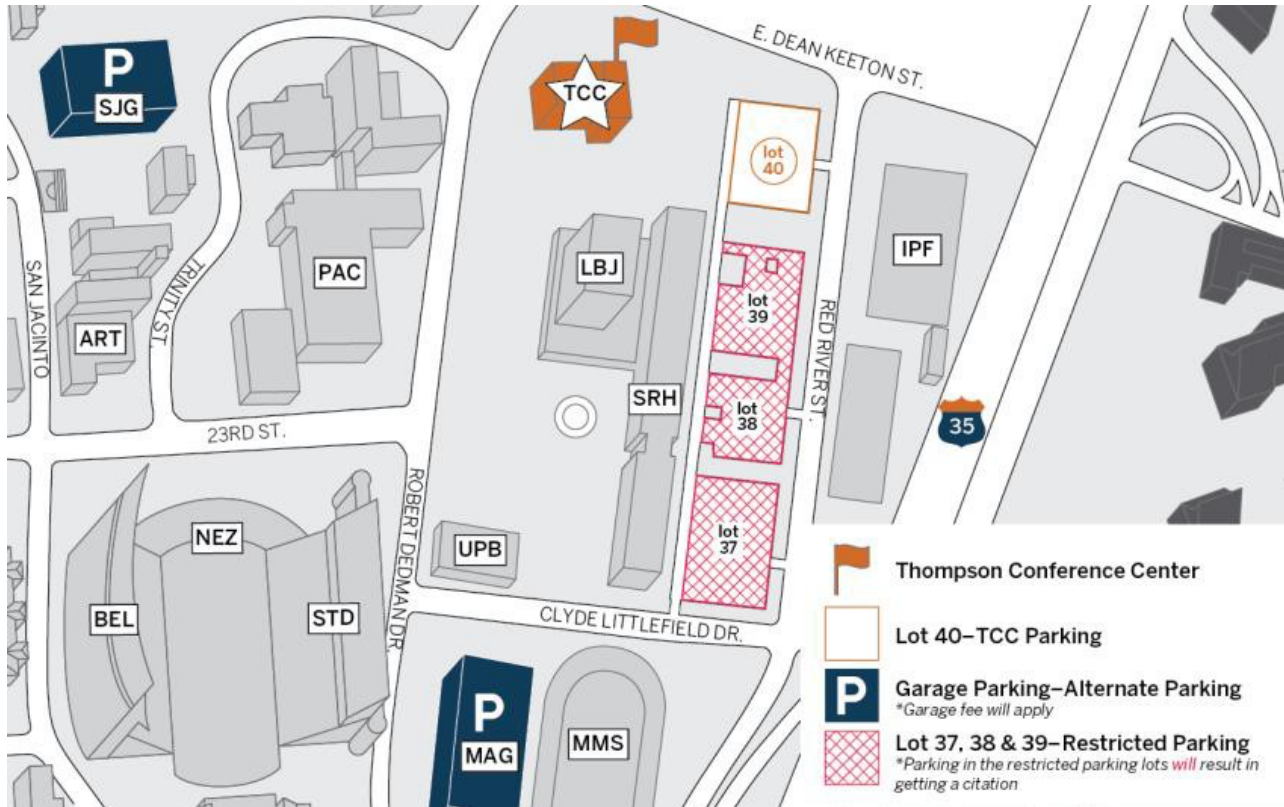


# UIL State Film Contest Parking

Parking for the event is available, for free, ONLY this UT parking Lot: Thompson Conference Center (Lot 40) \*\*\*NO BUSES allowed in lot\*\*\*



**IF YOU PARK in LOTS 37, 38 or 39 YOU WILL BE TICKETED AND/OR TOWED. These are restricted lots for the LBJ School of Public Affairs and the LBJ Library. These lots are NOT available for LBJ Auditorium Parking, where the state film contest is being held.**

**YOU CAN ONLY PARK, for free, in Lot 40, which is marked with a sign saying "Thompson Conference Center"**

## Details on the Thompson Conference Center Lot 40 Parking Lot:

**Location:** Corner of Red River St. and Dean Keeton St.

## **Overflow Parking Options (GARAGE FEES WILL APPLY, you are responsible for paying):**

- Manor Road Garage (MAC): 2017 Robert Dedman Drive
  - South of the TCC and LBJ Library on Robert Dedman, directly across the street from Darrell K Royal – Texas Memorial Stadium
- San Jacinto Garage (SJC): 2401 San Jacinto Boulevard
- San Jacinto Garage is between 24th and Dean Keeton (formerly 26th) Streets

Below is important information about the parking lot and avoiding citations while attending an event within LBJ Auditorium.

