# A Bill to Expedite the Control of Illegal Immigration

1	BE IT ENACTE	D BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	In an effort to control the tsunami of immigration currently affecting the
3		United States and especially its southern border, the following triggers
4		will be mandated. Any month realizing a total in excess of 10,000
5		undocumented immigrants crossing into the United States will require
6		that the affected border segment(s) be closed until the U. S. Congress
7		addresses the crisis by enacting appropriate and targeted legislation.
8	SECTION 2.	Closing the border will mean a full closure of legal and illegal crossings via
9		ports of entry and other points. This may include the use of the military if
10		required. Enacted legislation will be given a three-month period to lower
11		the illegal immigration below the threshold before subsequent iteration
12		of the bill.
13	SECTION 3.	The United States Border Patrol will be authorized to implement this
14		policy upon reaching the threshold.
15		A. The Commissioner for U.S. Customs and Border Protection will be
16		authorized to close any section of the U.S. border exhibiting the
17		increase in illegal immigration.
18		B. Commerce may be exempted at the discretion of the President.
19	SECTION 4.	This bill will go into effect immediately upon passage.
20	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

# A Bill to Abolish Property Taxes

1	BE IT ENACTE	D BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	Property taxes are one of the most significant annual costs for
3		homeowners.
4	SECTION 2.	Property tax-a tax paid on property owned by an individual or other legal
5		entity
6	SECTION 3.	The U.S. Department of Treasury will implement this bill.
7		A. Property taxes are unequal and disproportionate.
8	SECTION 4.	This bill will be implemented by January 2025.
9	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

## A Bill to Restrict Pharmaceutical Companies' Influence on Lawmaking and Campaigning

1	BE IT ENACTED BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:	
2	SECTION 1.	A bill should be passed to prevent pharmaceutical companies from
3		influencing lawmaking and campaigning.
4	SECTION 2.	Pharmaceutical company- a commercial business licensed to research,
5		develop, market and/or distribute drugs.
6		Influence - the capacity to have an effect on the character, development,
7		or behavior of someone or something, or the effect itself.
8	SECTION 3.	The Federal Drug Administration will oversee the implementation.
9		A. Create a committee to oversee stricter laws concerning
10		pharmaceutical companies.
11		B. Develop a checks and balances committee to oversee donations.
12	SECTION 4.	This bill should be passed and implemented by January 2025.
13	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

## A Resolution to Recommend a Joint U.S./Canadian/U.N. Presence in Haiti to Facilitate the Reestablishment of a Legitimate Government

1	WHEREAS,	The nation of Haiti has been in a power vacuum since the assassination of
2		its president in 2021 resulting in unprecedented chaos; and
3	WHEREAS,	The terms of Haiti's last 10 remaining senators officially expired in
4		January 2023, leaving the Caribbean country without a single elected
5		government official; and
6	WHEREAS,	The nation is now controlled by the G9 gang coalition with Haiti
7		devastated by a set of intersecting catastrophes: famine, cholera,
8		rampant drug trading through the international community, devastating
9		gang violence, fuel shortages, and economic collapse; and
10	WHEREAS,	The joint mission to bring order and peace in Haiti would include
11		diplomatic, military, economic, and humanitarian restoration efforts;
12		now, therefore, be it
13	RESOLVED,	That the UIL Congress here assembled make the following
14		recommendation for a multi-lateral mission among the U.S., Canada, and
15		the U.N. and, be it
16	FURTHER RES	OLVED, That this endeavor is not restricted by a deadline for resolution
17		nor intended to be a permanent involvement.

## A Bill to Expand Access to Naloxone to Combat Opioid Crisis

1	BE IT ENACTE	D BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	This bill seeks to address the national opioid crisis by implementing a
3		multifaceted approach that includes prevention, treatment, hard
4		reduction, and law enforcement to curb the opioid epidemic.
5	SECTION 2.	Opioid Crisis: a public health emergency characterized by the widespread
6		misuse and addiction to opioid substances.
7		Harm reduction: Strategies and programs designed to reduce the
8		negative consequences of drug use.
9		Treatment and Recovery Programs: Programs/services aimed at helping
10		individuals with opioid addiction receive treatment and counseling.
11		Naloxone: A medication that can rapidly reverse opioid effects.
12	SECTION 3.	Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA)
13		will oversee the enforcement of the bill along with harm reduction and
14		treatment and recovery programs.
15	SECTION 4.	This bill shall go into effect January 1, 2025, with immediate
16		implementation of naloxone distribution programs overseen by SAMHSA.
17	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

## A Bill to Establish Age Restrictions for all Federal Government Positions to Ensure a More Diverse and Representative Government

