service.
L7		C.	The penalty for creating deepfakes for politically targeted advertising would
L8			be \$15,000, a maximum of 5 years of federal prison, and a maximum of 100
19			hours of community service.
20		D.	Any violations of subsections A-C would retract the right of AI use for
21			violators permanently.
22	SECTION 4.	This	bill shall be implemented on January 1, 2025.
23	SECTION 5.	. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.