**PLEASE READ CAREFULLY**

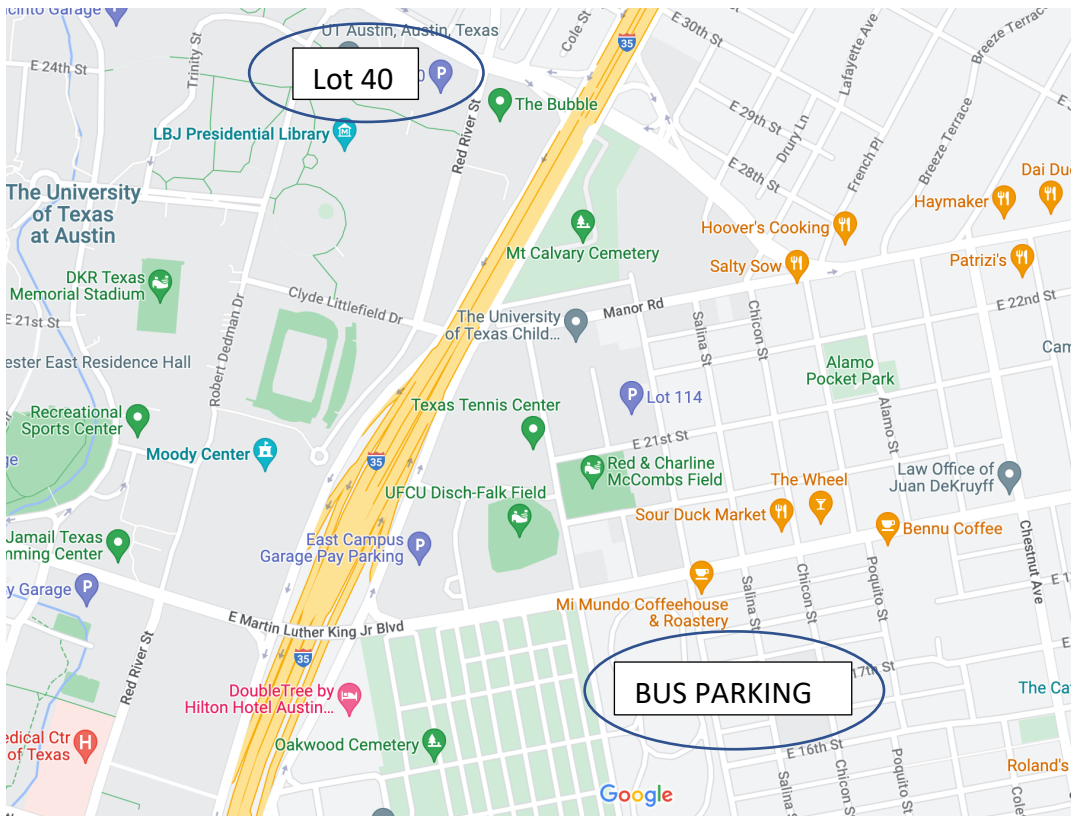
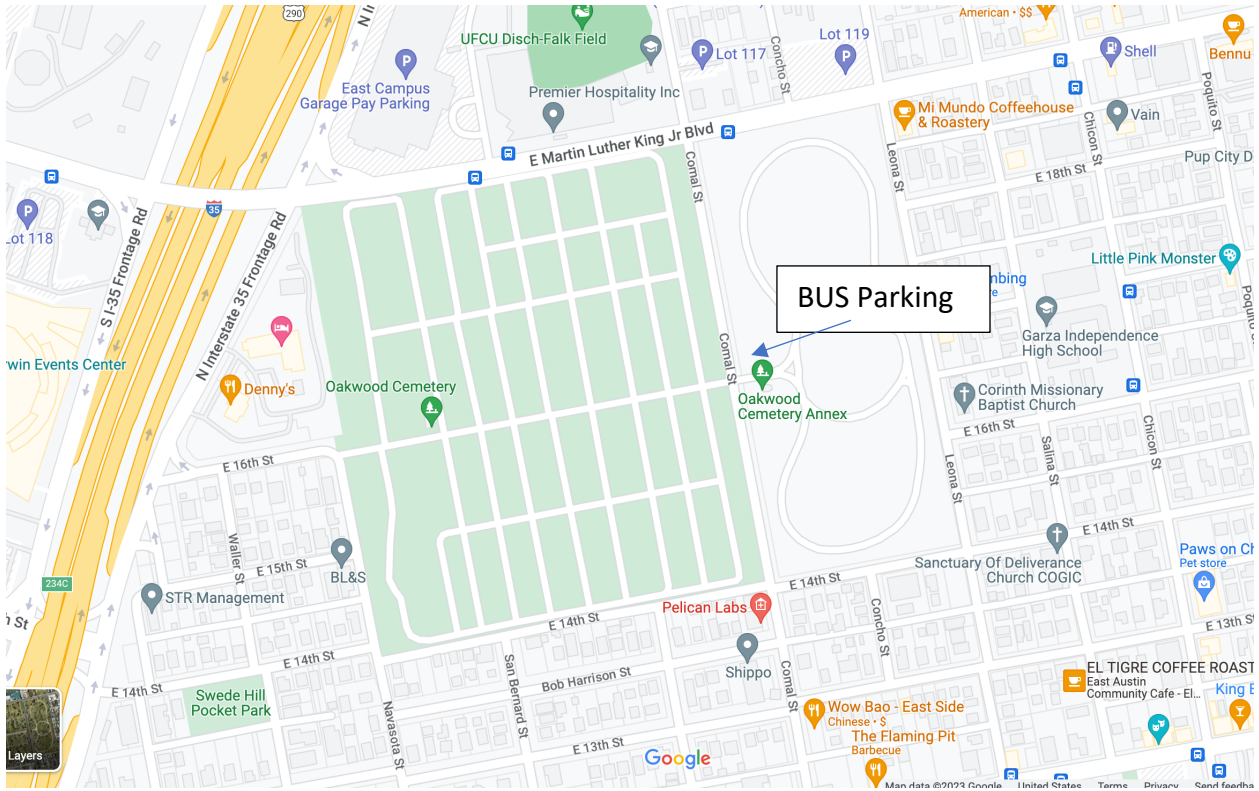
- TCC’s Lot 40 has 241 spaces and parking is on a first come, first serve basis
- **There is not enough room for school buses to park or maneuver around other vehicles**
- Parking in other areas may result in the issuance of a citation
- Parking is not available in spaces marked “University Vehicle at all times” or “Official Visitor”
- **DO NOT** park in lots 39 (staff/faculty), 38 (LBJ Library) or 37 (staff/faculty/student)