1	BE IT ENACTED BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:		
2	SECTION 1.	Individuals will not be allowed to run for any government positions after	
3		they reach the age of sixty-five years old. The age limit restricts anyone	
4		above sixty-five to run or attempt to run for office.	
5	SECTION 2.	Government position shall be defined as a role or job within a	
6		government organization, encompassing elected and appointed officials	
7		responsible for governance and administration.	
8	SECTION 3.	This bill will be enforced by the Department of Justice. Individuals will	
9		automatically not be allowed to run for office and will be discarded from	
10		the system if not in accordance.	
11	SECTION 4.	This legislation will be implemented in January 2028.	
12	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

#### A Bill to Ban AI Humanoid Creation

1	BE IT ENACTE	D BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	The United States federal government shall ban the creation of AI
3		Humanoids.
4	SECTION 2.	AI Humanoids is a non-human entity with human form or characteristics.
5	SECTION 3.	The United States Department of Defense (DOD) shall oversee the
6		enforcement of this legislation.
7		A. The DOD will monitor all creation of new AI technologies.
8	SECTION 4.	This legislation will take effect immediately upon passage.
9	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.
	Introduced for	UIL Congressional Debate by Lubbock Roosevelt High School.



#### A Bill to Require Open Primary Elections Throughout the Entire United States

1	BE IT ENACTE	D BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	Primary elections will become unanimously open throughout the entire
3		United States.
4	SECTION 2.	Open primary elections are defined as a primary election where voters
5		are not required to declare party affiliation.
6	SECTION 3.	States that do not currently have this model of primary elections will
7		adopt it under the advisement and regulation of the Federal Election
8		Commission (FEC).
9	SECTION 4.	This bill will be implemented during the next primary election after
10		passing.
11	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

#### A Bill to Establish Rehabilitation Instead of Incarceration

1	BE IT ENACTE	D BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	All inmates or individuals who are convicted with charges of either
3		alcohol abuse or drug possession will be placed into rehabilitation centers
4		as substitution to incarceration.
5	SECTION 2.	Incarceration is defined as the state of being confined in prison.
6		Rehabilitation is defined as the action to restore someone to health or
7		normal life through training and therapy.
8	SECTION 3.	The Federal Sentencing Commission will oversee this legislation.
9		A. The Federal Sentencing Commission will ensure that any individual
10		convicted of either possession of narcotics, possession of
11		paraphernalia, illegal use of a prescription drug, marijuana
12		possession, DUI, DWI, minor in possession of alcohol, open container,
13		and public intoxication will be given the opportunity to substitute
14		incarceration for rehabilitation.
15		B. The Federal Sentencing Commission will ensure that if these
16		individuals do not have said charges, then they will not be given the
17		opportunity to use this legislation.
18	SECTION 4.	This legislation will be implemented within two months of being passed.
19	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

## A Bill to Establish Real Estate Loans for Non-Profits to Develop Not-For-Profit Housing

1	BE IT ENACTED	BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	Any 501(c)(3) company that has a core mission of developing affordable housing
3		will qualify for federal loans, below market interest rates, to develop new not-
4		for-profit housing.
5	SECTION 2.	
6		A. Companies will qualify for loans up to 10 million dollars per housing project,
7		and must go toward development of Not-For-Profit housing developments.
8		B. Not-For-Profit housing will be defined as housing projects where consumers
9		are charged rent based solely on the cost of upkeep combined with the cost
10		of servicing project debt, and utilities (if provided).
11		C. Below Market Interest Rate Loans will be defined as variable rate loans at
12		least one percent below Federal Reserve rates with a minimum rate at zero
13		percent.
14	SECTION 3.	The Federal Real Estate Agency (FREA) will be created to manage the loans,
15		observe the development of projects, and will be an arm of the US Housing and
16		Urban Development.
17		A. The Federal Trade Commission (FTC) will oversee enforcement of this
18		legislation.
19		B. Potential Real Estate Fraud will be Investigated by the FBI.
20	SECTION 4.	The FREA will be created by April of 2024, and loans will be available by January
21		of FY25.
22	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

# A Bill to Disband the Central Intelligence Agency (CIA)

1	BE IT ENACTE	D BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	This bill aims to disband the CIA and initiate a structured process for the
3		termination of its functions and operations, while ensuring the protection
4		of national security and the safeguarding of classified information.
5	SECTION 2.	CIA: The Central Intelligence Agency, a federal agency responsible for
6		intelligence and national security activities. Disband: the act of formally
7		dissolving or terminating an organization or group, often by discontinuing
8		its activities and operations. Relevant Government Agencies: Federal
9		agencies, departments, or entities responsible for national security,
10		intelligence, and foreign affairs.
11	SECTION 3.	The disbandment and transition process will be as follows:
12		A. The President shall appoint a bipartisan committee.
13		B. The President shall issue an executive order detailing the transfer of
14		functions and responsibilities to relevant government agencies.
15		C. The President and Congress shall ensure that the transfer process
16		does not compromise national security, intelligence capabilities, or
17		the protection of classified information.
18	SECTION 4.	This bill shall go into effect on January 1, 2024, with the disbandment
19		process to be completed within two years.
20	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

