### A Bill to Legalize the Sale of Non-Vital Organs to Promote Organ Transplants

1	BE IT ENACTE	D BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	The sale of non-vital organs will now be legal only at Mayo Clinic Care
3		Network (MCCN) hospitals to increase organ pools therefore lowering the
4		cost of transplantations to recipients.
5	SECTION 2.	Non-vital organs are defined as any organ that can be transplanted
6		without the donor needing assistance to live through treatments and/or
7		medicine. MCCN is the highest-ranking transplant hospital network
8		nationwide therefore will oversee all non-vital organ transplants. Only
9		hospitals that are a part of the Mayo network may participate in the
10		procurement and transplanting of non-vital organs.
l1	SECTION 3.	The Health Resources and Services Administration will see that:
12		A. Anyone looking to give an organ will be spared the operation costs as
13		well as be compensated with \$10,000.
L4		B. Any hospital who is not part of the Mayo Clinic Care Network that
15		performs a transplant of or sells a non-vital organ will be fined
16		\$100,000, doubling with each offense.
L7	SECTION 4.	This bill will go into effect on January 1, 2025.
L8	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

## A Bill to Create an Independent Redistricting Commission

1	BE IT ENACTE	ED BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	All 50 states are to establish an Independent Redistricting Commission
3		every 10 years after the United States Census takes place in order to
4		redraw congressional district lines.
5	SECTION 2.	The Federal Election Commission will work alongside the states to
6		implement this legislation.
7		A. Independent Redistricting Commissions will have their members
8		selected based on applicants from the general public, reviews and
9		interviews with potential commissioners, and then a lottery will be
LO		conducted to select the final members.
l1		B. The state legislature may only intervene in independent commissions
12		if the new map violates the state constitution or the United States
L3		constitution.
L4		C. If the state legislature rejects the new map, the independent
15		commission must continue to redraw the map until it is deemed
L6		lawful under the Constitution.
L7	SECTION 3.	This legislation will take effect on January 1, 2025.
L8	SECTION 4.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

## A Resolution to Increase Immigration to Solve America's Economic and Social Issues

1	WHEREAS,	America's National Debt is at 98% of the nation's GDP and is projected to
2		be north of 150% by 2050, and any meaningful tax hike or spending cut
3		would have dire consequences; and
4	WHEREAS,	The U.S. fertility rate has not exceeded replacement level since 2008; and
5	WHEREAS,	These factors would indicate future governmental fiscal instability and
6		population decline; and
7	WHEREAS,	These factors would render our economic and social systems
8		unsustainable and lead to their collapse; now, therefore, be it
9	RESOLVED,	That the UIL Congress here assembled call for the Executive Branch to
10		reach a 5% annual increase in year-to-year foreign immigration to the
11		United States.

# A Bill to Raise the Minimum Wage to \$17 to Adjust for Inflation

1	BE IT ENACTE	D BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	The United States shall establish the federal minimum wage as \$17 an
3		hour by 2026 to adjust for increased inflation.
4		A. The current federal minimum wage of \$7.25 an hour shall increase by
5		\$3.25 increments every year, reaching \$17 by 2026.
6		B. The Federal Government shall increase the investment income and
7		individual income taxes placed on households with yearly incomes of \$1
8		million or more by 5%.
9	SECTION 2.	Federal minimum wage shall be defined as the lowest wage per hour that
LO		a worker may be paid in all US states. Investment income shall be defined
11		as the profit made through any investment type, including but not limited
12		to sale of stocks, capital gains, dividends, etc. Individual income shall be
13		defined as individual money earned through businesses or other work.
L4	SECTION 3.	The Department of Labor (DOL) and The Department of Labor's Wage
15		and Hour Division (WHD), as well as the Internal Revenue Service (IRS)
16		shall be tasked with implementing this legislation.
L7	SECTION 4.	This legislation shall go into effect on January 1st, 2024.
L8	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