**BUS DROPOFF**

School buses can drop off and pick up attendees in Lot 39, in front of the LBJ School. **DROP OFF ONLY, NO PARKING. YOU WILL BE TICKETED, BOOTED, AND/OR TOWED IF YOU PARK IN LOT 39.**



School buses may park, on a space available basis, on Comal St by Oakwood Cemetery.



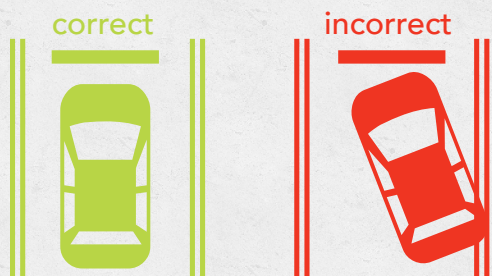
# PARKING 101

## Avoiding the most common citations

Citations written on this campus protect the spaces that faculty, staff, and students have paid to use. The most common citation issued on campus is for parking in a space without the proper permit. To easily avoid citations, pay daily garage fees or purchase a permit and park where your permit allows. Also, read your e-mails and look for signs that announce changes in your parking lot or garage.

## Citations and Appeals

You can make citation payments online at [www.utexas.edu/parking](http://www.utexas.edu/parking). Just remember that payment is due within 12 calendar days of the citation date. Citations not paid or appealed after 12 calendar days are invoiced to the permit holder; or, if no permit is displayed, the fees are invoiced to the registered vehicle owner. Citations not resolved within 42 days of being issued incur a \$25 late fee and may be forwarded to a collection agency with additional fees added.