#### A Bill to Remove Stipulations on Federal Education Based Grants in the United States

1	BE IT ENACTE	D BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	The United States will remove any stipulations for federal education-
3		based grants.
4	SECTION 2.	The United States federal government will remove any stipulation schools
5		must adhere by to receive federal funding and base funding from
6		individual populations of each school.
7	SECTION 3.	The United States Department of Education will oversee this bill. The
8		regulations on educational funds must adhere to the following:
9		A. Funding will be based on the number of students enrolled in school of
10		each state.
11		B. A minimum of \$1,150 per student will be granted from the federal
12		government.
13		C. Any school in the United States will no longer have to follow
14		programs or rules set by the federal government in order to receive
15		funding.
16		D. States will be granted funding from the federal government and will
17		decide how the funds are allocated.
18	SECTION 4.	This legislation will be implemented immediately upon passage.
19	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

## A Resolution to Adopt the NCSS II Standards to Provide Enhanced Cyber Security for all Agencies of the U.S.

1	WHEREAS,	Current U.S. Cyber Security allows enemies to attack and exploit the
2		vulnerabilities of the agencies of the United States federal government;
3		and
4	WHEREAS,	In 2020, the FBI received more than 2,000 internet crime complaints per
5		day; and
6	WHEREAS,	Cybercrimes in the United States have resulted in hundreds of billions of
7		dollars in losses, and threaten public safety and economic security; and
8	WHEREAS,	In 2020 alone, cybercrime cost the U.S. government over 13.7 billion
9		dollars; and
10	WHEREAS,	The Netherlands ranks among the top 10 most connected countries
11		globally and has successfully implemented NCSS II; now, therefore, be it
12	RESOLVED,	That the UIL Congress here assembled adopt the National Cyber Security
13		Strategies II (NCSS II) standards in all United States Federal Government
14		agencies.

## A Bill to Enforce all Internet Applications and/or Programming with Picture Capabilities to Install Child Pornography Prevention Detection Software

- BE IT ENACTED BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT: 1 SECTION 1. The program that Microsoft Germany uses to detect/prevent child 2 3 pornography should be expanded to the U.S. It should be mandatory that any app or site that can send pictures has the software installed. 4 The software that will be used contains an AI algorithm that pre-sorts the SECTION 2. 5 deconstructed image files and accurately classifies them into four 6 categories: images showing criminal depictions of child- or teen abuse, 7
- 8 images of permitted adult pornography, or any other images. The
- 9 definition of child pornography is as stated in Federal law [18 U.S.C.
- 10 **§2256(8)**].
- 11 **SECTION 3.** The Federal Communications Commission will oversee the enforcement
- 12 of this bill. The funding for this bill will come from the IIJA (The
- 13 Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act).
- 14 **SECTION 4.** This bill will go into effect as soon as it is signed.
- 15 **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void. Introduced for UIL Congressional Debate by Jayton High School.



## A Bill to Increase Funding for Federal Meat Inspectors to Combat Job Overload

1	BE IT ENACTED BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:	
2	SECTION 1.	The United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) will receive an
3		additional \$750,000,000 to be added to the 2024 budget and allocated to
4		the Food Safety and Inspection Service (FSIS) to increase the number of
5		USDA inspectors hired for meat and poultry inspection programs.
6	SECTION 2.	A. Food inspection program shall be defined as any action taken by FSIS
7		to ensure the safety of meat and poultry product through the visual
8		inspection of said products by USDA inspectors.
9		B. USDA inspectors can be defined as trained individuals contracted by
10		the USDA through FSIS to visually inspect meat and poultry products and
11		the environment in which they are processed.
12	SECTION 3.	The USDA Office of Budget and Program Analysis will enforce this bill by
13		recording the spending of allocated funds and providing an updated
14		federal budget report.
15 16 17		A. FSIS will oversee the spending of the allocated funds within its meat and poultry inspection programs to hire inspectors and adjust salaries as necessary.
18		B. Funding will come from agricultural investment transaction taxes.
19	SECTION 4.	This law will go into effect immediately upon passage.
20	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