1	WHEREAS,	Ukraine faces ongoing security challenges and threats to its territorial
2		integrity; and
3	WHEREAS,	Russia's aggressive actions in Ukraine, including the illegal annexation of
4		Crimea and continued support for separatist movements in Eastern
5		Ukraine shows continued attempts to undermine the stability of Europe
6		and violate international law; and
7	WHEREAS,	Ukraine's aspiration to join the North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO)
8		is a strategic imperative for regional stability and security; and
9	WHEREAS,	Ukraine's membership in NATO would enhance collective defense
10		capabilities and promote peace and stability in Europe; and
11	WHEREAS,	Ukraine has made significant progress in implementing democratic
12		reforms and aligning its institutions with NATO standards; and
13	WHEREAS,	Ukraine's inclusion in NATO would serve as a deterrent to further Russian
14		aggression and provide a framework to enhanced cooperation in
15		addressing shared security challenges; now, therefore, be it
16	RESOLVED,	That the UIL Congress here assembled supports Ukraine's ascension into
17		the North Atlantic Treaty Organization.

#### A Bill to Build Affordable Housing for Low Income Households

- 1 BE IT ENACTED BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
- 2 **SECTION 1**. An additional five billion dollars in funds will be allocated in the Federal
- Budget for the construction of affordable housing in the U.S.
- 4 **SECTION 2**. The threshold of affordable housing is no more than 30% of a
- 5 household's income. The price of housing has risen in recent years while
- 6 household income has not, and the average household is unable to afford
- 7 a house.
- 8 **SECTION 3.** The Department of Housing and Urban Development will oversee the
- 9 construction of these houses and neighborhoods.
- A. Each states average income will be taken into account when the
- prices of the housing is determined.
- 12 **SECTION 4.** Congress will implement this bill immediately upon approval.
- SECTION 5. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

#### A Bill to Ban Lab-Grown Meat for Human Consumption

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- 2 **SECTION 1**. The sale of all lab-grown meat intended for human consumption in the
- 3 United States shall be prohibited in supermarket and grocery stores as
- 4 well as the restaurant industry.
- 5 **SECTION 2**. Let the term "lab-grown" be defined as any meat that has been
- 6 developed by animal cell culture.
- 7 **SECTION 3.** The U.S Food and Drug Administration (FDA) and the United States
- 8 Department of Agriculture (USDA) will oversee the enforcement of this
- 9 bill.
- SECTION 4. The implementation of this bill will take effect immediately upon passing.
- SECTION 5. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

1	WHEREAS,	China has been increasing investment in international communities,
2		importing larger amounts of semiconductors, increasing funding to local
3		production, and establishing power in South Africa; and
4	WHEREAS,	The U.S. is losing imports in semiconductors to China who is increasing
5		investment towards developing semiconductors. Increasing resources
6		towards developing semiconductors; and
7	WHEREAS,	The U.S. is facing a supply chain issue due to a shortage of
8		semiconductors; and
9	WHEREAS,	A shortage of semiconductors will lead to higher inflation, technological
10		supply issues and ultimately economic downturn,
11	WHEREAS,	increasing relations with countries that import semiconductors to China
12		such as Japan, South Korea, Singapore, Malaysia, and Taiwan would make
13		the U.S. more competitive in the Asian pacific region; now, therefore, be
14		it
15	RESOLVED,	That the UIL Congress here assembled shall increase economic relations
16		and encourage trading with leading countries in the semiconductor
17		industry.

#### A Bill to Halt the Willow Project to Preserve the Atmosphere

2	SECTION 1.	This bill will halt the Willow Project, an on-shore project ConocoPhillips
3		initiated March 13, 2023 to drill oil in Alaska on the National Petroleum
4		Reserve, owned by the United States Federal Government. The Willow
5		Project is estimated to emit 9.3 million metric tons of carbon gas into the
6		atmosphere yearly.
7	SECTION 2.	The atmosphere shall be defined as any gas surrounding the earth,
8		specifically the Ozone layer, which is damaged by the release of toxic
9		gasses.
LO	SECTION 3.	The Environmental Protection Agency will oversee implementation and

### A Bill to Provide Inclusive Food Options at Public Schools

1	BE IT ENACTE	D BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	This bill will provide inclusive lunches in all public schools. This will
3		include Halal, Kosher, and Vegetarian lunch options.
4	SECTION 2.	Halal is defined as food that is permitted or prepared according to Islamic
5		Law. Kosher is defined as food which is prepared to the standards of
6		Jewish dietary laws. Vegetarian is defined as food containing no meat
7		products.
8	SECTION 3.	The department of Education will oversee this transition by providing the
9		funding and training for cafeteria staff to make this inclusive change.
10		A. Meal Plans will be provided but not required if staff has other options
11		prepared in accordance to standards
12	SECTION 4.	If passed, the actions of this bill will be implemented no more than 60
13		days after passing.
14	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