## Parking within the lines

Your car should be entirely within the lines that define your space. If you are parked over the line, you may receive a citation. In some parking garages, a double line is used between spaces to help prevent door dings. Each space is defined by the interior lines, creating a buffer between vehicles.

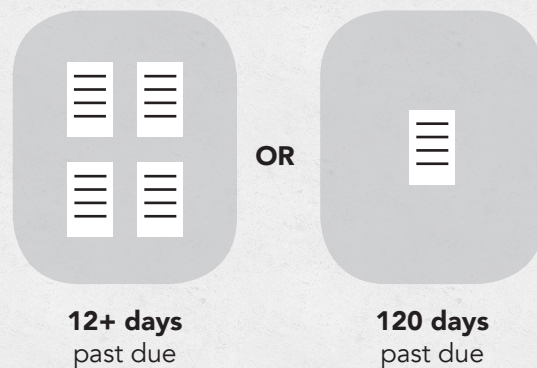
## Loading and Unloading

If you need quick access to buildings around campus to load or unload something, there are a few options.

- **Loading Zones:** You can park in any Loading Zone (LZ) space throughout campus for up to 30 minutes with your emergency lights flashing.
- **Meters:** You can park at meters, which are located throughout campus with time limited to 45 minutes during the day at a rate of \$3.
- **Garages:** There are nine garages throughout campus, all of which provide up to 30 minutes of parking at no charge.

## Boots

A boot may be placed on a vehicle when an owner has four or more outstanding citations or one citation more than 120 days past due. All outstanding citations plus a \$100 boot fee must be paid in full before the boot is removed. Don't try to remove boots yourself. It will lead to additional costs and possible prosecution.



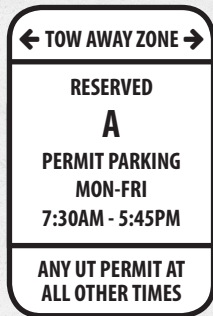
## Theft Prevention

According to UTPD, property theft is the most common crime on campus. As the university is not responsible for any loss, theft, or damage to vehicles on campus, crime prevention is key. Do not leave your belongings in view when you park your car and be sure to roll up all windows and lock all doors.

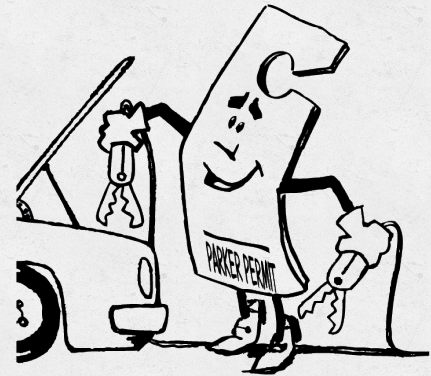
## Reading the Signs

One of the most important factors for successfully parking at UT is reading and understanding the signs. Most signs indicate the permit that is required to park in all the spaces to which the sign applies as well as the times these restrictions apply. To avoid littering the campus with thousands of parking signs, **most spaces on campus do not have a sign for that specific space.** Typically, signs indicate an area or zone for which the restrictions of that sign apply. The areas may be denoted by signs posted at lot entrances, which means the restrictions on the sign apply to all unsigned spaces in the lot. Another area indicator are the signs you may see on ramps and different levels of a parking garage, specifying which floors resident student ("R") permit holders may park. Finally, the most common signs have arrows pointing to the areas for which the sign restrictions apply.



## Auto Assistance

The Longhorn Auto Assistance Program (LAAP) is a FREE service offered by PTS to anyone parked on campus. If you lock your keys in your car or your car battery dies, call UTPD at **(512) 471-4441** to have the LAAP vehicle render assistance 24/7.



## Backing into Spaces

When parking in angled spaces, you should not back into them if it puts your car in a direction facing opposite to the flow of traffic in the nearest lane.

## Yellow and Red Curbs

Yellow and red curbs can be seen throughout campus. If a space or area is marked by a yellow or red curb and it does not have a sign on it indicating that you can park there (such as those that list your permit type or have LZ – loading zone), then you should **not** park there.