# A Bill to Enforce Stricter Regulations for Welfare Benefits

1	BE IT ENACTED BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:	
2	Section 1.	Families receiving welfare benefits must provide documentation and
3		adhere to guidelines for benefits.
4	Section 2.	Documentation: material that provides official information or evidence
5		that serves as a record.
6		Evaluation: the making of a judgement about the amount, number, or
7		value of something.
8	SECTION 3.	Department of Health and Human Resources will oversee the
9		enforcement of this bill.
10		A. Drug tests will be administered at local community centers weekly.
11		B. Welfare benefit recipients will be required to submit a work
12		performance evaluation or documentation of job
13		applications/interviews at local community center monthly.
14		C. When applying for welfare benefits, recipients will provide a realistic
15		timeline for necessary welfare benefits.
16	SECTION 4.	Passage of this bill will be January 2025.
17	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

## A Bill to Establish a Supreme Court Ethics Panel to Increase Court Transparency

#### 1 BE IT ENACTED BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

2	SECTION 1.	The Judicial Conference of the United States shall issue a code of conduct: The
3		code of conduct may include provisions that are only applicable to certain
4		categories of justices or judges but must apply to all courts of the United States.
5	SECTION 2.	Code of conduct: the ethical canons that apply to federal judges, providing
6		guidance on their official duties in the Court and in a variety of outside activities.
7	SECTION 3.	The Supreme Court of the United States shall fix the compensation of and
8		appoint advisors to an Ethics Investigation Counsel. The Counsel shall adopt
9		rules providing for the enforcement of the defined code of conduct, including a
10		process to receive information from the public about potential violations of the
11		code of conduct by the justices of the federal courts.
12		A. Term – The Ethics investigation Counsel members shall serve a term of 4
13		years.
14		B. The Ethics Investigation Counsel may be removed by the Supreme Court.
15		C. The Ethics Investigation Counsel shall issue an annual public report
16		describing the complaints described in section 3.
17	SECTION 4.	Not later than 1 year after the date of the enactment of this bill, the Judicial
18		conference shall issue the code of conduct. Not later than 90 days after the
19		code of conduct is issued the Supreme Court will establish the Ethics
20		Investigation Council
21	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

#### A Bill to Require Supermarkets to Donate Unsold Food

1	BE IT ENACTED BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:	
2	SECTION 1.	The United States federal government will require supermarkets to
3		donate unsold food.
4	SECTION 2.	The United States federal government will require supermarkets that are
5		400 sq meters (4,305 sq ft) or above to sign donation contracts with
6		charities or food banks or face a penalty of \$2,000.
7	SECTION 3.	The U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) shall oversee the
8		enforcement of this legislation.
9		A. The FDA shall require CEOS/Presidents/Bosses of Supermarkets that
10		are 400 sq meters (4,305 sq ft) or above to sign a donation contract
11		with a charity or food bank of their choice.
12		B. Whatever charity or food bank they choose to sign with, they must
13		donate excess/unsold food products to them.
14		C. Refusal to comply will result in a penalty of \$2,000.
15	SECTION 4.	The bill will be implemented immediately upon passage.
16	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

# A Bill to Reduce U.S. Funding to NATO

1	BE IT ENACTED BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:		
2	SECTION 1.	The United States will reduce the contribution to NATO to the minimum	
3		commitment of 2% of the US GDP. The U.S. is currently spending over 3%	
4		of our GDP toward NATO. This funds 16.19% of NATO's annual budget.	
5	SECTION 2.	A. NATO is the North Atlantic Treaty Organization founded in 1949 with	
6		the goal protecting Western and European nations.	
7		B. GDP is the Gross Domestic Product which measure monetary amounts	
8		of goods and services in a country.	
9	SECTION 3.	The Department of Defense will implement and regulate the amount	
10		spent to NATO.	
11	SECTION 4.	This bill will go in effect on October 1, 2024 which is the beginning of the	
12		U.S. fiscal year.	
13	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

#### A Bill to Reduce Food Loss in United States Food Production

1	BE IT ENACTED BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:	
2	SECTION 1.	The United States discards more food than any other country in the
3		world, averaging 120 billion pounds per year.
4	SECTION 2.	Food loss is the edible food that is available for human consumption but
5		is not consumed.
6	SECTION 3.	The United States Department of Agriculture will oversee and enforce
7		this bill by fining food production and processing entities that contribute
8		to major food loss.
9		A. For every 5% above 10% of food wasted by a food production or
10		processing entity, a fine of \$10,000 per 5% will be imposed.
11		B. A fine may be imposed monthly per that month's food losses.
12		C. Fines will be used for funding more sustainable food production
13		research and aiding citizens suffering from food insecurity.
14	SECTION 4.	This bill will go into effect as soon as it is passed.
15	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.