#### A Bill to Ban Harmful Ingredients in Cosmetics to **Promote Health of Aquatic Life**

BE IT ENACTED BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT: 1 Cosmetic Manufacturers may not use non-reef-safe ingredients. **SECTION 1**. 2 SECTION 2. "Non-reef-safe" is defined as including one or more of the following: 3 Oxybenzone, Octinoxate, Octocrylene, Homosalate, 4-methylbenzylidene 4 Camphor, PABA, parabens, Triclosan, any nanoparticles or "nano-sized" 5 Zinc or Titanium, or any form of microplastic. 6 SECTION 3. The Food and Drug Administration in collaboration with the National 7 Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration Fisheries will oversee the 8 enforcement of this bill. 9 A. The FDA will control the substances contained within cosmetic items. 10 B. NOAA will work cooperatively with the FDA to approve substances 11 appropriate for marine life. 12 SECTION 4. This legislation will take effect on January 1, 2025. 13 SECTION 5. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

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### A Resolution to Refocus Public School Responses to Drug Abuse on Rehabilitation Instead of Punishment

1	WHEREAS,	Drug addiction in teenage populations is rapidly increasing with
2		seemingly no viable solution; and
3	WHEREAS,	Current public school reactions revolve around retribution instead of
4		rehabilitation, often forgoing any real solvency; and
5	WHEREAS,	UCLA Health describes that adolescent drug addiction has risen
6		exponentially during the past few years; and
7	WHEREAS,	The entrance of fentanyl in the drug market makes drug addiction in
8		teenagers even more dangerous; and
9	WHEREAS,	Rehabilitation programs are substantially more effective than retribution
10		programs in curbing addiction; now, therefore be it
11	RESOLVED,	That the UIL Congress here assembled work to refocus public school
12		responses to drug addiction on rehabilitation instead of punishment.

## A Bill to Give Convicted Felons the Right to Vote

1	BE IT ENACTE	D BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	Any currently imprisoned or released felon will now be given the
3		opportunity to vote. For any person currently incarcerated, an absentee
4		ballot will be provided. Voting jurisdiction for the currently incarcerated
5		will be determined by the location of the detention center.
6	SECTION 2.	Felons shall be defined as any person found guilty of committing a felony
7		criminal offense.
8	SECTION 3.	The Federal Election Committee (FEC) will oversee the implementation of
9		this legislation.
10		A. Along with the FEC, each state's Secretary of State shall be
11		responsible that every convicted felon is given the opportunity to
12		register to vote.
13		B. Furthermore, the Secretary of State's office shall ensure the delivery
L4		of voter registration paperwork and absentee ballots to the currently
15		incarcerated felons.
L6	SECTION 4.	This legislation will take effect upon passage of this legislation.
L7	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

8		now, therefore, be it	
9	RESOLVED,	That the UIL Congress here assembled make the following	
10		recommendation to build new nuclear power plants in high-energy use	
11		areas and/or upgrade existing plants.

3		assisted suicides across all places of medical care in the United States of	
4		America.	
5	SECTION 2.	Physician-Assisted Suicide is defined as when a physician facilitates a	
6		patient's death by providing the necessary means or information to carry	
7		out said act.	
8	SECTION 3.	The United States Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) and	
9		the United States Department of Justice (DOJ) will oversee the	
10		implementation of the bill.	
11		A. The Department of Health and Human Services will oversee the	
12		retraining of physicians and altering of policies in coordination with	
L3		Section 1.	
L4		B. The Department of Justice will oversee the enforcement of Section 1	
15		and ensure that physicians do not continue to provide these services.	
16	SECTION 4.	This legislation will take effect on January 1, 2025.	
L7	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

