5		1. A minimum of 2-person crews will be required for all railway

11		B. Safety standards

20		A. The maximum fine for violation of safety regulations will be increased

22		B. The Department of Transportation will allocate \$10 million to develop
23		a real-time GPS navigation application system for U.S. railways in
24		conjunction with the U.S. technology sector.
25	SECTION 4.	This legislation will take effect on January 1, 2025. All laws in conflict with
26		this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

AM-5 A Bill to Provide Funding for Protection from Storm Surge Intrusion into Galveston Bay

1	BE IT ENACTE	D BY THIS UIL CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	The United States federal government will provide funding of \$31 Billion
3		to construct a storm surge intrusion protection system, also known as the
4		Ike Dike, for Galveston Bay and communities. These funds will help
5		protect the communities and critical industries along the Houston-
6		Galveston area.
7	SECTION 2.	Storm surge is defined by the National Hurricane Center as an abnormal
8		rise of water generated by the storm, over and above the predicted
9		astronomical tide.
10	SECTION 3.	The Army Corps of Engineers will oversee the project and construct the
11		dike.
12		A. The project is named the "Ike Dike" because of the \$38 billion
13		damage and loss of life attributed to the storm surge of Hurricane Ike
14		in 2008.
15		B. Storm surge causes the most damage and greatest loss of life during a
16		hurricane and the Galveston Sea Wall does not offer protection for
17		Galveston Bay.
18	SECTION 4.	Construction of the dike will begin as soon as funding is secured and will
19		take fifteen years to complete.
20	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.