### A Bill to Restrict Land Ownership by Foreign Countries to Prevent a Threat to National Security

1	BE IT ENACTED BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:		
2	SECTION 1.	Foreign nations will not be permitted to own land within a fifty-mile	
3		radius of government property, and cities with a population of more than	
4		250,000 must consent to a bimonthly inspection conducted by local law	
5		enforcement or military personnel, and cannot extract non-renewable	
6		resources from owned land.	
7	SECTION 2.	Military bases, Federal, State, and City-owned agencies and offices are all	
8		to be considered government property and are subject to protection	
9		under this bill. If a city with foreign land experiences a population spike	
10		above 250,000 the foreign land may retain ownership as long as it	
11		consents to US Laws and regulations and bimonthly inspections.	
12	SECTION 3.	The US Departments of Defense and the Interior will oversee the	
13		enforcement of this bill.	
14		A. The Department of Defense will work to ensure that no national	
15		threat or conspiracy comes from foreign owned land.	
16		B. The Department of the Interior will ensure that no non-renewable	
17		resources are extracted from the surface.	
18	SECTION 4.	The legislation will be implemented on January 1, 2025.	
19	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

#### A Bill to End Qualified Immunity to Protect the Citizens of the United States

- 1 BE IT ENACTED BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
- 2 **SECTION 1**. Qualified Immunity cannot be used to shield police officers from
- 3 consequences when they violate and constitutional or statutory right in
- 4 any court of law.
- 5 **SECTION 2**. Qualified Immunity is a type of legal immunity that shields state and local
- officials from sued by individuals whose rights have been violated unless
- in cases where a "clearly established," right was violated, which means
- that no earlier case held that certain action was unconstitutional.
- 9 **SECTION 3.** Department of Justice would enforce this by changing the way that trials
- are deliberated and the ways that government officials are held
- responsible for their actions.
- **SECTION 4.** If passed, this bill should be enacted January 1, 2025.
- SECTION 5. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

#### A Bill to Allow a Federal Jobs Guarantee

1	BE IT ENACTED BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:		
2	SECTION 1.	The United States of America shall adopt a federal jobs guarantee to	
3		combat unemployment.	
4	SECTION 2.	Unemployment will be defined as people who are capable of working,	
5		actively seeking work, and are unable to find employment. A federal jobs	
6		guarantee will be defined as a government funded program that provides	
7		living wage jobs to those seeking employment.	
8	SECTION 3.	The United States Department of Labor will create jobs by expanding	
9		publicly owned works in order to allow everybody the ability to work.	
10		A. The government will expand governmental programs, such as the	
11		Green New Deal, in which people will be able to work for the	
12		government in order to build green infrastructure.	
13		B. The Department of Labor will open up government funded projects	
14		such as the construction of airports, dams, post offices and hospitals.	
15	SECTION 4.	This bill will be put into effect on January 5, 2025.	
16	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

## A Bill to Eradicate the Giant African Land Snail as an Invasive Species

BE IT ENACTED BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT: 1 The United States shall fund and implement early detection and rapid **SECTION 1**. 2 response infrastructure to identify and eradicate infestations of the 3 invasive species and prevent their return. Currently, the state of Florida is 4 experiencing an outbreak of Giant African Land Snails. These invasive 5 species cause monumental damage not only to agriculture, but structural 6 integrity of buildings and have cost more than \$20 million already. 7 SECTION 2. Giant African Land Snail is defined as Lissachatina fulica, a species of large 8 land snail that belongs in the subfamily Achatininae of the family 9 Achatinidae. Invasive species shall be defined as introduced, nonnative 10 organism (disease, parasite, plant, or animal) that begins to spread or 11 expand its range from the site of its original introduction and that has the 12 potential to cause harm to the environment, the economy, or to human 13 health. 14 **SECTION 3.** The USDA shall be allocated \$10 million to implement early detection and 15 rapid response (EDRR) infrastructure to identify and eradicate 16 infestations of invasive species and prevent their return. 17

- wild tigers. Furthermore, captive breeding has saved numerous species
- 8 from extinction.

SECTION 1.

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- 9 **SECTION 2**. Captive breeding shall be defined as breeding within healthy, controlled environments like zoos or other facilities.
- SECTION 3. As such, the US Fish and Wildlife Service shall also be allocated \$20 million to increase captive breeding and research into conservation
- efforts for all species of tigers.
- 14 **SECTION 4.** This law will take effect January 1, 2025.
- SECTION 5. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.
